



REFLECTION

January is over and Christmas is but another memory. The tree has been taken down and the lights and decorations packed away into their boxes to wait for next December. The dreary weather is now giving way to expectation of Spring as the first bulbs push their way through the damp soil. The winter is nearing its end. Thoughts of spring with the promise of warmer days and longer daylight hours fill our thoughts of new life, not only in our gardens but also in the countryside around us. The cycle of the seasons never fails to excite or lead us further on our journey through the years.

And so it is with the Church. Candlemass sees the end of the Christmas story and for traditionalists this is the time to pack away the Crib for another year. Having celebrated the birth of Christ, the Church turns to Lent and preparations for celebrating the death and resurrection of Our Lord.

The season of Lent, as with Advent, is a time of waiting and making ready - a time for self-examination. A look at our faith and how well we integrate our belief into everyday living. Do we live out our Christian faith each day or do we fall short of what we can do and be? If we fall short, how do we improve our standing in the eyes of God and our friends and neighbours? How is our relationship with the God we profess to believe in? This all sounds a bit dreary, and add to that the business of giving up chocolate, even I wonder why. But take heart, this year the Church is taking a good hard look at how we live our lives in relation to the whole of His Creation. If, as we believe, God created all things out of his love, including us, then we have a responsibility to look after things better than we have to date and how we can live that out in our day to day lives.

I will end this reflection with a prayer from Ruth Valerio's book 'Saying Yes to Life':

To the one who surges into the fissures that cannot be accessed, to the one who floods into the crevices that cannot be reached, to the one whose presence exposes, clarifies, restores, and cultivates.

We bask. We thrive. We harbour no secrets.

We hold onto no heaviness we fear makes us unloved.

You are the first ingredient for life.



Edington Arts Bach's St John Passion Saturday March 23rd

Saturday March 23rd Edington Priory, 7pm

Edington Arts is celebrating the start of their tenth season on Saturday 23rd March with a two hour performance of Bach's St John Passion by the Oxford Bach Soloists and Orchestra under their conductor Tom Hammond-Davies. The great international tenor Mark Padmore will be singing the role of The Evangelist. The performance is being generously sponsored by Edington Station Yard Ltd, and by The Three Daggers.

Bach's account of the Passion from the Gospel according to St John is 'punchier' than that of the St Matthew, and the superb communication skills of both soloists and chorus will be used to most moving effect. The Oxford Bach Soloists have been performing the St John Passion on Good Friday in Oxford for many years, where it has become an iconic, essential ingredient of the preparations for Easter. This will be the first time they have performed the St John Passion during Lent outside Oxford, and we are delighted they have chosen Edington as their venue. Their recent London debut, with Bach's Christmas Oratorio, received a five-star review in The Guardian, whose reviewer said "This virile, collegiate approach to Bach is the most exciting I've heard in a very long time".

Major Roadworks in West Lavington

Major roadworks are scheduled for the A₃60 in West Lavington in February and into March. Those potholes might soon be gone!

30th January to 12th February: traffic lights control

There will be a drainage investigation survey and associated works on the A₃60 along West Lavington High Street from the Dauntsey crossroads to Rickbarton. Multi-way traffic lights will control the flow of traffic.

14th February to 8th March: road closure

The A360 along West Lavington High Street will be closed from Russell Mill Lane to Rutts Lane for carriageway resurfacing, road marking, adjustment of ironworks and associated works.

Russell Mill Lane and **Church Street** will be closed to traffic, except for residential access. Diversions will be in place via Market Lavington and further afield. It would be advisable to plan journeys on the assumption that you can't get through West Lavington.

November was a busy month for The Nestling Trust! Thank you to everyone who came to support us at two major events:

The hundred people attending the **Fashion Show** on Saturday 11th November in Market Lavington Community Hall were treated to a stunning array of winter fashion items by Travelling Trends. This was a fantastic evening to remember! The amazing venue with a fire pit in the centre was transformed into what was reminiscent of a Himalayan Lodge, bedecked with prayer flags and poinsettias, a flower native to Nepal. Peter Vaughan and his team prepared the most delightful Nepalese-inspired menu and Peter also intrigued guests with tales and legends, transporting us away to the foothills of the Himalayas and giving tantalising descriptions of the dishes to be served. Music played by Andrew Hurst created just the right atmosphere - a very special and happy event.

Finally, from 28th November to 5th December it was the **BigGive** online match funding Christmas Challenge, where donations made to the Nestling Trust were doubled. Thank you so much to everyone who donated - we are most grateful.

The amount raised through the three events is approximately an incredible **£16,500**.

Proceeds will be used to help staff the **Baiteshwor Health & Birthing Centre** and make an emergency vehicle access road. It will also help support the Sarangkot Nestling Children's **Home**, as well as helping survivors of the earthquake in Western Nepal.

Nepal is one of the poorest countries in the world and The Nestling Trust is very aware that our work in helping the needy and the most vulnerable, over the past ten years, has only been possible due to the generosity of our supporters. We have been overwhelmed by the level of support and trust placed upon us - thank you most sincerely for enabling us to do this work.

However, this was entirely within the normal range – so no need to panic!


The monthly figures remind us that the summer months of July and August were disappointing.

They were preceded and followed by the unusually warm months of June and September.

December is still fresh in our minds as being really wet and windy. Indeed, it appears in the above lists as the wettest month in 2023, but was also the wettest December since records began and included the wettest day of the year.

Happy New Conservation Year!

The BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) has reported that there have been changes to migrant bird patterns due to habitat loss and climate irregularities. So far this year there appear to be fewer winter migrants such as fieldfares, redwings and bramblings in the area. Conversely, there appears to be more migrational movement of blackbirds. Waxwings could appear should the weather harden in Scandinavia. They love rosehips, such as those on rosa Fellenberg. We haven't been alerted to local starling murmurations so far this winter - roosting areas do change, but this might be a sign of the decline of this hardy species.

Some folk have reported bumble bee activity even on cold days. These are such hardy bee species with yellow rears that visit nectar bearing flowering shrubs such as winter flowering honeysuckle, abelia and mahonia. Often bumble bees will fly into sheds and summerhouses when doors are open, and get trapped and die when such outbuildings are shut up, so please check for bumblebees first.

Seabirds especially are still suffering from avian 'flu, and our birds of gardens, fields and woods can be affected. Keep feeders clean and water in bird baths changed daily, and if you haven't cleaned out and checked bird boxes for damage and repair, please try to do so by the end of the month.

If you know hedgehogs are hibernating in your garden, ensure they are safe from domestic pets. We had a terrier particularly interested in our hedgehog boxes, so we had to fence them off with chicken wire, cutting a 15mm x 15mm (6" x 6") ground level opening for the sow and hoglets to use when born.

It is encouraging to read that more parishes are earmarking areas for nurturing nature in their local plans, e.g. planting copses, managing wild flower meadows, so essential for pollination for food production. Worldwide pollinators are threatened as more and more land is lost to development and erosion due to changing climate patterns.

Finally, a few words about the spectacular monogamous albatrosses, which lay a single egg every one or two years. Sadly an estimated 100,000 a year are killed by bycatch from high seas fishing fleets. Wherever there is fishing, there is bycatch - the incidental capture of nontarget species such as dolphins, marine turtles and seabirds. The WWF says that it aims to reduce bycatch by working with fisheries and helping develop and promote new technologies and gear for more efficient operations. In many cases, these modifications are simple and inexpensive, and often come from fishers themselves.

It is up to us to stem these staggering declines in birds and mammals for the sake of our children and grandchildren.

Wiltshire's Local Nature Recovery Strategy

Wiltshire Council has been appointed by DEFRA as responsible for preparing the Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) for Wiltshire and Swindon, one of 48 local authorities so appointed, covering the whole of England.

Wiltshire and Swindon's LRNS will provide an agreed, coherent, and compelling approach to nature recovery, directing financial resources and organisational effort to where they are most needed. It will consist of a document containing biodiversity priorities and a habitat map which will inform and guide nature recovery across Wiltshire. By mapping where important habitats can be conserved, restored and connected, Wiltshire and Swindon's LNRS will allow effort and funding to be funnelled into the most important areas, supporting nature recovery across the landscape. It can also help to achieve the multiple environmental benefits that nature brings to people, such as clean air and water and reduced flood risk.

Wiltshire Council is developing their mapping system and will be user testing this with stakeholders in February 2024 to ensure the LRNS habitat map is designed with end users in mind. They are also drawing relevant information from existing strategies, such as neighbourhood plans and the green blue infrastructure strategy. These required significant engagement and can provide useful information about local priorities and enable relevant and connected options to be considered. There are a range of different events planned between March and July 2024 to ensure a wide range of stakeholders can contribute to Wiltshire and Swindon's LRNS. In March an invitation and survey will go out to people who work in and around ecology, land management and nature recovery to help produce a longlist of habitats, species and wider benefits for consideration. During April and May, a select group of experts will then undertake the difficult task of reducing the longlist to a shortlist of priorities. From May to July, Wiltshire Council will be running a series of workshops across the county, open to all, to collect local knowledge and feedback about the shortlisted priorities.

Final reporting and mapping for the Wiltshire and Swindon Local Nature Recovery Strategy will take place in Winter 2024, with the democratic review process finishing in July 2025.

What are Local Nature Recovery Strategies?

Great Britain is one of the most nature just focus on nature in isolation. COP28

COP28 was transformational in mentioning the intention to cut emissions. In a last minute change to the final statement, it declared a transitional move away from oil, coal and gas. However, there was no compulsion to take action, and no timescale. It remains to be seen if the biggest fossil fuel producers - China, Russia, India, the US, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and the Gulf States - do start to do so. Will we be carbon neutral by 2030?

The countries at COP28 agreed to:

- Transition away from fossil fuels in energy production in a just, orderly, and equitable manner
- Accelerate low and zero emission technologies such as carbon capture and storage
- Commit to triple renewable and energy efficient processes by 2030
- Stronger carbon cutting plans to be submitted by each country by 2025

The positive take from this conference is that climate change is now fully recognised and change in behaviour accepted. However, there continues to be too many influential and powerful vested interests pushing back and defending the status quo—money talks!



Fiction

The Lost Bookshop by Evie Woods: On a quiet street in Dublin, a lost bookshop is waiting to be found....set in 1921 and the present day, this is an unputdownable read about the power of books.

Homecoming by Kate Morton: Another set in two eras - 1959 and 2018 - this is a breathtaking mystery of love, lies and a cold case come back to life.

Other Women by Emma Flint: Set in 1924 when a generation of women had seemingly no place in the world, this is a devastating story of fantasy and obsession inspired by a murder that took place almost a hundred years ago.

One Woman Show by Christine Coulson: a stylish novel, remarkably told through museum wall labels, that imagines a privileged twentieth-century woman, Kitty Whitaker, as an artifact who transforms herself from a precious object into an unforgettable protagonist.

Cuddy by Benjamin Myers: winner of the Goldsmith Prize, a bold and experimental retelling of the story of the hermit St. Cuthbert, unofficial patron saint of the North of England. A novel like no other, Cuddy straddles historical eras from 689 to 2019.

Needing no introduction but highly recommended were **The Last Devil to Die by Richard Osman** and **A Death in the Parish by Rev. Richard Coles.**

Non-Fiction

The Emperor of Rome by Mary Beard: an account of Roman history as it has never been presented before. Beard asks bigger questions: What power did emperors actually have? Was the Roman palace really so bloodstained?

Hitler, Stalin, Mum and Dad: A Family Memoir of Miraculous Survival by Daniel Finkelstein: a powerful memoir exploring his parents' devastating experiences of persecution, resistance and survival during the Second World War. A modern classic.

The Plot: the Political Assassination of Boris Johnson by Nadine Dorries: the fly-on-the-wall account of how the saviour of the Conservative Party became a pariah, revealing those who became the architects of a Prime Minister's downfall.

2024 started with a bang and sparked lots of ideas for change, including proposals in Highways and Planning which will be of interest to us all.

Drain Clearing: Poor funding from central government has led to less gully and drain clearances by Wiltshire Council. Likewise, there has been no incentive for landowners to reduce water run-off from fields, and clear ditches. Wiltshire Council is putting an extra £1million into drain and gully clearance, including a third vacuum machine, whilst DEFRA is looking at incentivising landowners. I am pushing for a long-term funding increase to acknowledge the fact that weather patterns are changing and we need to deal with more rain annually than we ever have before.

Black Dog: The closure of the spur road north of the junction is a step closer thanks to the support of local residents, Parish Councils and the Highways team. I anticipate this being implemented in the next few months once the legal paperwork is complete (the Department for Transport ensures this isn't a straightforward or quick process!).

Solar Farm: A proposal for a huge change to our local countryside and agriculture came last month in the form of a planning application for a 200-acre solar farm in Potterne, Easterton and Market Lavington. Opposition is strong with many, including myself, asking why we are losing good land in which we can grow crops in order to generate electricity we cannot use due to grid capacity.

Co-op Market Lavington: Another proposed change in Market Lavington came from an application for houses and a larger Co-Op. This came as no surprise since a hundred or so residents attended a presentation back in 2022 when the idea was floated. Since that meeting, I have been regularly asked by excited locals when the new Co-Op will be built! I am told a larger Co-Op has been supported by three-quarters of locals who took part in a survey last year. However, there is a lot for residents, the Parish Council and Planners to consider because the proposal is a deviation from the Neighbourhood Plan (voted for by locals) which earmarked the site for housing. I expect some interesting debate will follow!

Housing: I have written about 5 Year Housing Land Supply before: a flawed target for building new homes. We have lost many Planning appeals because we have been kept from hitting the target through the manipulation of figures by unscrupulous developers. I am pleased to report our lobbying of Michael Gove has been a success and we now have a 4-year target (which we are exceeding). This should protect us from further overdevelopment in the Devizes area.

Guest speakers from Wiltshire Council and Chilmark Parish Council gave very interesting talks which provided all the information that the village needs to create an Emergency Plan, how it works in practice and how to become more resilient when faced with difficult situations. Several volunteers have stepped forward from Great Cheverell, including Parish Councillors, to develop the plan and help during emergency events. Thank you to everyone who attended. Please get in touch with the Parish Clerk if you think you could assist in any way.

A belated happy New Year to you all and we hope you have kept well, safe and warm over the last couple of months.

What is a Council Precept? This is a tax that Parish and Town Councils charge their local residents in order to cover spending on

service delivery within the community. This includes services such as open spaces, cemeteries, playing fields, toilets, street furniture, and more. Fire, Police and Town/Parish precepts are in addition to the Wiltshire Council basic Council Tax. Last year the Parish Council did not request any increase, but this year the Parish Council has requested a rise of 2.5% in the amount of our precept request to Wiltshire Council.

Overhanging Trees & Hedges: The Council has been busy over the Christmas period dealing with fallen trees over footpaths and access on bridleways, localised surface water flooding and icy areas. Before the birds start nesting, the council would be grateful if residents and landowners could cut back overhanging hedges and trees from pavements, footpaths and the narrow village roads.

Defibrillators: The defibrillator in the Rutts Lane red telephone box has been unreliable in the cold weather. A nearby householder has kindly agreed to host this defibrillator temporarily on his house wall (The Old Bridge Inn) until we can get a reliable power supply to the telephone box in Rutts Lane. This is being pursued through Scottish & Southern Electric. A fourth defibrillator machine has been purchased and will soon be connected up in the red telephone box at the crossroads (A360/B3098), making a total of four machines available in the two villages: The Old Bridge Inn in Church Street, the Village Hall, crossroads A360/B3098, and the bus stop by 46 High Street in Littleton Panell. The Parish Council website has a map showing the exact locations.

The wooden gates which were stolen from the Remembrance Avenue are being replaced. These are in the process of being 'branded' and will be fitted shortly. Larger and more robust tree guards have also been purchased for the trees in the Avenue to help protect them from being nibbled by deer. A replacement slide for Robert's Playground has been ordered and will be put in place when it arrives.

The next **Parish Council meeting** will be on **Thursday 1st February**, starting at 7.00 pm in the Giles Room, Village Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend. Our monthly meetingsare held on the first Thursday in the month and details are posted on the website www.westlavington.org.uk and in the noticeboard by the village shop.

Keep your dog under control near livestock

As we move towards the main lambing and calving periods, the Parish Council asks dog walkers and walkers to support your local farming community by respecting the Countryside Code. It is a sensible precaution to keep dogs on a lead when livestock are nearby. Almost half (46%) of dog owners in a recent NFU survey think that their dog would not attack or chase livestock until it happens, and by then it is too late. Livestock worrying is when a dog attacks or chases livestock on agricultural land, or is at large in a field with sheep or other livestock. This can result in significant injury or suffering and, in the worst cases, the death of the animals involved, This has devastating consequences for livestock keepers, causing personal distress as well as significant financial costs. Livestock worrying is a criminal offence and the dog owner could face prosecution and a fine of up to £1000, in the most serious case.

DID YOU KNOW? Have you used MyWilts?

Wiltshire Council has made it easy to report issues like potholes and fly tipping by creating a reporting portal called **MyWilts**, which has replaced the old 'MyWiltshire' app.

MyWilts will work on any device with an internet connection including laptops and smartphones. You can download the MyWilts app onto your Android or Apple device from the App Store (Apple) and Google Play (Android), or you can simply use an internet browser, such as Google Chrome, to access MyWilts and raise new cases. The app works on Android version 8 and above, and iOS version 10.

Through the online site and app, residents can tell the Council about any issues they come across. You can give information anonymously or register for free. If you do register, you can track reports and receive progress updates. You can use the camera on your phone to upload photos. You will also have access to view your historical cases and be able to access additional services, such as the Wiltshire Council Waste Forms.

You can report issues with:

Abandoned vehicles • Benefits • Empty homes • Fraud • Car parks, including problems with car park ticket machines • Playgrounds • Roads, pavements and footpaths - including bus shelters, potholes, street lighting and traffic lights • Rubbish or recycling • Street scene - including dead animals, dog mess, fly tipping and public litter bins • Trading standards • Trees, hedges and grass • Unauthorised encampments • Unlicensed scrap metal collectors • Unlicensed waste collectors • Weather emergencies

And it's true that many are quickly forgotten or abandoned, but that doesn't mean the whole practice is a waste of time. It's a way of setting your course in the right direction for the coming months. If you don't make plans for improvement, the only alternative is to drift along doing the same things you've done before - whether or not they're fruitful.

As the old year transitions into the new, take some time to evaluate your life. Not just based on worldly accomplishments, but on a deeper spiritual level. In the last week of December, I always reflect to see how I've responded to the Lord's guidance, promises, or warnings throughout the year. The goal is not to judge my performance, but to check the condition of my heart and remind myself of the lessons I've learned.

Try asking yourself the following questions: What did I achieve last year? Have I done anything that will outlive me and have eternal significance? Did I spend my time, energy, and resources accomplishing what I wanted or what God desired? Have I grown in my relationship with Christ?

These questions relate to the most important aspect of your life—and the key to anything you hope to experience in the future.

Paul had one desire that superceded all others:

"Whatever things were gain to me, these things I have counted as loss because of Christ. More than that, I count all things to be loss in view of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord" (Philippians 3:7-8).

That's a challenging standard, isn't it? Are career, family, financial, material, or social goals more important to you than gaining deeper knowledge of, and intimacy with, your Saviour? There's nothing wrong with pursuing other things, but they need to take second place to your relationship with the Lord. That means you have to make time to spend with Him, in His Word and prayer.

A Just God

Mr Bates vs The Post Office movingly highlighted the plight of sub-postmasters and mistresses who were accused of theft and false accounting by the Post Office. It was the Horizon computer system, not the workers, which was at fault.

The programme provoked huge public outrage at the injustice faced by hundreds of innocent people. Government ministers

were spurred into action. Wrongs will at last be righted and due compensation handed out. Justice at last. *We hope*.

In an episode of Inspector Morse Lewis asks his boss if he believes in God. The Chief Inspector replies that he sometimes wished he did, reflecting, 'A just God. A God dispensing justice. I'd like to believe in that.' Yet the justice of God is not often spoken about these days. It seems that the church is happy to trumpet God's love, but is all too often silent when it comes to proclaiming a just God.

That is a mistake. An unjust God who was indifferent to right and wrong would not be worth worshipping. 'The Lord loves justice' the psalmist assures us. And rightly so. Justice demands that all are equal before the law. Justice insists that the innocent are declared to be in the right and that the guilty are condemned. A good God must be just.

But 'a God dispensing justice' is an uncomfortable thought. After all, who of us can claim to have lived our lives according to the perfection demanded in God's law? When measured by that standard, the Bible admits, 'None is righteous, no, not one'. We will all therefore be held to account by a just God.

But isn't God forgiving? Yes, but not at the expense of justice. That is exactly why God sent his Son Jesus into the world. He came to fulfil the righteous demands of God's law on our behalf. Jesus suffered and died, bearing the penalty of our sin on the cross. It is on that basis that all who believe in Jesus are forgiven and put right with God.

The day will come when God will put the world to rights. He will overthrow evil and condemn unrighteousness. That day holds no fear for believers. They will stand before their Maker and Judge clothed in the perfect righteousness of Jesus. 'A just God. A God dispensing justice' is certainly worth believing in.


