For most readers the account of that first Easter morning is very familiar. But have you ever noticed that in Mark's account (Chapter 16) the women who arrive at the tomb are told to go and tell his disciples, and especially Peter (verse 7)? This is the same Peter who, just hours earlier, had denied Jesus three times in the courtyard scene before Jesus' trial.

Seldom in life do we get a second chance. For a long time I was very keen on cricket – and a very poor batsman. The firm I worked for had an annual cricket match. I

was given a once-in-a lifetime opportunity of playing at Arundel the week before the West Indies touring team played on the ground. I was out first ball.

Peter though did get a second chance. Part of the good news of the Christian Gospel is that we

are each offered a second chance, each day – and all because of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

At an Easter Service in Bangladesh the congregation wept at the crucifixion scene, in the Jesus film. Suddenly a little boy at the back jumped up and said, "Don't worry, he gets up again. I've seen it before!"

Easter is a time to rejoice: he got up again so that we might each be given a second chance.

I was lucky, or pushy, enough to be sponsored to the tune of just over £300, and I am most grateful to all those who contributed so willingly. The night went fine - a cold weather sleeping bag on top of a long pew cushion on top of a sleeping mat ensured I had an excellent nights sleep, lulled by a group of teenagers singing to a guitar (fortunately at the other end of the church) and woken by the sound of a kettle boiling at about half past six. A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

If we are lucky, we can look back on childhood with pleasure. It was an age of innocence when everything was a new experience. It was an age of discovery and an age of irresponsibility. Someone else took charge of the basics in life. Mum and Dad provided a home, food, money, love. At school, authority was imposed by "them" and each one of us just had to look after ourselves.

Growing up, we may remember, was challenging. Adolescence and early adulthood brought responsibilities. How to earn money? What to spend it on? Who to spend time with? Where to live?

Most of us made it through OK and took on responsibility for our own lives. In due course, we have probably taken on responsibility for others either in our families or in our jobs.



The transition we are now seeing in the process of government in this country could be likened in some ways to a family growing up. No longer can we depend on the parental State to provide our every need, nor should we.

The problem is that an adolescent is not always ready to take on responsibility. In a similar way in this country, some local authorities are not handling well the reduction of pocket money provided by government. Wiltshire, on the other hand, had to learn to be responsible at an early age and is now handling the budget cuts more effectively than almost any authority in the country.

At the next level too, town and parish councils and local communities are learning to accept responsibility for providing services that previously were delivered from on high. The future of Market Lavington Library looks assured owing to an excellent local response of volunteers. CCTV in Devizes will be financed locally. Elsewhere, some leisure centres will be run by people of the area they serve. If it all works out, local accountability will rise. Local taxes may rise too but central taxes should fall.

There is a long way to go on this journey and some elements of localism may not go smoothly but, in due course, we should all benefit if we take responsibility for ourselves as individuals and as a community.

20mph Speed Limit Experimental Order 2011 was made by Wiltshire Council on 8th March under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, advertised in the Wiltshire Times on 18th March and implemented on 26th March. A consultation period will be open for a period of six months. This Order will have a maximum duration of 18 months, during which time consideration will be given to introducing a permanent Order. Copies of the Order and relevant details of the roads affected are displayed on the notice boards in the village. Details of the proposed scheme may be seen at Devizes Library, Sheep Street, Devizes, and also on line at

www.wiltshire.gov.uk/council/consultations/troconsultations.htm It would be appreciated if parishioners could give their support to this project by keeping to the 20 mph speed limit in order to maintain a safe environment in the village.

Police Report:

- **1.Theft of Jewellery:** A burglary took place from a residence in the High Street in February involving jewellery. The Police advise the public to photograph all items of valuable jewellery and make a note of serial numbers.
- **2.Theft of Roof Tiles:** There have been two episodes of theft of roof tiles from St Peter's Church. An alarm system and security camera is being installed to deter thieves from repeating this vandalism.
- **3.Suspicious Vehicles.** A suspicious looking van loaded with scrap metal has been seen. Parishioners are urged to report any suspicious vehicles to the Police on 0845 408 7000 giving details if possible of the registration number.

LAVINGTON PRE-SCHOOL

At the start of Term 2 we welcomed a new family to our setting. We have also started our new topic which is based on the book *The Window*. The book looks at how a boy sees things differently through the window as he grows up. We will be looking at how we may see things change as we ourselves grow up and change, how things change when day turns to night, the seasons changing and how things may look different outside a window in different countries. This has led to some wonderful

artwork which can be seen in our classroom. The children have made daffodils, woolly sheep and some feathery chicks. We joined Reception Class with one of their PE lessons to introduce "Fizzybet Pets" to both pre-school staff and children. 'Fizzybet Pets' introduces a new dimension to phonics where every phonic sound is linked to a particular animal and exercise, building on the 'Jolly Phonics' which we already use at pre-school.

We were delighted to welcome Anji Scofield back for a return visit on Monday, 14th March. Anji gave a very interesting talk about her visit last year to the Oberammergau Passion Play.

This famous event takes place every ten years in the village of Oberammergau (population 5,300) in the Bavarian Alps. The story of how it all began dates back to the year 1633 when the plaque or 'black death' was spreading like wildfire and large areas of Germany were devastated. The village had managed to keep it at bay by its position and also strictly enforced quarantine. However, one night one of the inhabitants, Kaspar Schisler who had been living and working away from the village returned secretly to visit his family not knowing that he was carrying the plague with him. This act resulted in his own death and also the deaths of all his family and 84 other members of the community. Some people believed that this disaster was sent as a punishment from God. As a result of this conclusion in July 1633 the village Council, in a desperate act of faith, called a meeting in the church and made a solemn vow before the altar to perform every tenth year a Play about the suffering and death of Jesus Christ, if God would deliver them from the plague. From that day on no further deaths occurred from this disease in Oberammergau.

The Passion Play was first performed in 1634 by 60 or 70 performers on a stage erected over the graves of the plague victims. In 1674 it was decided to bring the performance to the beginning of each decade. There are only two occasions since then when it has not been performed and that was in 1770 when there was a ban on passion plays and in 1940 due to the Second World War. The location of the Play was moved in 1830 from the cemetery to a field on the northern edge of the village, which became known as 'Passion Meadow' and it has been performed on that site ever since.

Preparation for the 2010 performance began in April 2009 when the village solemnly renewed the original vow in the Parish Church. In order to take part in the Play people must have been born in the village of Oberammergau or have lived there for at least 20 years. The cast for last year amounted to 2,400,including 630 children. In addition to this number there was a chorus of 48 singers, including soloists and an orchestra of 55 musicians. Anji played us some excerpts of the music and choral pieces performed which were truly stirring. We were also shown pictures of the various scenes portrayed in the Play.

Anji concluded her talk by saving that it was a wonderful experience and we were very grateful to her for sharing her memories with us.
