From the Rectory

Dear Friends,

As the shops have been reminding us for some time, Christmas is coming again. The following angle on a familiar story comes from *The Word for Today*.

The Christmas story goes like this: 'There were...shepherds...keeping watch over their flocks by night. And behold an angel of the Lord stood before them...The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign to you: You will find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" (Luke 2:8-12).

Why did the angel first talk to a shepherd, a job considered the lowest of the low in those days?

- the angel could have talked to the religious leaders, but they'd have had to consult their books and formed a committee;
- the angel could have consulted a group of celebrities, but they'd have had to scrub up and check who was watching;
- the angel could have appeared to chief executives, but they'd have had to turn on their blackberries and open a spread sheet.

Rather the angel gave the greatest news story in history to those with no axe to grind, no reputation to protect and no ladder to climb; people with humble hearts and open minds; people with simple, child-like faith.

Outside Bethlehem there is a church marking Jesus' birth-place. Behind the altar is a cave with a symbolic star embedded in the floor. You can enter the cave, but there is one snag – you can only do so on your knees because the doorway is too low to get in standing up.

God still operates in that way. We find him amongst the commonplace – but to truly experience him, we have to be prepared to get down on our knees.

Wishing you a Happy Christmas when it comes.

COVER PICTURE - LAVINGTON STATION

If the Cover Picture strikes you as being hazy and a little out of focus, then it is perhaps appropriate, for in the mists of time it has become, for those of us who remember it, a dim evanescent memory. I am most grateful to John Sainsbury who worked there and who is seen in his short sleeves, presumably next to the Stationmaster, for the photograph. Like so many small country stations, Lavington was dealt a mortal blow by the Beeching axe in 1966 and thus had lasted a mere 60 years, having been established there on the demand of the owner of the land, whose name I have forgotten (was it Lady Warrington?), that if her land was to be used for a section of the railway, then a station should also be built.

My most abiding memory is of a ritual that I encountered at the end of my first term at Dauntsey's. In those days many of the boys returned home by train on the last morning (8.52 to Paddington, 8.57 going West). I was prevailed upon to accompany them to the station by senior members of staff where I not merely witnessed but also participated in a tradition, long established. Before the boys boarded the train, still dressed in their school uniforms (fawn shorts, socks and sweaters), members of the staff would shake each by the hand and wish them a good holiday. I was much impressed by the dignity and propriety of the occasion. However, in the course of time I discovered that no sooner had the train left the station with its load of paragons than off came the uniforms, on went the t-shirts and jeans, out came the packets of Woodbines and, if it happened to be a non-smoking carriage, then all the better for the spirit of anarchy.

Perhaps the feeling of irresponsibility was catching, for at a later date, returning to my own home in the Midlands I accepted a lift from a friend in his car to catch the early evening train from Lavington. Now in those days, where there are now private dwellings there was a public house; some may recall it as the Chocolate Poodle, but even before that it boasted the bare, unpretentious, commonsense name of the Railway Hotel. It was not a place that you normally spent long in, with a not very welcoming landlord and with the characteristic appeal of the 1950s version of a gastropub – sweets, packets of crisps and the inevitable jar of pickled eggs. Nonetheless on this occasion my friend and I spent so long there that we failed to notice the arrival and departure of the train. The mists of time referred to earlier have also taken over, so I cannot remember whether it was then to the Wheatsheaf, The Churchill, The Horse and Jockey or The Bridge that we adjourned but I felt that my holiday had already started, even though it would, for the time being, be spent in Lavington.

It was said that the engine drivers did not like stopping at Lavington anyway as it was an interruption to their downhill progress all the way from Pewsey to Westbury, and the axe inevitably fell. I fear that we shall never see a rebuilding of such a convenient station, though our County Councillor clings to the hope that some kind of station/stop might one day be established in the Lydeway area. And what fun we shall all then have, some demanding a larger car park, and then others objecting to having one at all; even Great Bedwyn will pale in comparison.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

"Necessity is the mother of invention" goes the ancient proverb and it is true that difficult situations have inspired innovative solutions on many occasions in the past.

War, in particular, has stimulated invention but, although the initial purposes may have been belligerent, there are many wartime technologies that proved helpful in the subsequent peace. For example, the Second World War spawned jet engines and radar. Caterpillar tracks were much developed in the First World War. The American civil war saw the rapid growth of telegraph as a means of communication. The Crimean war established the principles of nursing.

On the other hand, some surviving wartime innovations may seem less welcome. Income tax was first introduced to finance the fight against Napoleon and, as you may have noticed, it is still here nearly two hundred years after that war was won.

The current economic turmoil may not be as life-threatening as war but I am optimistic that some good may come of it. One area rich with opportunity, in my view, is the burden of red tape. The public sector is weighed down with unnecessary regulation and, far too often, the process in dealing with an issue can take on more importance than the final outcome. I hope the current pressures will stimulate reform. For example, road management would be much easier if painting yellow lines, which cost little, did not require Traffic Regulation Orders, which cost a minimum of £5,000 each time. Certain road signs would be much cheaper to install and maintain if they did not require illumination, which is unnecessary in these days of reflective paint.

Where regulation is not an issue, Wiltshire Council has pioneered innovation. Pot hole repairs are now much more efficiently managed than a few years ago and, if we have another cold winter, our salt stocks should go much further by using more efficient spreading techniques.

Wiltshire is also pioneering leaner management structures and is saving money on offices. Councillors and staff alike are getting used to hot-desking. Services will be increasingly grouped on campuses, which should be more convenient as well as cost efficient.

If you are planning a frugal Christmas, I sincerely hope it will still be merry. As for the New Year, I hope it will be happy and as prosperous as present circumstances permit.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

At the November meeting the Council supported the proposal by Mr Wood of Littleton Panell to recruit volunteers for the establishment of a Community Speedwatch scheme for the village. The scheme is run by the Wiltshire Council and Wiltshire Police, using local volunteers trained to survey the speed of passing traffic. Details of drivers who are in excess of the speed limit are passed to the police who may then use enforcement action. Look out for further information when recruiting starts.

The Devizes Area Board has announced that grants of up to £300 can be made to local people coming together to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next year. Seen as an opportunity to promote community life, the scheme is supported by the Parish Council which has been asked to co-ordinate any applications made. CHEVERELL MAGNA PARISH COUNCIL

20 mph limit: The Parish Council now has the results for the latest speed test. These show a slight (less than 1 mph) increase over the May results, although they are noticeably better than before the 20 mph trial started. There is a greater concern over speeds outside Holy Trinity School where, despite the recent signage improvements, the average speed is still nearly 30 mph. This is totally unacceptable, and the Parish Council will be discussing the need for vigorous and well-publicised enforcement action with the Police and Wiltshire Council. The final speed check will be in the middle of January, after which a report will be made to Wiltshire Council in April/May. Hopefully, after that, the 20 mph limit will be confirmed. The final decision is likely to be informed by a Residents' Survey which, it is hoped, will be delivered to all houses in January.

HGV'S: The Parish Council has been in close contact with the Devizes Traffic Management Group and the Devizes Area Board, and there are indications that this pressure is now having an effect. New signage has gone up in Devizes indicating that the preferred HGV route is now down the A342 through Upavon to Salisbury, rather than the A360. If followed, this will be a great help. However, the Parish Council reminded the Traffic Group that:

- a. This change needs to be widely publicised, and existing signage over a wide area needs to be reviewed and updated, with the existing signage referring to the HGV route through Great Cheverell being removed.
- b. Similar action also needs to be taken with regard to northbound traffic coming from Salisbury and Westbury along the B3098.
- c. HGV's still travelling down the A360 need an alternative to avoid Great Cheverell and the Chocolate Poodle bridge.
- d.Ultimately, there should be *Unsuitable for HGV* signs at all entrances to Great Cheverell, and a 7.5 tonne weight limit through the village (excluding delivery traffic).

The Traffic Group has accepted all these points. Results should not be expected overnight, but they are promised, and the Parish Council will continue to press for improvements.

To help, residents are asked to make a note of any haulage companies seen driving through the village, so that Wiltshire Council can write to them and propose the new preferred routes, in a spirit of helpfulness rather than accusation. Please send this information to the Parish Clerk.

In summary, the Parish Council is reassured by the actions being taken by Wiltshire Council, and is confident that a resolution to this long-running saga is in sight. The position will remain under constant review, though.


