Dear Friends,

This week I watched Terry Pratchett's television programme about assisted dying. I imagine that a number of you will have done so as well. It is one of the big 'life and death' issues of our times and one about which people have widely differing views, often strongly held.

One of the many responses to the programme was a letter to The Times from Nigel Rawlinson, a doctor from Wick in Gloucestershire who has experience in A&E and more recently in palliative care.

He made three points: First, the case for assisted dying is selfish. It's all about "me", "I", and "my rights". There is no regard for the feelings of others. Second, it likens our humanity to that of cats and dogs. Human beings, and human dignity, are much more than that. Third, it portrays ultimate hopelessness.

The word 'dignity' was mentioned a lot on the programme. The Doctor asked, "What defines our dignity?" Advocates of assisted dying would say that it is "my personal right", being left alone and allowed to do "my wish". He thinks it is the opposite. Our dignity is given to us by others, by their love, their regard, value and care for us, whoever we are. Dignity is expressed for some by faith in God, and many more turn there than we are led to believe by this secular society of ours. Dignity values living, and not dying

Nigel Rawlinson sees this as the start of a rather different story – a story of hope.

We won't all agree with his sentiments, but I found much that made sense.

VILLAGE CARE AND LINK

If you have even a small amount of spare time please consider helping us as a volunteer driver or phone operator; we are in desperate need of both. Simply call us on any of the numbers below. Drivers are only asked to drive when they are available; that's why we need lots on our list.

We held our AGM on 23rd May, where we reported on the year's activities and reelected the committee. including two new members.

The year April 2010 to April 2011 saw the consolidation of our affiliation to the Link Project. One result of this was the receipt of a grant from Wiltshire Council and the NHS. All our drivers and other members now have CRB clearance and our systems have been brought up to date.

At the close of the year we had 33 registered drivers. Although this seems to be a large number, many cannot undertake the longer journeys and of course not everybody is available all the time.

Between 1st May 2010 and 31st March 2011 we took 113 requests for transport which resulted in 110 journeys and an approximate aggregate mileage of 2,143. Of these 18 were to Salisbury, 16 to three sites around Bath and 6 to Swindon.

The urgent aim this year is to recruit additional drivers and members to undertake a turn once a year to take the log book and telephone to accept requests for transport.

In 2012, on 21st April we are organising and sponsoring a Village Gala in and around West Lavington Village Hall. The idea is to invite all village organisations based in West Lavington, Littleton Panell and Little Cheverell to give them an opportunity to promote their activities. This will be a free, fun event, based on the theme of St George's Day and will not be used for fund raising. The Care Group will provide afternoon tea, promote its activities and hopefully recruit lots of new drivers.

I don't use compatible products, but the proper manufacturer's cartridges, although you can get compatible ones here as well. The cartridges are the cheapest I have found and they have never let me down yet.

Now, the Youth Club has a dedicated web page at Cartridge People and for every purchase that goes through the web page, the Youth Club will receive 10% of the value, helping us to raise some much needed funds.

Once on the site, press the pink button and then you can select your cartridges. They always list the compatible ones first, but just keep on scrolling and you'll get to the originals.

Or if you prefer to do it by phone you can phone 0845 850 1247 and make sure you quote the West Lavington Youth Club.

Under this scheme we can get £1 for every original branded cartridge which we collect for recycling, or 50p for a remanufactured cartridge or 75p for an original brand toner. (Unfortunately all this excludes Brother, Epson or Kodak, but anything else will be paid for)

So please let me have your empty cartridges for recycling and help us to raise money! Maybe you can collect them at work as well for us?


I have absolutely no hesitation in personally recommending this website to you. In addition to cartridges they supply the best laminating pockets, and I've also purchased photo paper from them over the years.

DEVIZES CHILD CONTACT CENTRE IS LOOKING FOR A NEW CENTRE COORDINATOR

Devizes Child Contact Centre provides a service for children whose parents have split up and who might otherwise not have contact with the parent with whom they don't live. The Centre is urgently looking for a new Centre Coordinator.

Evidence suggests that, when parents split up, children **Devizes Child** almost always do better in the long term when they maintain contact with both parents. However, when parents split up,

there can be real or imagined concerns about contact. In some cases, contact simply doesn't happen for an extended period and in those cases re-establishing it can be difficult.

Devizes Child Contact Centre provides a simple and low cost facility to help maintain and re-establish contact:

- space (St Andrew's church hall and associated rooms);
- toys, games and other play equipment;
- friendly volunteers on hand to ensure the smooth-running of the facility, resolve difficulties and provide some friendly support.

The Centre is open on the second and fourth afternoons of each month. The mother (usually) brings the child and there is a handover arrangement overseen by the volunteers. In some cases, this is complex and has to include organising things so that the separated parents don't actually have to see each other – while ensuring that the child (who is in the middle of all this) is made to feel as comfortable as possible.

The Centre has a volunteer Centre Coordinator who liaises with solicitors and ⁵ families and sets up the arrangements for families to use the Centre.

"However, the bad news for us is that our current Centre Coordinator has her house on the market preparatory to moving away from Devizes. So we are looking for someone who would like a volunteer role which provides both challenge and interest and which requires the ability to deal with sometimes complex situations in a tactful way."

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division There are two layers in which you might be interested in "planning". On a day-to-day basis, any of us may apply for planning permission to change our property, or we may have a view on someone else's application and wish to oppose or support it. Planning in this context is more accurately termed "development control".

It is a process which can arouse strong views and, on some occasions, can disturb social harmony between neighbours. What is allowed or disallowed, however, is not determined by opinion, whatever the passion of argument, but principally by national legislation and guidelines (a very large pile of paper!) and by the published local plan. For Eastern Wiltshire, the local plan is the Kennet Local Plan 2011, adopted in 2004 and amended by the Secretary of State in 2007. It is the job of the development control officers and, if necessary, the planning committee, to interpret and apply this local plan and the national rules and guidelines in each case with as much common sense as possible.

You may notice the date attached to the current local plan. Under national rules, a new plan must be prepared for Eastern Wiltshire and for the rest of the county within the next 18 months or so. For this reason, a consultation is now underway on the core strategy for Wiltshire for the period until 2026 (excluding South Wiltshire, which is ahead in the process for some reason). An initial consultation took place in 2009/10, since when government guidelines on regional strategy and housing needs have changed. This latest stage concentrates on the needs for housing and employment land over the next 15 years and invites comments about infrastructure requirements.

The draft core strategy makes some specific spatial proposals for the larger towns of Chippenham, Salisbury and Trowbridge but Devizes and other areas are discussed in more numerical terms (i.e. how many houses are needed rather than exactly where they should go). At a later date, Devizes and the surrounding parishes will be invited to prepare Neighbourhood Plans to apply the core strategy in a local context.

Planning at this level eventually determines what can be decided in the development control process in the future, so it important to us all. The consultation provides an opportunity for you to say what you think about the need for more jobs and houses in our area (not just for yourself but for the next generation) and about what infrastructure (roads, hospitals, schools, railway stations, etc.) is needed to support this.

To take part, go to http://consult,wiltshire.gov.uk/portal before 8th August. An exhibition of local proposals is being held at the Corn Exchange, Devizes on Monday 11th July between 2:00pm and 8:00pm when officers will be available to answer your questions.

The next meeting of the Devizes Area Board is on Monday 18th July at 7:00pm at Lavington School. All are welcome.

CHEVERELL MAGNA PARISH COUNCIL

Petition about HGV's: We are collecting signatures for a petition to reduce the number of HGVs diverted through Great Cheverell. We should be very grateful for your support when someone comes to your door, but if we have missed you, please sign the petition which is kindly being run at the shop.

Our suggestion to divert HGVs away from the A360, eastwards to the A342 and A345, will affect fewer communities and is a more efficient route for HGVs. This proposal will involve changes in signage and other measures and has been adopted by the Area Board. We now want action from them and Wiltshire Council to reduce the number of lorries using our village. Our ultimate aim is to get a weight restriction (7.5 tons) to limit HGV traffic here further.

20 mph Speed Limit: Thank you to all who keep to the new, lower speed limit through the village! This has produced positive results, as recent speed checks show that average speeds are lower. As expected, the decreases are small, but nevertheless a real achievement. Research shows that just an average 1 mph reduction in speed can result in a 5% reduction in casualties. There are still some motorists, however, who do not appear to see or care to adhere to 20 mph and still drive through here at 30 mph or more. We are therefore trying to emphasise the 20 mph limit and asking Wiltshire Council for additional signage changes, particularly by the school. If you have any suggestions for how to reinforce the 20 mph scheme and make it work better, please pass on your ideas to me.

This is an exciting new step for Holy Trinity and we are very glad that we have >been given the opportunity to become more independent in this way. WEST LAVINGTON WI

At an open meeting of the WI on 9th June, members and their guests were brought up to date on the Bustard Project by Lynn Derry. Efforts continue to establish a sustainable population but progress is slow, mainly due to the high mortality rate during the first year of life of a Bustard chick. These huge birds, a male with an eight foot wing span and the female with a six foot span, are members of the

crane family and the heaviest flying bird in the world. In fact they prefer to walk or run, being able to out-run a fox. There are some 7,000 Bustards in Russia and the farmers are paid to report nesting females and any abandoned eggs are removed and incubated. They usually lay two eggs which are little bigger than a hen's egg, in a scrape in the ground. Only a few each year reach Wiltshire and the young birds spend 30 days in guarantine before they can be released. They have a preference for young oilseed rape, cottage and cheddar cheese, mice and worms. They like vehicles and dislike humans and dogs. The Bustard appears on the County coat of arms and on a number of flags and badges. Although the birds have a liking for travel - two flew to France and others to Dorset, Oxford and Somerset - they all return to the Plain. Numbers are presently in the low teens but a grant from the EU is helping this on-going re-introduction project, the only one of its type. However, the funding received has to be matched by fund raising, donations and visits including to the new visitor centre.

On a somewhat different theme, the next meeting of the WI takes place on Thursday the 14th July, the subject being British Cheeses with samples. Visitors are always welcome to our meetings in the Giles Room at the Village Hall starting at 7:30pm Helena Warnock
