Dear Friends,

Those of us who are fortunate always to have been in full-time paid employment don't fully comprehend what it is like; each week still has 168 hours to fill.

It is easy to dismiss the Prime Minister's 'The Big Society', but at its heart it is about helping others in order that society might become a better place. Florence Nightingale was someone who devoted her life to helping others; she did so because she felt, from the age of 17, that that was what God had called her to do. She came from a wealthy family but turned her back on a life of parties and privilege. Instead she discovered that there is joy and fulfilment serving others whilst not being so concerned about our own wants and desires and about what other people think of us. Today those in nursing and far beyond remain greatly indebted to her example.

Anyone who is involved with raising money for a good cause will know that it's a challenging task and, in current times, I fear such fund raisers are finding that the job is not getting any easier. Yet the generosity of many, many people in our community who give voluntarily is very impressive.

Equally impressive is the generosity of so many people who give their time as volunteers. The number of institutions that rely on volunteers is far too long to list here but the beneficiaries include all of us, whether we are young or old, able bodied or handicapped, infirm or fit, rich or poor or anything in between.

Most of these volunteer heroes receive no praise or recognition and some, from time to time, even have to put up with criticism as they undertake their civic roles.

As the public sector across the board is facing cuts in the wake of the huge national budget deficit, the burden falling on the voluntary sector is ever greater. The latest local example is the call for volunteers to help man the libraries. Needless to say, this community is rising to the challenge and the response to support the Market Lavington library is commendable. It may even be able to stay open longer as a result.

It is true that some regard the new calls for volunteers to be an imposition but it is equally true that personal satisfaction, and some efficiency, may be derived if interested and committed persons are able to contribute directly to the delivery of services locally rather than calling upon remote institutions in Trowbridge or London or Brussels to meet our needs.

DAUNTSEY'S AIDED PRIMARY SCHOOL



The first half of the Spring Term has once again been a busy one at DAPS. Aside from classroom based learning, Year 6 learners have begun swimming at Dauntsey's pool, after school clubs are operating as normal and we are continuing with our programme of celebration assemblies each Friday for parents.

On Thursday 3rd February the school ran a highly successful Maths Day. The children experienced a variety of maths activities that supported and enhanced their learning, including board games, dice games, problem solving and a whole school maths quiz! A great day's learning was had by all.

Mr Rutter recently held a Maths Evening for all parents where he outlined the delivery of teaching and learning of Maths across the school and the importance of mental maths. The feedback was hugely positive and Mr Rutter will be running the second of two evenings after half term, the focus of the second session being multiplication and division.

On Wednesday 2nd February twenty children attended a fun and informative session at Braeside Education Centre, where they worked on the Powers of Learning initiative with Dr Tom Robson; these children are now known as 'The Learning Detectives'. The children had a fantastic day, learning more about the Powers of Learning and how they help us to become better learners. This term, we have worked on our Emerald Power. The impact is clearly evident across the whole school, with all children really enjoying this fun and inspiring initiative. Dr Tom will come into school to work alongside our learning detectives to see the Powers of Learning in operation.

Since January the school has been welcoming its governors into school. This 'Governor of the Month' has been successful so far. The governors for January and February have been able to pop into school, meet the school council, dip into lessons and discuss issues with staff members. This initiative will continue throughout this year.

This term we gave parents the opportunity to come into school to share lunch with their children. Each class took turns inviting their parents to come in on a Wednesday to join us for a roast dinner. The feedback has been very encouraging from both children and parents.

Over the past six months, the school has supported the West Lavington Twinning Association in their bid to Twin with St Pierre d'Autils. Orinoco class have been in contact with their village school, building links between the two schools via e-mail. The children have been sharing information in French, utilising skills the children are taught in lessons. We hope to develop this link further with our partner school over the coming months.

The children are now ready for their half term holiday, beginning on Monday 21st February and we look forward to welcoming the children back to school on Monday 2 28th February.

LAVINGTON PRE-SCHOOL

During Term 1 we were looking at the "Night Sky" which the children thoroughly enjoyed making various space rockets, planets and stars. The children then took an interest in "mini beasts" and got busy making lady birds and spiders, counting spots and legs. We Lavington continue working with the children using the Jolly Phonics. We Pre-school have introduced a listening game called Noisy Neighbours, where members of staff make sounds out of sight of the children, and the

children have to guess what the sound is. This game is intended to get the children to sit quietly and to listen carefully which forms the basic foundations to learning. We have also worked on size and position recognition and we continue to have our PE sessions in the school hall.

Next term we begin our new topic which is based on the book The Window. The book looks at how a boy sees things differently through the window as he grows up. We will be looking at how we may see things change as we ourselves grow up and change, how things change when day turns to night, the seasons changing and how things may look different outside a window in different countries. We will discuss the various aspects of this topic with the children and take their lead as to which direction we go.

We are sad to say that after several years Sally has decided to move on to pastures new. We want to thank Sally for her hard work and wish her the very best in her new post. We will be looking at recruiting a new member of staff who is at least NVQ Level 2, to join our Bank Staff.

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH Take and Read

This year marks the 400th anniversary "Authorised" or "King James" version of the Bible, first published in 1611. This certainly wasn't the first translation of the Bible into English, but it has been one of the most influential. Prior to the Reformation in the sixteenth century, church services were held in Latin and the Bible was only available in a Latin translation. This meant that the Bible was a closed book for ordinary people. However, Reformers such as Martin Luther in Germany and William Tyndale in England wanted to make the treasures of the Bible available to everybody to read. They carefully translated the Bible from the original Greek and Hebrew into the language of the people.

The "King James" translation of the Bible was very much based on the earlier efforts of William Tyndale. It is called the "King James Version" because King James I of England commissioned this edition of the Bible. The work took around fifty scholars seven years to complete the task of producing a fresh English translation of the Holy Scriptures. Their efforts were worth it. The King James Version soon became the Bible of the English speaking peoples. It opened up the wonders of God's Word for all to read with its much admired combination of accuracy in translation, clarity of style and literary beauty.

The King James Bible helped make modern English the language that it is today. Boyd Tonkin, The Independent's literary editor called the King James version of the Bible, "a masterpiece of English prose" and so it is. If you have a long neglected copy of the King James Bible lying around the house, perhaps this might be a good time to dust it off and give it a read. But remember, the Bible is more than a literary classic. It is the best of books with the best of messages, "the holy scriptures are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus." (1 Timothy 3:15 KJV).
