### Dear Friends,

We all live with deadlines – this is being written on the 19th April, just hours before the Magazine deadline; journalists live with deadlines all the time.

In 1954 a 30 year old family counsellor and writer Dorothy Law Nolte was facing a deadline for her regular weekly column on raising families in her local Californian newspaper. Under pressure, sitting in her kitchen, she wrote 'Children learn what they live'. It went on to be translated into 35 languages; this is a shortened version:

If children live with criticism, they learn to condemn.

If children live with hostility, they learn to fight.

If children live with ridicule, they learn to be shy.

If children live with shame, they learn to feel guilty.

If children live with tolerance, they learn to be patient.

If children live with encouragement, they learn confidence.

If children live with praise, they learn to appreciate.

If children live with fairness, they learn justice.

If children live with security, they learn to have faith.

If children live with approval, they learn to like themselves.

If children live with acceptance and friendship, they learn to find love in the world.

Over 50 years later, bringing up children remains as challenging as ever. In a society where children were definitely 'seen but not heard', Jesus had a very high view of them. When his disciples tried to send some children away, he rebuked, 'Let the little children come to me... for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these' (Matthew 19:14).

### A CORDIAL WELCOME TO SUMMER



With the arrival of late May and early June comes the Elderflower, the source of a variety of concoctions, ranging from elderflower champagne, elderflower wine and even elderflower fritters or elderflower cheesecake. We have at various times made the first two, with various results – refreshing non-alcoholic fizz, a delightful white wine, and occasionally an explosion in the outhouse that can blow a hole in the stratosphere, but the real joy, unless

you are an alcoholic, is the Elderflower Cordial.

For those of you who have never made it I humbly offer the recipe provided by the mistress of the house.

The ingredients are:

30 heads of elderflowers, to be gathered on a dry sunny, day

4 lbs sugar

3 oz citric acid

Juice of two lemons

2 pints boiling water

Put the citric acid and the juice of the lemons in a plastic bucket, adding what's left of the lemons themselves and pour the boiling water over them, mixing well. Then add the sugar and stir until it has been dissolved. Add the elderflower heads, pushing them well down. Cover.

Stir every day for five days, at the end of which pour the contents through a sieve into a bottle, repeating the process if it seems to be too cloudy.

Using a plastic bottle you can freeze it but it will keep well in a glass bottle. A small amount added to water makes a delightful drink. I once even tried it with gin and, if nothing else, it was better than slimline tonic.

If it doesn't taste very nice, then you have either picked it when it was raining or you have picked cow parsley by mistake.



### A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

By the time you read this, you may have voted in the AV referendum. If not, and if there is still time, I urge you to do so.

National referendums are rare in this country. The first and only one I have ever taken part in was in 1975 when the question was whether the UK should remain in the European Economic Community. The answer then was Yes and that decision still underpins the status quo, although issues around our EU membership rumble on 36 years later.

About ten years ago, there was a spate of local referendums (37, apparently) in towns and cities on the subject of whether or not they should have an elected mayor with strong executive powers. 13 said Yes and



24 said No. Next year, we will be asked to elect a local police commissioner, which has some parallels to the election of a mayor, but that is an idea for which no referendum has been held.

Those of you who would like more referendums are likely to have that wish fulfilled. The Localism Bill, now before Parliament, will give people the right to suggest votes on any local issue that they think is important. Local authorities and other public bodies will be required to take the outcome into account as they make their decisions.

In addition, if a local authority proposes to raise taxes faster than a government-approved rate, local people will have the right to approve or to veto the rise in a referendum.

The Localism Bill also includes new provisions for the election of executive mayors, so that idea has not gone away. I don't think these measures are aimed at a town like Devizes, where Pete Smith has been an excellent mayor and where Sue Evans is about to take up the ancient, honourable but strictly ceremonial role. I wish her well in her post.

There is much else in the Localism Bill, particularly about the planning process. We are approaching the final phases of the Wiltshire core strategy where the planning rules apply, so I will probably write more about that in the coming months.

A Lesson in Forgiveness

A church member had fallen out with his grown up son. The fault was largely the son's. He had left home and made rather a mess of his life. However, realising the error of his ways, the son wished to be reconciled to his father. The father was having none of it. He turned his son away, refusing to have anything to do with him.

In desperation the son asked his father's pastor to see what he could do to heal the family rift. The wise old minister visited the unforgiving man. He knew just the Scripture that would speak directly to the situation. It was Luke 15:11-32, the parable of the prodigal son. The pastor began to read the passage to his church member, but he took the liberty of altering Jesus' parable. Rather than the father welcoming the prodigal son with open arms, his version went like this, "The father told his son that he was not welcome home, 'You have done wrong in wasting your share of the family inheritance. Now you must live with the consequences. Be gone!" The pious church member piped up, "Hey, that's not what is says in my Bible." "Oh yes it is!" Replied the minister. The penny dropped. The unforgiving father had allowed his resentment at his son's behaviour to govern his life rather than the Bible. Thus rebuked, he forgave his son and they were reconciled.

It is all to easy to pay lip service to the Bible while failing to live out its teaching, especially when its teaching is hard for us to put into practice. Perhaps that is especially the case when it comes to forgiving others who have wronged us in some way. We ask God to forgive our sins and he does because Christ died that we might be forgiven. If that is the case, then we should be quick to offer forgiveness to others. Being a Christian is all about receiving and giving forgiveness, "And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you." (Ephesians 4:32).

### **MR MAC**

...Or should it be Mr Mc? For He was indeed Eric McAbendroth who, along with Mrs Mac, held sway in the paper shop in the High Street of West Lavington for over forty years until his retirement in 1990. The shop served as a double source of news in the sense that it provided most of us not only with our daily papers but it (and he) also kept us abreast with all the more crucial – and indeed more interesting - events within the village. If Mr and Mrs Mac were involved in our lives we were as much involved in theirs to such an extent that on one occasion, when he was not well enough to do his daily round, people rallied round to do his deliveries for him. There were other reasons for visiting the shop, not least among them his competence at repairing our watches and clocks. But it was often simply a place you dropped into, if only to chew the fat with Mr or Mrs.

Less well known was his own war experience, especially the fact that, as the Flight Engineer on a bomber mission to Dusseldorf, at great personal risk he saved the lives of the crew by putting out a fire in the plane, being justly awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal for great gallantry. His death at 92 last month is also not widely known so it is recorded here as a token of our respect and affection for a good man and his wife who, at the age of 91, has survived him.
