Dear Friends,

Church bells are a particularly evocative sound across the villages of our nation. It is said that during the Napoleon's Austrian campaign his army advanced to within six miles of the town of Feldkirch. It looked as though his men would capture the town without resistance. But as Napoleon's army advanced toward their object in the night, the Christians of Feldkirch gathered in their little church to pray. It was Faster Eve.

The next morning at sunrise the bells of the village pealed out across the countryside. Napoleon's army, not realising what day it was, thought that the Austrian army had moved into the town in the night and the bells were ringing in celebration. Napoleon ordered his army to retreat and a battle never took place.

As Easter is celebrated again this month, churches and cathedrals around the world will ring their bells – not to sound Jesus Christ's death knell, but to declare his victory over death. He is the risen Lord. Because of him our greatest enemy – death itself – has been defeated.

To any observer of the crucifixion, the figure spread-eagled on the cross, robbed of all freedom and powerless, must have appeared to represent total defeat. But the events of two days later changed everything. Jesus' resurrection promises the believer also that death can be overcome, and that new life can be ours because of what Jesus has done for us.

A WARNING TO DOG OWNERS

From a dog owner received just before publication

My wife has just had a horrible experience walking our dog on Pear Tree Hill that I thought might warrant putting into the magazine as a warning to others in the village that use this popular walk. This is a regular venue for us, and we've recently seen an upturn in some fairly anti-social behaviour from dirt-bikes, drivers who let their dogs out and then drive along the field to "walk" them etc. over the past few months. We recently asked the Ranger who occasionally patrols this area what the situation is here with public access, and he clarified that vehicles actually have no right of way here, and the military has basically tolerated responsible people walking their dogs, not people driving them in this manner or dirt-bikes whizzing across the paths.

Tonight my wife walked our dog as usual, when a green Landrover came up the hill, let out three large dogs (possibly an Alsatian, Springer and another), and then proceeded to drive along with them running around the car. My wife gestured to them to be careful as they were driving onto the field as our dog was running back to her, across the path of the car. They ignored her despite being only a matter of yards away, and her shouting and waving at them. Our dog ran back to my wife and the Land Rover ran straight over her - by sheer chance the wheel pushed her into a rut made by military vehicles, which (as it has been dry weather) was deep and hard enough to save her life (she is, luckily, a small breed). The occupants (two men), stopped momentarily and looked at my wife (she was now directly beside the car), one said something to the other and then they sped off, ignoring my wife shouting and waving her arms at them. As far as they knew they had run over and killed our dog, and showed no intent to stop.

My wife was completely shaken by this, and fortunately two responsible dog owners were close by who spoke to her, reassured her, and had also witnessed people "driving" their dogs in this manner before they commented that they were going to speak to a local reporter about this too. We are going to contact the Ranger again as well, and think others should be warned about this dangerous practice (and this vehicle in particular).

WEST LAVINGTON MAJOR MAINTENANCE WORKS 2012

Wiltshire Council will be undertaking essential carriageway maintenance works along the A360 in the villages of Littleton Panell and West Lavington. These works will be undertaken by Ringway Infrastructure Services working on behalf of Wiltshire Council.

This scheme will commence on Monday 26 March 2012 for duration of approximately

Works will take place predominantly along High Street, Littleton Panell, and Church Street, West Lavington. Works include drainage and kerbing repairs, footway and carriageway resurfacing.

Drainage and footway works will be undertaken using temporary traffic signals operated manually as and when required during week days and Saturdays if necessitated.

Carriageway resurfacing operations will take place towards the end of the programme during restricted days (09:30 to 15:30) using temporary traffic signals combined with a convoy system, and restricted evening (19:00 to midnight) temporary road closures.

Provisional closure dates are listed below but keep in mind resurfacing operations are weather dependent. Occasionally dates are revised; in the event of the programme changing revised dates will be displayed on advanced information signage erected on site

- Monday to Thursday, May 28-31
- Thursday and Friday, June 7-8
- Monday and Tuesday, June 11-12
- Tuesday, June 19

Access and egress will be maintained for residents and local businesses during the temporary closures; dedicated Traffic Management Operatives at the start and end of the working area will monitor access and give motorists assistance. These people are there to look after the safety of the travelling public and the safety of the workforce.

We apologise for any inconvenience which may be caused during the works, but I trust you will appreciate the necessity for these essential works to maintain Wiltshire's road network.



A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Anarchists might not agree with me but I think a good local development plan is essential to prepare for an orderly future. A plan ensures that the places where we live and work are organised and developed according to our needs and are not spoilt in the process. The alternative would be a free for all and the results of that can still be seen in the ribbons of pre-war development that spread along our main roads before the Town & Country Planning Act of 1947 put a stop to the sprawl. It's not been perfect since, but it could have been much worse.

In recent years, development in east Wiltshire has been controlled by the Kennet Local Plan 2011 (which was written in about 2004). It is, in my view, a well written document with guidelines on most relevant issues, although it was rather emasculated a few years ago when many of its clear, straightforward policies were usurped by well meaning but vague government waffle.

Even the best plans need updating and this is now being done on a county wide basis. The process leading to a Core Strategy for Wiltshire is getting closer to its conclusion. Consultation on the final draft closes on 2 April (so by the time you read this you have probably missed it). The next stage is a public hearing in the autumn in front of an inspector to be followed, all being well, by adoption in early 2013.

Unlike earlier plans, the Core Strategy does not provide much detail on an area by area basis. In the Devizes Community Area, for example, the draft plan proposes that a total of 205 new houses should be built in the rural areas in the next 15 years but it does not say where they should go or what type they should be.

Instead, the Localism Act now allows towns and parishes to prepare their own Neighbourhood Plan if they want one. Such a plan would cover housing and employment developments and infrastructure provision for the next 15 years and will be used in making decisions on planning applications in the area it covers. It will be adopted after public consultations and a referendum, so there will be ample opportunity to make your opinions known. How much new housing is needed in your village by 2026? How many affordable homes? Where should they go? What community facilities will be needed? Etc. etc.

The procedures for some of this are not yet clear in every respect (at least to me). The regulations under the Localism Act have yet to emerge and, at the time of writing, the government's updated National Planning Policy Framework is still awaited. Keep reading the parish magazine for more local information!

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

As you read this, hopefully drainage and footway works on the A360 should have begun. 40-50 drainage repairs need to be undertaken with particular emphasis at Duck Street and Russell Mill Lane. Aduct needs to be installed under the carriageway along the narrows by the church to connect the two BMS signs. This should be done first, and will be one of the areas that will require manual traffic lights. Ironwork, such as grills and covers, need to be reset and more dropped kerbs installed. The work will cover the whole length of both villages from the railway bridge at Littleton Panell to the end of the speed restrictions at West Lavington. At 2.4 kms this is the largest stretch of maintenance undertaken by Wiltshire Council in one go and 2,500 tons of road surface will be removed.

The resurfacing of the carriageway will follow and of course there will be some disruption. Mr Woods informed the Council that training for his volunteers on community speed watch is progressing well, and he hoped they may be operational by April.

As part of the Councils corporate plan we are considering asking The Churchill if they would open a coffee shop for the village. This would only be possible for them between the hours of 11 a.m. to 12 midday daily, and before they commit to this it would be useful to know if people would be interested in making use of this facility as an accessible meeting place. News & Views, April 2012 HOLY TRINITY CE PRIMARY ACADEMY

We have been invited by Wiltshire College to be part of a project they are working on. The ancient "road" or network of paths that stretches from the Thames to our own county, called the Ridgeway, is the focus of the project. The project involves contributions from many different organisations, and will include art work, soundscapes and expert views.



Our children will provide art work and also some short "sound bites" on what it might have been like on the Ridgeway in the Neolithic times.

Examples of this work will be put online, on the County webpage for the Ridgeway project, and some examples will be part of the "Location Aware" phone app which can be accessed by walkers along the Ridgeway. We are always delighted to be part of projects that involve the wider community – and give our children great experiences as well.

We like to make sure our children have lots of opportunities to take part in different activities. A twelve week Ukele Club was offered through this current term - this has been very popular and included making recorders out of carrots! In the summer term we will be offering a six week clay modelling course. Our regular clubs include judo, dance, various sports clubs, handbells, music, art, chess and gardening.

There have been several trips linked to the class themes for learning this term – including a trip to Avebury Manor to support work on "Giants" and one to Southampton to learn more about the Titanic.

We invited parents to come into school and "have a go" at some past papers of the SATS tests that their children will write in Year 2 and Year 6. It is interesting for people to see the extremely high standards that the average primary school child is expected to reach at age 7 and age 11. The following are some examples of Year 6 maths SATS problems:

- Calculate 7/16 of 288
- Sarah had a bag of cherries. She ate 5 cherries, then gave half of what she had left to Liam. Liam ate 5 of his cherries, then gave half of what he had left to Amy. Amy got 2 cherries. How many cherries did Sarah have in her bag at the start?
- An iced cake costs 10p more than a plain cake. Sarah bought two of each cake.
 They cost £1 altogether. What is the cost of an iced cake?

Good Friday?

Crucifixion was reserved for the lowest of the low, rightless non-Roman citizens who had been sentenced to suffer a most excruciating death for their crimes. As a method of execution it was designed to humiliate and degrade as well as kill. The Roman orator Cicero wrote, "the very word 'cross,' let it be far removed from not only the bodies of Roman citizens but even from their thoughts, their eyes, and their ears."

On that basis it might be thought that the Christian church would want to hush up the fact that its founder, Jesus Christ was crucified. The opposite is the case. Early Christian preachers placed the crucifixion of Jesus Christ at the very heart of their message. In fact, Paul wrote, "May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ".

The reason why the apostles made Jesus' scandalous death so central to their message is that they believed that he did not die for his own sins as a failed Messiah, but for ours, as the world's true Saviour. The cross of Jesus is the great revelation of the love of God. He sent his Son to die in our place that we might be forgiven and put right with him. That's what is so good about Good Friday.

And of course, Good Friday was not the end of Jesus' story. On the first Easter Sunday he rose again from the dead so that those who hope in him may have everlasting life.
