Dear Friends,

Some of us have the enormous privilege of being parents. Perhaps our greatest dread is that something happens to one of them, worse that they die before we do; and worst of all that they die in tragic circumstances.

Last year the six week trial of the serial child murderer Robert Black ended with his conviction for the murder of nine year old Jennifer Cardy in 1981. Her parents had waited 30 years for justice, but they hadn't allowed their daughter's killer to embitter them and ruin their lives. Pat Cardy said that Jennifer "loved life" but had a deeper side to her: "One of the lovely things about Jennifer was how much she wanted to know about heaven."

Jennifer's parents said that Robert Black had never once acknowledged their presence in court during the trial. However they revealed that they had prayed for him. "I've said many times that one of the lovely promised in the Scriptures is that the Lord gives a peace in this world that passes understanding," Andrew Cardy said.

I would like to think that I might have acted like the Cardys did, but I'm not at all sure that I could have. Their attitude was a wonderful testimony to the challenge - and promise - of Jesus' in the Lord's Prayer that as we forgive the sins (trespasses) of others, so we will receive God's forgiveness in order that we can live lives free from bitterness and regret, whatever the circumstances; how liberating is that?

A little story - many years ago in the 1950s when Fred Nutland was the signalman, I was friendly with his daughter, Cynthia (who very sadly died this year), and together with two other girls (Mary Davis was one of them), we were going on holiday to Newquay.

Mr Nutland got permission from the authorities (I think it was GWR?) to stop the Cornish Riviera express at Lavington Station for us to get on the train!!! I remember he actually told a fib about the number of people embarking as it should have been an application for no less than 11 prospective passengers to stop a train, and of course there were only four of us! Steam trains in those days - the Cornish Riviera express travelling through non-stop every day. The train windows that day were opened, and lots of people looked out wondering why the train had stopped, only to see us four teenagers getting on!! Happy days - and we had a great holiday.

To summarize – It's probably not surprising to note that 2011 was the driest and the warmest year in my 34 years of recording. As for rainfall, 2011 produced slightly less than half the total for 2002 which is a fairly good illustration of the contrast over a few years. Until 2011, 2010 was the driest year for us, so there is a lot of rain to catch up on hopefully at some stage. As for temperatures I thought it interesting to compare Christmas day 2010 at 1 p.m. and that of 2011 at the same time; the former was -1.7 C and the latter was + 11.1 C! The average temperature for 2011 is just 0.2C higher than the former warmest year of 2006. Snowfall was virtually nil over the year except for a dusting on January 3rd and a few wet flakes on December 14th and 16th here again quite a contrast to 2010.

Can 2012 come up with as many surprises as 2011! Guess we shall have to wait and see.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

As I write, the weather is still unseasonably warm. Indeed, so far we have had only two or three mornings of frost all winter. By the time you read this, of course, all that may have changed, but the contrast with last winter is remarkable.

One effect has been that Wiltshire council has had to make little use of its resources to cater with bad weather. Last year, on the other hand, the Council deployed over 200 staff and 84 contract staff using 48 salters/snow ploughs. In addition, 42 farmers contributed with snow ploughs and snow blowers. The salt used weighed as much as 1070 London double decker buses and the distance salted was the equivalent of four times around the world.

The decision to salt the roads is taken by the duty engineer who receives data from various sources. The Metrological Office provides regular forecasts and there are a number of unmanned weather stations in the county that also provide information to the engineer.

When sub zero temperatures are forecast the severity is evaluated together with the changing weather pattern. The decision to salt may be restricted to a particular part of Wiltshire or may apply to the whole County.

One problem that occurs occasionally is when temperatures are forecast to drop but a shower is predicted shortly afterwards. If the roads are salted too early, the salt will be washed off by the rain. Ideally, the salting is done immediately after the rain has stopped but the roads can be very hazardous for a while if the rain freezes on the surface.

If you want to lend a hand yourself by putting down salt from a bin, it's worth remembering that the effective rate of application is a tablespoon per metre rather than by the shovelful. Large quantities have no beneficial effect in melting ice but do have a negative effect on vegetation in the verges, on water courses and to the floors of shops and homes when it is tramped in.

It is a great help to us if Parish Councils and individuals let Wiltshire Council know when a bin is empty before and during bad weather. Requests can be made by telephoning freephone 0800 23 23 23 during working hours.

We have been advised that work to fit time switches to the units of street lighting, which Wiltshire Council have agreed to turn off between midnight and 5.30 a.m., will start at the end of January. The assessment did show that, although most of our suggestions were accepted, lighting units along the 30 mph zone of the A360 will have to remain on at all times, as well as those at every street junction. This, we are informed, is a legal requirement and I am sorry some people will be disappointed. Thanks to our willing volunteers, the footpath survey is almost complete and, based on that information, we will endeavour this Spring to improve the village paths. May I remind all householders that now is a good time to cut back the hedges overhanging the footpaths, before the birds start to nest.

Lastly a plea from one of our local landowners concerned about dog-fouling. She writes:

The disease spread to cattle by faeces is Neosporosis. This causes 10% of all abortions in cattle in this country. To control once it is in a herd involves killing off cows and heifers that test positive to antibodies; this would be pointless if the land was re-infected by contaminated dogs. The only way to protect cattle is by people being scrupulous in cleaning their faeces off the land. Farmers are offended by the practice of people bringing dogs on to grass that animals eat in order to avoid fouling in their own gardens. A wake-up call for us all, I feel.

We are still collating ideas for the Jubilee in June, so if you have ideas or are eager to run an event, do let us know.

Neighbourhood Watch: In order to assist in preventing crime in our village the Parish Council are hoping to set up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme and are seeking volunteers. If you would like to serve your community in this way please let us know.

Dog Fouling: There have been reports of dog fouling in Green Lane and CHEM 6 footpath. It has also been reported that people are leaving bags of dog excrement alongside the Play Area. The Parish Council would again urge dog owners to act responsibly and clean up after their dogs, thus avoiding a heavy fine, but more importantly removing the risk of serious disease to children who might be playing in the area. Please take the bags home and put them in your rubbish bins in order that they may be disposed of safely.

Some terms we have a theme that is adopted by all the classes in the school, like our Carnival theme last term. But sometimes it is fun to let each class choose their own theme for learning as we have done this term. The following are the

This is especially the case when they are tempted to be dishonest in order to avoid being punished for being naughty. Of course, when the lie unravels, they find themselves in double trouble. As the Good Book says, "Be sure your sins will find you out."

Relationships are based on trust and relations soon sour when it turns out that someone has not been honest with us. When governments casually break their manifesto promises the electorate quickly becomes disillusioned. The phone hacking scandal has broken the bond of trust between newspapers and their readers. The Christian faith recognises the vital importance of honesty. One of the Ten Commandments tells us, "You shall nor bear false witness".
