Dear Friends,

The Government is currently holding a nationwide consultation on same sex marriage and in particular whether gay couples will be able to marry in the UK and have the same rights as married men and women.

This is of course a highly contentious subject on which opposing views are deeply held.

Many have come to welcome same sex civil partnerships as a public affirmation and recognition of the love and commitment between two people. Others go further and share the view of our own Bishop of Salisbury in support of same sex marriage.

One of first religious leaders to voice his opposition to any change in the law was the Archbishop of York, John Sentamu. He has spoken in defence of the traditional understanding of matrimony as a God-given 'relationship between a man and a woman.' In this he has had the support of many within the C.of E., the RC Church and beyond. Almost 450,000 have so far signed the 'Coalition for Marriage' Petition.

In an interview with Andrew Marr on BBC 1 on 9th December last year, the Archbishop quoted part of a letter he'd received from someone in a civil partnership. The end of the letter said, 'Having read what you said, I find myself agreeing with you. I believe that marriage is for a man and woman and I personally feel no desire to emulate it – I accept my relationship is different. As long as I don't suffer from any form of discrimination, legally, economically, socially – I am happy.' John Sentamu continued, "This is someone in a civil partnership; he is glad and he is worried that our changes may be different. So if in the end you are going to listen to all those different kinds of voices – for me it is not a question of equality but of justice. Once matters are just, you have to say to yourself – do you really need to do this?"

Some of us have grave reservations about these proposals; one concern is that clergy and churches who are unhappy conducting same sex marriages may in the future face prosecution under anti-discrimination legislation, despite current assurances from the Government to the contrary. There is a need to engage constructively with those holding opposing views, but fundamentally different interpretations of the Bible mean that this will remain a subject on which Christians will continue to disagree.



NIPPED IN THE BUD

I suppose there are not many people reading this who will have been involved in the succession of Jubilee and Coronation events of the 1930s, as I was, to a degree which brought home to me the possibilities and frustrations that life would hold for me thereafter.

I was at the time at a local Primary School where it had been decided that, along with other schools in the town, a float should join the cavalcade proceeding through the town and representing a familiar nursery rhyme. As you can see in the accompanying picture our school had gone for one of the old favourites.

Mary, Mary, quite contrary, How does your garden grow, With silver bells and cockle shells And pretty maids all in a row.



It is not easy to fit me into this image, even at the age of five or so. No female costume could have converted me into a "pretty maid", especially as I was in the process of losing my first set of teeth. However, the powers-thatwere, decided that in the interests of sexual equality, a couple of gnomes would not be out of place in Mary's garden and so the choice fell upon myself and Paddy Lloyd, who lived at No.32. In the picture you will see him upstaging me, as I hover shyly in the background, and I would like you to notice that he had occupied the offside of the vehicle, leaving me on the nearside, a fact which was to have some significance as the day wore on. Not merely was he the stronger personality but he was also attracted by the girl who sat on his right, whereas my particular girl friend at the time,

bearing the succulent name of Grace Crisp, had not been selected, possibly owing to the close resemblance between her countenance and the back of the truck on which we were travelling.

I cannot remember much about the early part of the journey except that I sat, somewhat morosely, clutching my fishing net and reduced by sheer boredom to a convincing impression of petrifaction. However, as we neared the centre of the town, the pressure of the crowds grew to such intensity that stops became frequent. It was at one of these stops that an incident occurred which transformed my day, and ultimately my view of life. You will remember that I was on the side nearest the pavement with my fishing net dangling dangerously near the spectators; picture then my astonishment when someone sprang from the crowd and appeared to be reaching for my fishing net. I was about to withdraw it when I suddenly realised what was happening. He was putting money in the net! This charitable action sparked off a succession of donations, and suddenly I became aware of the vast possibilities

that lay before me. For the rest of the journey I was no longer a piece of stone; instead I occupied my time stabbing and prodding at passing spectators, hauling in catch after catch and glaring fiercely at those who had not the grace to make a contribution. By the time we got back to school I had amassed the sum of eight shillings and seven pence halfpenny and Paddy Lloyd hadn't picked up a penny. I cannot begin to tell you the treasures that I already had planned for putting that sum

to profitable use, and I believe that I would from that day have become a financier of note but for the inevitable intrusion from the adult world. I was informed that the money, removed forcibly on my return, was not to be spent on such vital necessities as marbles, chocolate or comics, but was to be thrown away on needless presents for some wretched child malingering in hospital with some tiresome incurable disease. They even took away my fishing net.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Governments often get criticised for making decisions without consultation but I have to report that my in-tray is groaning at present under the weight of large government consultation documents. Although they do not make light reading, in most cases the policies being proposed are welcome.

The clear trend is that central government is delegating powers of various kinds to local authorities. In Wiltshire, I think that can only be a good thing. I say that not just because Wiltshire is a good council but because, at last, Wiltshire has a chance of getting a fairer share of the national cake. For too long, government has taken our taxes and we have had precious little in return.

Take highways, for example. No major road schemes have been undertaken in the county since the Semington by-pass was opened in 2004. The cost of preparing a road scheme is very high but the development costs have to be spent before application can be made to government for inclusion in their funding programme. Such an application is a lottery where the other players are local authorities across the whole country. If government declines the scheme, the council has to write off a large sum of money with nothing to show for it. Wiltshire has rarely been at the top of the government's priority list.

Now, however, government is proposing to delegate decision making on major transport schemes to local authorities working in concert with Local Enterprise Partnerships. In our case, that is the Wiltshire and Swindon LEP. That means that after 2015, some money will be available each year for us to share with Swindon. It may not be enough to upgrade our entire network immediately, but at least we can be confident of doing something.

Similar ideas are being discussed about some local railway services (where the relevant powers may be transferred to groups of authorities) and about the administration of grants to bus operators.

Of course, none of these powers are worth anything if they are not accompanied by money and we all know that money is short. If I can return to the food analogy, we in Wiltshire may get crusts rather than cake but at least they will be our crusts and we would no longer be starving.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

There is so much happening in the Parish at the moment it is difficult to know where to begin! By now you will have seen the roadworks along the A360, and already seen some of the improvements to footways taking shape. It is hoped the short-term inconvenience is not too much trouble. Rights of way are also in the news again, and again because of reports of dog fouling along footpaths. Just a few irresponsible owners are spoiling these spaces for everyone else – please "Bag it, Bin it, and Take it home!".

Could I also ask horse owners not to travel on footpaths – Footpath 15 is again affected, and after many past warnings a more permanent solution will now be necessary. The council have also congratulated the Community Speedwatch team – initial training by the Police is now complete, and the first deployments are due very soon!

It's also time for the next Annual Parish Meeting – come along to West Lavington Village Hall on Friday 25th May at 7.30pm and have your say on things that matter to you across the parish. We will have reports from many village organisations on their activities over the last year and this year we are hearing from 'Greensquare' a Housing Association that wants to re-develop the Stage Post pub site. I know we will all be concerned for the condition of the site now, but the council would like to hear your views on whether the pub and the land behind should be cleared to make way for affordable social housing, with a few units for sale too. But -the building has been regarded as a heritage asset to the community, and the Conservation Officer wants it retained, and converted. Your opinion is important too, so do come along and hear both sides of the story. They will be able to answer any questions that arise. Residents of this parish will have seen another leaflet in the magazine this month • telling of our latest work to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan, using new powers available to this Council in the Localism Act, 2011. It tells you how you can get involved, and you can learn more at the Jubilee Village Awareness Day in the Village Hall on 4th June or at the Fete on 23rd June.

The parish council meets on the first Thursday of every month (except August) at 7.30 p.m. in the Village Hall Giles Room – do come along and meet us, and hear what's going on in your community.

HOLY TRINITY CE PRIMARY ACADEMY

All our Key Stage 2 children (aged 7 – 11years old, in Sarum, Avebury and Silbury classes) are offered the opportunity to have a residential trip during the Spring term. Activities such as archery, climbing, canoeing and caving are organised, and

the children learn more about team work, independence and resilience. Year 3 and Year 4 children have been to Oxenwood for one night each and the Year 5 and Year 6 children have been to the Forest of Dean for two nights. These trips are among the highlights of the children's year and we are very grateful to our teachers and teaching assistants who are prepared to take on the responsibility of organising and accompanying the trips. They also had a boat ride around the bay which was wonderful. One afternoon in school they had a cards, quoits and cream tea event (they baked scones for this earlier in the day) just as people might have done on the Titanic. But we must not confuse the positive benefits of Christianity with what the faith is really all about: knowing God through Jesus Christ.
