Dear Friends,

Thank you so much to all those of you contributed something for the people of Kajo-Keji in South Sudan - including, I reckon, over 100 pairs of specs which will be sorted out at a local hospital – and those who have generously made a financial contribution.

There will be five of us in the team flying out on 3rd September: three from the Chalke Valley together with Jonathan Triffitt from St. James' Church, Southbroom, and myself from Devizes Deanery. The visit is being coordinated by Caroline Lamb who lives in the Chalke Valley. She set up a charity CRESS (Christian Relief and Education in South Sudan) a couple of years ago. Their work is focused on supporting church workers, sponsoring children and providing medical supplies.

From Entebbe in Uganda the team will fly into South Sudan on a small 6/10 seater MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship) plane. The principal event is a clergy conference at which we will all speak. As each sentence has to be translated that itself will be an interesting exercise.

Some may question, why go to all the expense of going out there? If they are so poor, why not just give them the money? It's a fair question. I haven't been to South Sudan before. However from my two visits to neighbouring Northern Uganda I do know that if you ask people there what they most want from their links with the Western churches, they say that they appreciate visits more than anything - because it shows that we care, that we care enough to make the effort to go and see them.

It is amazing how some of the poorest people on the planet do remain positive about life. The apostle Paul wrote, 'Set your mind on things above, not on things on the earth' (Colossians 3:2). It's my experience that the hearts and minds of African Christians can be so captivated by the love of God that they do find it possible for joy to replace despair as they learn to cope with life in dependence upon Jesus Christ. I'll tell you more about life in the world's newest nation when I get back.

Recycling charity appeals for your unwanted domestic white goods

Since the white goods recycling charity Refurbiz was established in 2003, more than 8000 low income families in Wiltshire have benefited from around 12,000 quality, reconditioned, white goods at prices they can afford. However, in the current economic environment we are struggling to source enough feedstock to service our demand.

With people hanging on to their old models & machines for longer we are increasingly in need of unwanted free standing electric cookers, washing machines, dryers and refrigeration. We simply can't meet the demand we now have for them and if the economy continues to be slow and more people find themselves in difficulties, the demand is only going to go higher.

So please, if you are replacing any white goods, particularly electric cookers and working fridges, then phone us and we will come out and remove them free of charge (although, as a charity, donations to cover our fuel costs, etc., are always welcome!)

We screen the goods, restore those that can be repaired and then pass them onto those in need. Typically, the cost of a washing machine or cooker comes to about £85 with a three month warranty - vastly lower than buying new goods from the stores.

Any appliances that are beyond repair are stripped down to reusable components and finally any bits left over are sent to the Hills Waste Materials Recovery Facility, near Calne, for onward, licenced recycling, avoiding any waste electrical items going into landfill.

So, if you have any white goods you no longer want and wish to donate, you can help a family in need by contacting Refurbiz on 01380 720200.

If you know any person or family in need of a low cost washing machine, dryer, cooker or fridge, please tell them about us. Many of our items are displayed on our Facebook page.

Refurbiz operates out of the Hopton Park Industrial Estate in Devizes, and supplies refurbished white goods across Wiltshire and Swindon. The charity was set up by the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust nine years ago to encourage electrical waste to be re-used for the benefit of those in need. It is an independent not-for-profit charity supported by self-generated income and charitable grants.

SKIMMINGTON

Whilst doing some local history research I was intrigued to discover that in June 1857, ten young men from West Lavington appeared in court charged with resisting police arrest.

Clearly this was a major incident for a reasonably law abiding rural community. What on earth had happened?

It has taken me a while to find out the story behind this event, but I have managed to track down a newspaper report, which throws some light on an ancient custom.

These young men were involved in a rather bawdy procession, which was called skimating, or skimmington. This was an old custom of publicly humiliating a man or a woman who was believed to have been unfaithful to his or her spouse. They would process down the street, banging on pots and pans, singing rude songs and carrying some graphic images or effigies. Whilst it was mainly done to humiliate an unfaithful wife or husband, it was sometimes arranged to humiliate a cuckolded man who accepted his wife's adultery.

In this particular case, there did not appear to have been any indecencies which frequently attended such exhibitions, nor did there appear to have been any mischief resulting from the noise and clamour with which the demonstration was celebrated. However the local policeman thought that a breach of the peace might arise from it, and he tried to stop it, presumably not with total success.

As a result all ten men appeared in court and they were each fined one shilling and dismissed with a caution as to their future behaviour.

Editor's Note: In Thomas Hardy's "The Mayor of Casterbridge" the Skimmington was used with frivolous but malicious purpose to expose a previous affair between Michael Henchard and his former lover, Lucetta, shortly after her recent marriage to Donald Farfrae. Two figures, thinly disguised, were seen proceeding through Casterbridge, tied back to back on a donkey, bringing shock and eventual death to the newly pregnant woman – and eventually the tragic end of the former Mayor, Henchard. Despite the tragic consequences, the perpetrators in this case went unpunished.

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL IS BRINGING IN THREE DOG CONTROL ORDERS.

The first two relate to any land within the administrative area of Wiltshire Council which is open to the air, including covered land which is open to the air on at least one side, and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access with or without payment of the following descriptions:

- (a) Any highway, footways, footpaths and towpaths within the area of Wiltshire Council District Council over which the public have a right of way on foot and adjoining verges which are maintained at public expense. This may include some areas of access land.
- (c)) All pedestrianised areas within the area of Wiltshire Council to which the public have right of access.

All open spaces which are owned, occupied or maintained by or on behalf of Wiltshire Council, a Registered Social Landlords/Housing Association or any Town or Parish Councils, and any public open space held by any Body on behalf of a community within Wiltshire Council.

The first order requires the person in charge of a dog to clean up after it has defecated. The second states that where an authorised officer considers that a dog is causing alarm or distress or is dangerous, that officer may require the person in charge of a dog to put it on a lead of no more than 2 metres in length.

The third order makes it an offence for a person in charge of a dog to allow it to enter into to any area enclosed by a fence or wall or similar structure which is used as a play area for children, unless it includes a Public Right of Way.

The maximum fine for a breach of these orders is level 3 on the standard scale, currently £1000. An authorised officer can give an offender a fixed penalty notice of £75 in lieu of prosecution.

The orders are expected to come into force September 1st 2012



A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

I have a confession to make. When I was first selected to stand for the council, I was asked if there was anything on my record that I should tell the selectors. "I have 6 points on my driving licence" I admitted. I had broken the law speeding, twice as it happened. Each time there was no malice aforethought, M'Lud, merely lack of attention until my eye caught sight of the speedometer. Many of you, I'll wager, have also been guilty of that offence at one time or another.

My licence is now clean as the points have expired and, as crimes go, you might think my transgressions were at the lower end of the spectrum. But a research programme at TRL some years ago demonstrated beyond doubt that the faster drivers choose to travel, the more likely they are to be involved in an accident.

Clearly, lower speeds save lives so you may welcome the fact that the speed limit on the A360 between Littleton Pannell and Potterne Wick will soon be reduced to 50 mph and from Potterne Wick into Potterne it will become 40 mph. Likewise, all the parts of the B3098 between Little Cheverell and Westbury that are currently unrestricted (i.e. the national speed limit of 60 mph) will become 50 mph. Meanwhile, the experimental 20 mph limit in Great Cheverell is being evaluated and will be made permanent if it is judged to be a success.

But there is a problem. Research by the Federal Highway Administration in the USA concluded that "Neither raising nor lowering the speed limit had much effect on vehicle speeds. The percent compliance with the posted speed limits improved when the speed limits were raised. When the speed limits were lowered, the compliance decreased." So why bother?

In my view, changing the speed limits still has value. A speed limit provides a label about road conditions that can be especially useful to those who are unfamiliar with a particular route. For example, Great Cheverell High Street is very narrow indeed so a driver who encounters the 20 mph signs has a better idea what to expect ahead. The message is reinforced by the white "gates" that have appeared at the entrances to several villages in this area, which emphasise to a driver that he is no longer on the open country road.

And then there is enforcement. Police resources are too stretched for officers to monitor our local roads very often but concerned citizens are filling the gap with Community Speed Watch. The sight of those yellow jackets certainly stimulates me to glance at the speedometer.

Drivers who are recorded speeding receive a polite letter from the police (which I helped to write) reminding them of the error of their ways. A repeat offence prompts a sterner warning. Serial offenders, of whom there have been a few in the county, are prosecuted. The fact is that Community Speed Watch works and I commend all those volunteers who brave the weather (and a few rude gestures) to make our roads safer.

A LIFETIME IN WEST LAVINGTON

About 1947 my father, Frederick Arthur James Nutland, set about restoring "ALL SAINTS" silent church clock. During this restoration my brother Keith delivered the "second-hand spindle" to Mr Kelloway the local blacksmith who soldered in the 60 "second-hand rods", an operation carried out many times before becoming a firm fix. In turn restoration of the church clock was completed, striking on the hour, but with no face. My father wound up the clock until about 1970 climbing in the region of 28 tower steps, every day. About 1975 the clock's winding and striking mechanisms were electrified by Mr Bob Osborne and the late Mr Roy Lye.

I remember the first time when, as a young lad, I went to ALL SAINTS with my dear Dad, He opened a large door that would creak and then groan, Were we walking on granite or walking on stone? I remember large ropes hanging directly ahead, "They are pulled to ring bells," Dad turned and said. I looked up at the high ceiling; no bells could I see. "Come on," said my Dad, "you just follow me." He opened a small door; inside was quite dark, Stone stairs curved upwards to form a stone arc. "Go on," said my Dad, "start climbing the stairs." "I'm frightened," I said, "but then who cares?" I spiralled the stone stairs, my Dad close behind. The stairs in the tower would continually wind, "Am I going to heaven?" I said to my Dad. "Not yet," he replied, "you are only a lad. You just keep on climbing with a hand on the rope. As I'm right behind you in case you can't cope. If you look to your left you will see a small door. When I open it up you will see a lot more." We entered a large room; I was in for a shock. "That, son," Dad said, "is the parish church clock." I laughed and said, "But Dad where is its face?" A clock with no face is an utter disgrace, "The clock's wound by handles and it lifts those weights high. Go on," Dad said, "why not give it a try?"

I tried turning the handle. "You need muscle," said Dad. As I huffed and I puffed it made me feel bad. Dad took hold of the handle; we turned it around. Up went the weight to a loud clicking sound, The weight slowly rose until reaching the top. "That's enough, son," said Dad. "There we must stop." I sat down exhausted; I needed a rest. "Never mind," said Dad. "You gave it your best." "Let us move on," said Dad. "There's still a lot more." As we left the clock tower, Dad closed the small door. I started to climb with my hand on the rope, Dad following behind in case I can't cope. Higher and higher in the spiralling mode. The stone staircase seemed serenely cold. Another small door set in the stone wall, I'm feeling quite nervous. I hope I don't fall, "The bells are in here," said Dad as he opened the door. When the door opened up I stood there in awe. Six great bells not making a sound, Each with a thick rope dropping down to the ground, "If they start ringing now," Dad jokingly said, "We would both finish up going daft in the head." We climb on up after Dad closed the small door. "When we get to the top you will see a lot more." My legs are tired, my arms also ache, Having come all this way with not even a break. "Nearly there now, son," Dad encouragingly said. "You should see a small door directly ahead." I breathed a sigh of relief when he opened the door. And gulped in fresh air as never before. The blue sky above so nearly to touch, In such a short time I've experienced so much, With Dad's hand on my shoulder we look down at the scene, The village below so peaceful and green. As the flag on the flagpole flaps melodiously away, I thank my dear Dad for a wonderful day. We leave the church tower through the door at the top, And wend our way downwards past the bells and the clock. I follow my Dad down with my hand on the rope, As I did on the way up in case I can't cope. I look back at ALL SAINTS CHURCH from the ground to the sky. Did I really go up there where the flag flies so high? As we walked down the road and along by the stream, I remember that time, or was it a dream?

More than Gold

We all no doubt hoped that Team GB would perform well in the Olympics. But who'd have thought that we would win 29 gold medals and end up third in the medal table, just behind the sporting superpowers of China and America? The London Olympics was a great sporting spectacle, in the words of IOC President, Jacques Rogge, a "happy and glorious games". Who could forget witnessing (albeit on the telly) Jessica Ennis' triumph in the heptathlon, or Mo Farrow's double gold in the 10,000 and 5,000 metres, or Usain Bolt winning his three gold medals? Not to mention the exploits of Bradley Wiggins, Chris Hoy, and our own Wiltshire golden boy, Ed McKeever.

The Opening Ceremony included the playing of Vangelis' score from Chariots of Fire. The film featured the story of Eric Liddell winning the 400 metre race in the 1924 Paris Olympics. He was a 100 metre man really, but he famously withdrew from that event because the heats were on a Sunday. Liddell, a devout Christian believed that Sunday should be kept as a day of rest and worship. Inspired by the bible text, "for those who honour me I will honour" (1 Samuel 2:30), the athlete not only won the gold medal, but broke the world record.

What is not so well know is that after his sporting success Liddell became a missionary in China. Someone once asked him if he regretted giving up athletics for the mission field. He replied, "It's natural for a chap to think over all that sometimes, but I'm glad I'm at the work I'm engaged in now. A fellow's life counts for far more at this than the other."

But this was to be a costly commitment. When Japan invaded China in World War II, Liddell was held in an internment camp, where conditions were harsh. The former athlete gave himself to helping those in need. In a prisoner exchange negotiated between the British and Japanese, Liddell was given an opportunity to leave the camp, but he gave up his place to a pregnant woman. Shortly afterwards he died of a brain tumour. His condition was probably exacerbated overwork and malnutrition.

Liddell's act of costly sacrifice reminds us of the Lord Jesus Christ who laid down his life to bring us back to God. For Eric Liddell the joy of knowing and serving Jesus was worth more than gold.
