Dear Friends,

The message of Easter is the central focus of the Christian Faith. The apostle Paul said, 'If Christ has not been raised your faith is futile'

(1 Corinthians 15:17). If Jesus is still dead, he cannot be our Saviour; if he died like other men, he cannot be the Son of God - and heaven's doors remain locked.

But if Christ is risen, as the Bible teaches and as hundreds of witnesses testified, then we have the ultimate hope for humanity – new life with the God who made us and the certainty of life beyond the grave.

For many people these things remain a mystery. In 1920s a sceptical writer named Frank Morison set out to investigate the evidence for the Resurrection. However the exercise 'led in a new and unexpected direction', he wrote. 'It was as though a man set out to cross a forest by a familiar and well-beaten track and came out suddenly where he did not expect to come out. The point of entry was the same; it was the point of emergence that was different.'

As a young man Morison had studied Christianity but had concluded that 'it 'rested' on very insecure foundations.' As his research progressed, so 'the conviction grew that the drama of those unforgettable weeks of human history (the last of Jesus' life on earth) was stranger and deeper than it seemed. It was only later', he adds, 'that the irresistible logic of their meaning came into view.'

Frank Morison's book 'Who moved the stone?' was published in 1930. In the last sentence he writes of 'the deep and profoundly historical basis for that much disputed sentence in the Apostles Creed - The third day he rose again from the dead.' That investigation changed Frank Morison's life in a way that he'd never have anticipated.

WILTSHIRE GOOD NEIGHBOURS NEWS

This month I would like to tell you about services that you may not know you can receive at home.

You could be entitled to an NHS sight test at home if you are unable to leave home by yourself or have a significant disability. It is likely to be free if you are over 60 and on the guaranteed element of Pension Credit. Wherever you have your sight test, you could qualify for help towards the cost of your glasses if you receive the guaranteed element of Pension Credit.

You could also be entitled to a free NHS Hearing test at home.

Do you know about the **Home Library Service**? This is a free service for people who have problems getting to their local library due to disability or illness, and for carers. A member of library staff will talk to you about what you like to read. They will then visit you at home with a library volunteer and bring you some books. Every few weeks, the library volunteer will call and exchange your books. You can borrow any kind of book, including talking books and CDs.

FIFTY YEARS ON, STILL A FOREIGNER.

We arrived in West Lavington in January 1963, following the snowplough across Salisbury Plain between newly-made cliffs of snow. 'I give you six months,' said my brother as we left London. I thought he was probably right.

Fifty years ago Philip Holloway used to let the end section of The Manor as a flat. Someone had arranged for us to take it. What a delight it would have been had it not been one of the coldest winters of the century. All we could do was to marvel at the huge size of the rooms and the minute size of the radiators, and wonder what was outside our windows, for it was late March before we could see what was grass, what was tarmac, what was flowerbed.

I used to pop across the road to the Horse and Jockey of an evening, where Mr Gourlay would offer me draught cider at about 4p a pint (10 pence in old money) or ordinary bitter at 6p. Circumstances forced me to develop a taste for the cider. There I would chat with old Bob, retired shepherd who had lived up on the plain with his sheep for weeks at a time. 'Of course I'm a foreigner here' he said. When I expressed surprise, he told me he was a Hampshire Hog, and had only lived in these parts for 25 years. I can still remember my astonishment that anyone should consider themselves 'a foreigner' after such a great length of time!

In those days we were much more aware of living in a Wiltshire village. Old Bob sounded authentic enough to me, and although there were many exceptions the majority of the voices one heard in the pubs or shops were local voices. Who remembers Mr. Wiltshire, so aptly named? 'Have you any cheese, Mr. Wiltshire?' and the inevitable reply 'Certainly Mr. Er....er... Would you like mild or tasty?' But nowadays, greater mobility has given us a far greater mixture of accents; lump all the Geordies and Cockneys and Mancunians together and they could well outnumber the Moonrakers. Another great change, suffered nearly everywhere of course, is the loss of shops. I can remember eight in 1963, not counting petrol station or garage. Have I forgotten any?

And so the six months allotted by my brother extended itself somewhat; there never seemed to be any reason to move. I remember old Ron Barron, who lived out his last decades in Holly Cottage, telling me that in his 40 years here he had known many people who had left West Lavington for fresh fields, but to his knowledge not one of them had been happier for the move. You may believe it or not, but a lot of people simply stay as I have done.

But old Bob was right; even after 50 years I'm still a bit of a foreigner.

LITTLE CHEVERELL PARISH COUNCIL

The Little Cheverell Parish Council met on March 19th and listened to concerns from residents about large lorries getting stuck on Low Road. These lorries have damaged property and verges and cause inconvenience to residents.

The Council have agreed to support the concerns of the residents and will be in discussion with Wiltshire Council regarding improving signage. It is hoped that the signing will enforce the 7.5 tonne limit and confirm that the proper diversion of HGVs is not through Low Road. This will not affect deliveries such as oil tankers, or refuse collection.

Lorries over the 7.5 tonne limit found to be using the road can be reported to the police using the 101 number, giving the number plate of the lorry and the company, and the police will look into the issue. Previously Little Cheverell Parish Council was successful in highlighting the use of Low Road by one company's lorries, and the Council received a letter apologising for the inconvenience and confirming that lorries will take a different route in future.

New Bus Shelter: A new bus shelter has been erected near Victoria Park to replace the previous shelter which was damaged beyond repair last October. It has been erected 70m further along the road than the previous one. This decision was taken in order to give motorists exiting Victoria Park a clearer view of oncoming traffic.

Recycling Bins: If you require a new recycling bin this can be obtained by ringing 0300-456-0100 and requesting a new bin. (A parishioner recently had her bin damaged and thought that other people might find this information useful if they should experience a similar occurrence.)

Rubbish in Play Area: Could we please remind parents and children to take their rubbish home, if the rubbish bin is full.

Bus Services:

The No.2 Salisbury bus picks up from the village shop at around 9.05 a.m. on a Tuesday only for Salisbury Market and will return passengers to the village on request on the 12.55 p.m. bus. This service runs during term time only.

The X.88 Chitterne to Bath bus will pick up at 9.25 a.m. on Wednesdays, returning at 1.30 p.m. This works out at a much faster service than the bus which runs from Easterton through Devizes and Melksham to Bath. This service runs throughout the year.

Residents of West Lavington and Littleton Panell may recall receiving a leaflet last year explaining how the new powers to write our own Neighbourhood Plan, as laid out in the new Localism Act, 2011, were being used in the parish. The Parish Council has agreed that such a Plan should be prepared, and several articles in this magazine have invited volunteers to come forward who would like to bring their skills and experience to a community Steering Group. We are delighted to announce that a large Group has come together, and a formal submission has now been made to Wiltshire Council who have to approve our way of working and the Planning Area (in this case, the existing parish boundary). Before they do so, the next stage is to consult you, with an opportunity to comment on whether there should be a Plan at all and if so, over what area it should cover. The consultation period will run from 8 April until 22 May. 
