Dear Friends,

I recently attended events to mark the 40th anniversary of the link between Salisbury Diocese and the Church in Sudan. A number of bishops came over from Sudan and South Sudan and I was able to meet a few of them. These links can remain fairly remote until one meets people and hears first-hand the challenges that they face.

When I travelled to South Sudan last September I was part of a team led by Caroline Lamb from the Chalke Valley; she has set up CRESS (Christian Relief and Education in South Sudan). On an earlier trip she'd asked to meet a really poor family. She was taken to a family of seven: the mother was aged 30, she had four children aged 12, 7, 4 and 1; they lived with the grandmother and a mentally ill aunt.

Their home was a traditional African hut. When Caroline visited it stank of acrid smoke because all the cooking was done there. The family all slept in one bed or on the floor. Their only possessions were some filthy old clothes, three tiny wooden stools and an old pole. The mother had a pair of flip-flops, but none of the others had shoes, nor had they ever had any – including the grandmother.

None of the children had ever been to school. It costs £5 to send a child to school for a term in South Sudan; there they would be given a meal of maize porridge. On the day of Caroline's visit they hadn't eaten anything – and it was $5.30 \, \text{p.m.}$ There was no maize flour or beans in the house – the staple foods. They had no soap – indeed they had almost nothing.

It transpired that the father had abused the elder children and was often drunk and violent. He had attempted to sell three of the children for \$300 before abandoning the family.

None of us have ever met this family; few people have. Tragically their plight is replicated many, many times over. Such stories remind us of how fortunate we are, and why we need to be concerned for the plight of the poor in a world where one in eight go to bed hungry each night. Jesus challenged his hearers, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did not do for the least of these (the hungry, the thirsty, strangers, the sick, those in prison), you did not do for me" (Matthew 25:45).

THE AIR AMBULANCE THE WHITE HORSE CHALLENGE

We've all looked up countless times and watched the Air Ambulance fly over our villages. It is an enormously valuable asset of the county and is entirely dependent on voluntary contributions to keep it flying. Over the years it has attended thousands of incidents where speed has made all the difference to the patient.

This is the fourth year that we've participated in the White Horse Challenge raising much needed funds. Over the weekend of the 5th and 6th of July we, and a hundred and fifty or so others, will walk 56 miles across Wiltshire taking in 7 of the white horses. We leave the police HQ in Devizes early on the Saturday morning and walk to Alton Barnes, Pewsey and finish the day, exhausted and sore, in Marlborough.



We stay overnight in a B & B in Manton (we're far too old to camp under canvas!) and then set off again on the Sunday for the white horses at Hackpen, Broadtown, Cherhill and Roundway. We aim to be back at the finish at the police HQ by tea time!

VILLAGE CARE AND LINK

Looking for a way to while away these hot summer days? Why not help out in the villages by volunteering as a driver for Village Care and Link? We also need phone co-ordinators to "man" the phone (which would be diverted calls to your own phone at home), for one month at a time.

Village Care and Link provides transport to mainly medical-related appointments for people who have no other means of getting to those appointments. It is available to residents of West Lavington, Littleton Panell and Little Cheverell.

In our last financial year we made 50 journeys to surgeries an West Lavington and Market Lavington, 27 to Salisbury hospitals, 16 to Bath hospitals, 13 to Devizes hospitals and 11 to other destinations

Drivers, who are all unpaid volunteers, can claim a mileage allowance of 40p per mile. There is no obligation to drive at particular times; if you are not available one day, the phone co-ordinator simply goes down the list of drivers until he/she finds someone.

AN HONOURABLE RETURN

It was in 1948 that John Randall, who lives in Great Cheverell, as a Boy Seaman, found himself as a member of a team making good various vessels in the Reserve Fleet. Among the many duties the team were called upon to undertake was the sad task of dismantling the former Royal Yacht, Victoria and Albert. In the course of the operation, while going to work on one of the cabins, he came across a sheet of stationery and an envelope, beautifully printed and embossed with "Victoria and Albert, Royal Yacht". It is perhaps not to be wondered at that the temptation to disobey the orders to hand in equipment became too strong for him and so the stationery was tucked into his No.8 shirt, as a consequence of which it had remained in his possession ever since.

Recently, whether from a guilty conscience or from a curiosity to see what the royal response might be, John decided to return it to its rightful owner. Thus it was in May this year (65 years later!) that he wrote to Her Majesty, apologising for his misdemeanour and enclosing the stolen stationery.

Fortunately he has not been cast into the Tower of London, but instead he now has in his possession a charming and gracious reply from a Lady-in-Waiting, thanking him for his letter and saying that "Her Majesty was touched by the sentiments expressed, and thought it was kind of you to return the sheet of writing paper and envelope which you found on the Yacht and which you have treasured for so many years." Perhaps not wishing to extend his sense of guilt further, the offending items were not returned to John, but at least he now has in his possession a sheet of paper with a nicely decorated and embossed heading of Buckingham Palace.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

About 250 years ago, Benjamin Franklin, said "Out of adversity comes opportunity". Franklin was one of the Founding Fathers of American independence and, as far as the USA was concerned, you may agree that he was right.

I think the same has been broadly true for me. For example, in my business life many years ago, when my employer was struggling to survive in the face of a recession, I was made redundant along with about 40% of my colleagues. With a young family to keep, I set out to cut our expenditure and, among other things, we stopped buying ready meals. My wife continued working and I learned to cook from basics. Not only did we save money but we had much nicer meals (in my view) and I have enjoyed cooking ever since. Quite soon, I got a new job and all was better than before.

I think Wiltshire Council has also taken advantage of the opportunities presented by the adversity of a shrinking budget. There are many examples. We have cut our expenditure on libraries but, with the help of over 600 volunteers, we have closed nothing and have increased opening hours. The evidence is that those volunteers enjoy their comfortable and sociable time in the library, which is an added bonus. On the roads, we used to have separate contracts for grass cutting, street lights, pothole repairs and litter picking. These are now combined into one contract where teams under local control can undertake any of those tasks according to need, which promises to be much more efficient and effective.

Wiltshire Council has also linked with other public organisations. The public health team that was formerly part of the NHS is now successfully embedded alongside the public protection team in the Council. In Chippenham, the police service share our offices at Monkton Park to our mutual advantage.

So far, so good. But the financial pressures continue and it looks as if the Council's expenditure will have to continue its downward trend for some years yet. I am reminded of another famous saying: "Smile," they said. "Life could be worse". So I did and it was.

We have more work to do. Fingers crossed it will all work out well!

Once in a while, a person's passion, knowledge and way of introducing a subject can enthral and this is what happened to me this month. Joy Thomas didn't give a talk, she had a chat, whilst handing around these beautiful samplers.

A sampler literally means 'example'. These pieces of cloth were used to demonstrate various stitches, often worked by young girls sewing by candlelight. Letters of the alphabet were usually followed by numbers, then a little homily finishing with an illustration. This relied heavily on symbols, with pineapples depicting wealth, apple ⁴ trees, animals and houses. Handling these examples, some over 100 years old, was magical. A little dog and cat sat beside a house in one and it was easy to imagine a young Victorian girl in a pinafore, hair in plaits struggling to stitch her sampler in the flickering candlelight.

BOOKMARK

Bookmark members met in June to discuss Janet Davey's *By Battersea Bridge* and *Carry the One* by Carol Anshaw. Janet Davey was recommended as an intelligent chronicler of our present; a polished and moving writer of contemporary London, but unfortunately she disappointed our group on this occasion. We were drip fed her story which skipped



around chronologically like a complex journey with little sign posting. Overall it was deemed a difficult and somewhat tedious read. The Independent did mention a second reading was necessary to make things completely clear – but we just felt the writer had failed to clarify first time around! However, Annemarie enjoyed this novel, so the scoring rose to 3 out of 10 stars.

In contrast, Carol Anshaw's novel was a popular read amongst the group, although Janet felt this novel was not 'her cup of tea'. Set in the early eighties in rural Wisconsin, a Bohemian wedding is followed by a tragic car accident and for those involved the repercussions of that shared moment reverberates over the next 25 years. For five friends the disaster transforms whoever they were, into whoever they become and how they are viewed by others. The writing and style of this novel was considered of a high quality and the intermittent 'snapshots' of culture, camaraderie and humour were appreciated. This book was awarded 9 stars out of 10.

We meet for our next Bookmark session on Wednesday 17th July when the two novels under discussion will be San Miguel by TC Boyle and ML Stedman's The Light Between Oceans – contrasting tales set on two remote islands; situated in different parts of the world (large box of tissues provided!). 
