Dear Friends,

Benjamin Franklin, one of the Founding Fathers of the USA, famously said, "In this world nothing is certain except death and taxes." The difference is that we know the exact date when the latter are due – end of October on paper or the end of the following January online – but the timing of the former is a mystery.

In recent weeks Market Lavington has seen the death of two men held in wide affection within the community. Ted Maslen died quite suddenly; Alan Weston after a year-long battle with cancer. Ted, a local man through and through, was in his eight decade; Alan, brought up near Cape Town, was just 42 years old.

During his illness, Alan came to a strong Christian conviction, a personal living faith in Jesus. For him life after death, the hope of heaven, was a reality. As he became more ill and suffered greater pain, his new-found faith did not waver; indeed it grew stronger: for he knew it to be true.

Easter Sunday is the high point of the Christian year, as Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. The physical resurrection of Jesus is the cornerstone of Christianity. Jesus' resurrection confirms everything he said about who he was and what he came to do. Christians do not revere some long dead historical figure but rather a living Saviour. Not only does this transform our faith, it also transforms our lives now.

If faith remains merely an assent to certain ideals or creeds, it has no power. If we let faith percolate from our heads to our hearts, allow it to change us, then it has real power that will transform not just our own lives but the lives of others.



A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

The weather is warming up at last and so, it seems, is the economy. The OECD says UK is now growing faster than any other European economy.

A warmer economy means more jobs and in this regard Wiltshire is doing better than most. Unemployment (as measured by Job Seekers Allowance claimants) is only 1.5% of the working age population here compared with twice that percentage in the country as a whole. Even the figures for our young people are ahead of the national trend. The GB figure for unemployment of 18 to 24 year olds is 5.2%. In Wiltshire it is 3.6%.

Most of the young unemployed in this county are finding jobs quite quickly. However, there are a few individuals (190 in fact) who have been out of work for more than a year. These NEETS (Not in Employment, Education or Training) are a genuine cause for concern for their welfare as individuals. Wiltshire Council is doing all that it can to find suitable places for them either on training courses, apprenticeships or in paid jobs. The co-operation of a growing number of employers in this regard is greatly appreciated.

The relatively low unemployment rate is particularly welcome, given that public sector organisations of all kinds continue to face very tight budgets. Staff numbers overall continue to shrink. Each year, Wiltshire Council receives less money from government yet, by judicious belt-tightening, has managed to keep Council Tax unchanged for four years running (worth over £382 per year for the average household, if inflation is taken into account).

Equally important is the fact that the Council has maintained or even improved services. On the roads, for example, despite what you may think, we are mending 40% more potholes than we did last year.

LITTLE CHEVERELL PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting 18th March

A meeting of the Little Cheverell Parish Council was held in the Village Hall at 7.00 p.m. on Tuesday March 18th.

The main subject of discussion centred on what was considered to be a very unsatisfactory situation in the planning policy of Wiltshire. Government has yet to approve the Core Strategy which leaves small villages vulnerable to predatory planning applications in the absence of proper planning controls. The Chairman agreed to write to the Wiltshire Council in attempt to clarify the situation.

Other agenda items included the adoption of the current year's budget which enabled the current year's precept to be slightly reduced from that charged last year.

Consent was given to the felling of various trees that were damaged in the winter storms and a letter is to be written to landowners in respect of hedges currently overhanging Low Road and, in addition, representations are to be made to the Wiltshire Council in respect of potholes within the Parish.

Finally it was agreed that a contribution should be made to News and Views.

The next meeting is on May 6th at 6.30 p.m. in the Village Hall, followed by the AGM at 7.00 p.m.

ZEBRA CROSSING INSTALLATION HIGH STREET, WEST LAVINGTON

Notice has been received that a zebra crossing has been proposed by Wiltshire Council for installation across the High Street between the B3098 crossroads and the entrance to Dauntsey's School. An informal crossing will also be laid across the head of Lavington Lane. This will be similar to the one further down the High Street, although with timber bollards on both sides of the road.

The zebra crossing will have a 'no parking' zone either side, marked with zig-zag lines. It is this restriction that is the subject of formal consultation within the Traffic Regulation Order process. If you would like to comment on the proposal you can do so by writing to Wiltshire Council's Sustainable Transport Group, at County Hall, Bythesea Road, Trowbridge BA14 8JN quoting reference HKB/TROW/WLAV/HY296. There is more on the parish website at www.westlavington.info/THE_HUB.html and you can link through to Wiltshire Council from there too. Comments are invited until 25 April.

The scheme will also be discussed by the Parish Council at its meeting on 3rd April. Should the scheme proceed, then work is planned for the summer school holidays, and would involve traffic light-controlled works for about two to three weeks during construction.

A zebra crossing is controlled by a pedestrian claiming right of access. There are no traffic light signals, with traffic flow interrupted for the duration of the walk across. The funding is to be provided predominantly by Dauntsey's School, with a small contribution from Wiltshire Council's Devizes Area Board.

We all knew that this Winter had been very wet. But it was very interesting to see how much wetter it it had been compared to last year in this district. Luckily one of our members keeps records from a weather station set up in his garden in Great Cheverell. At the start of our

March meeting he gave us facts and figures that showed us not only that it was wetter in December, January, February than during the same period last year, but also that it was warmer. He also demonstrated by using the energy output records from his solar panels that it was much sunnier this year.

Our speaker for the March meeting was Robert Harvey. His topic was *Mediterranean wild flowers in nature and the garden*. Robert illustrated his talk with excellent colour slides showing Mediterranean wildflowers in many countries, both North and South of the equator.

We learned that Mediterranean type climates occur between approximately 30 degrees and 40 degrees latitude, both North and South of the equator, on the West side of Continents. These regions have hot, dry Summers and mild, wet Winters. The vegetation is often fire resistant. The soils are often not very fertile so the areas do not usually support intensive agriculture. The native vegetation is dominated by shrubby evergreen plants adapted to the climatic stresses of heat and aridity, and a well developed annual and herbaceous (often bulbous) flora.

Robert showed us examples of garique, an open heathlike vegetation with aromatic shrubs, and maquis with more dense scrub formations, including broom, lavender and rock rose. And there were beautiful photographs of proteas amongst the fynbos vegetation of the Cape region of South Africa.

Using his own garden as an example Robert demonstrated how we could introduce some Mediterranean plants into our gardens. He had created a microclimate by building South and West facing red brick walls to capture the heat from the sun. Then he built raised beds and lined them with wire mesh to keep out mice. There was a deep layer of gravel to aid drainage and finally compost mixed with sand. He was able to grow a wide variety of Mediterranean plants and shrubs. He also had flower beds built around the walls inside his conservatory. Here he was able to grow indoor plants and also to overwinter some of the less hardy plants from the outdoor garden.

I think many of us were inspired by the colour slides to dream of a Mediterranean holiday, and perhaps some of us to create a Mediterranean area in our own gardens. The next meeting will be on Tuesday 8 April in Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 for 7.30 p.m. Don Everitt has been lecturing to garden clubs for over 40 years. His topic on this visit will be *Fascinating Foliage*. New members are always welcome. There is a charge for non members of £2 per meeting.

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH
