Dear Friends,

In this country we just turn on the tap; in many parts of the world they are less fortunate, often having to fetch water from a considerable distance.

There is an apocryphal story of a water-bearer in India who had two large pots; both were hung on the end of a pole which he carried across his neck. One of the pots had a crack in it while the other was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water. At the end of the long walk from the stream to the house, the cracked pot always arrived half full.

The poor cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection and miserable that it was able to only do half a job. After two years of what it perceived to be a bitter failure, it spoke to the water-bearer one day by the stream: 'I'm ashamed of myself and I want to apologise to you. I've been able to deliver only half my load because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your house. Because of my flaws, you have to do extra work and you don't get full value for your efforts.'

The bearer said to the pot, 'Did you notice that there are flowers only on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I've always known about your flaw. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path and every day while we walk back you've watered them. For two years I've been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate the table. Without you being just the way you are, there would not be this beauty to grace the house.'

That is a picture of how God looks upon us. When I went to theological college everyone seemed multi-talented; it took me a long time to realise that God liked me the way I was and had also given me gifts. We each want our lives to count for something. Appreciating and using what God has given us rather than wishing we had other talents, and helping other do the same, is a recipe for a contented and fulfilled life.

LAVENDER DAVY

Lavender the Choir Mistress

“Come in when I tell you except when I get it wrong”

Lavender was the All Saints Choir Mistress for over 30 years. She was enthusiastic and ambitious, deciding on a choral work, much to our trepidation, and always pulled it off. She produced anthems and choral pieces for all the great church festivals and national occasions, *Zadok the Priest* for the Queen’s Jubilee being a highlight. The choir year always culminated in the Carol Service and Supper, often for over 100, which she also organised. Some years ago she decided the choir was too tired after Christmas so had the Choir Christmas Party in July around her swimming pool with one of her famous quizzes and has done so every year since. A choir was always available for weddings and funerals, culminating sadly with her own. Her final triumph was conducting *Fauré’s Requiem* on Good Friday only three days before her death. Poignantly, we sang parts of it at her funeral a week later. Lavender loved “her” choir and had huge faith in our modest abilities.

We owe it to Lavender to keep on singing – and we will. *The Choir*

Lavender the Parishioner

The word that comes to mind as I think of Lavender is ‘Family’.

First there is her flesh and blood family. The only child who loved people and had six children of her own – and wished she’d had more! Seeing and hearing ‘Her Story’ and knowing the family, I’m struck by what fun they all must have had. That is borne out by the obvious affection that the children as adults have for their parents. So much of the credit for that must go to Hugh whose very different gifts enabled Lavender to blossom into the person she was.

Then, second, there is the aspect of ‘Family’ in relation to this Church and Community. Lavender fostered ‘Family’ within the Choir that she loved and led for over 30 years. Lavender was a key part in fostering the mutual care and support that exists within the Church congregation; similarly within the wider community of West Lavington and Littleton Panell. It wasn’t all about Lavender, but whatever the event, so often she was there; and being Lavender, not just sitting quietly in the wings. *James Campbell*

The phone rings. “Chair here” (Lavender) asking for “Treasure” (Michael). It is time for a committee meeting as an event is imminent.

Christmas, Mobile Suppers, Wine Tasting, welcoming new vicars and saying goodbye to retiring ones, the Social & Fund Raising Committee has provided food and drink for all these and more over two decades.

Money raised by Lavender’s committee has restored the church clock, bought music and cassocks, helped supply a new boiler and church windows and supported a junior choir. All done with a minimum of fuss organised by Lavender who had a knack of rallying people to help and a complete faith that it would be alright on the night...it always was. *Judy Page*

Lavender the Friend

I owe everything I do in this village to Lavender. Before we had even moved in to the village she had recruited me to help her at the Dauntsey’s School Shop and now I run it as a full time job. She encouraged me to join the Church Choir and the Choral Society and the Social and Fundraising Committee. She organised some splendid events for the village. We had some wonderful laughs over the years I worked for her and she was a good friend. On arriving in West Lavington people would ask me if I had been “Lavendered” yet. I now know why. Lavender the Neighbour

Where is the village centre, the hub, the focal point? The village hall? A pub? Once it was the church, but I would propose somewhere else entirely; Lavender and Hugh’s garden. It wasn’t always so. Indeed, in the 1970s I recall little more than the annual Christmas ritual, when at noon on Christmas Day four Parish boys would confront a rather greater number of Davys across the hedge which attempted to separate us, and there one small army would yell insults at the other about the inadequacy and inferiority of their Christmas jumpers. Oh, there was also the annual bonfire and fireworks on the other side of that hedge, which took place in all weathers but my main recollection is of freezing rain and consequent damp squibs.

But it was not until the construction of the swimming pool that The Garden acquired its true status. It became a great centre for barbecues in aid of various causes, treasure hunts, games, and of course swimming for all. We were then much more frequent visitors, as were most people in the surrounding villages, it would seem.

Having captured so many children, Lavender put them to work by introducing them to the world of the theatre, and a junior branch of the village Dramatic Society undertook a string of outdoor productions in what might be described as Center Parcs, West Lavington.. By then we had moved house, with typical adventurousness, about 50 yards. We remained Lavender and Hugh’s neighbours, but were now separated by a different hedge. I rather think that our new location gave us an even better aural view of these plays, and during the weeks of rehearsal we were very happy to hear the excited shrieks and chatter (of the grown-ups) and the incessant ‘When can we swim?’ from the children. Happy noises, happy times. It all seems horribly quiet now. Maybe Philippa can do something about that.

MARY TROTTER AND THE BELLRINGERS

Mary Trotter, who died in March, lived in West Lavington all her life and was very active in the community. As well as singing in the church choir, Mary and her husband Bill, rang regularly at All Saints, West Lavington becoming members of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild of Ringers in the early 1960's. Mary was Tower Captain for several years and continued ringing until the year 2000. At the Devizes Branch Meeting of SDGR on 3 May, members rang at All Saints, West Lavington, in tribute of Mary's long service, energy and enthusiasm.

The origins of change ringing lie in the 16th century when church bells began to be hung with a full wheel. This gave ringers control of their bell, which allowed sets of bells (rings) to be rung in a continuously changing pattern. Music is created by moving bells up and down the ringing order to a defined sequence of changes known as a method. Learning a few simple methods allows ringers to join in with other bands in towers all over the world.

Bell ringing is a team activity that stimulates the brain and helps keep you fit – it also makes a glorious sound! The initial teaching takes several weeks after which a learner can begin to ring with the rest of the band. Most ringers practise once or twice a week and ring before Sunday service to call people to Church. They also ring to celebrate marriage, pay tribute at funerals and on Remembrance Day, plus at a variety of religious festivals.

All Saints, West Lavington, has a ring of six bells rung from the ground floor and learners are always very welcome. If you are interested in learning this traditional skill and becoming a member of the team, please contact Pat Chapman (Tower Captain) on 01380 724154 or Julia Russell on 01380 816056. Bumblebee gathering nectar and pollinating in Erlestoke woods

Did you know that Bumblebees have smelly feet? Well they do and it's quite useful! After feeding they leave a scent on the flower which helps other bumblebees to avoid wasting energy landing on a flower that contains very little nectar or pollen.

Things you can do to help the Bumblebee survive: British gardens cover more than 1 million acres and can be a lifeline for bumblebees. No matter how small your garden, you can contribute to save the sound of summer by providing lots of bee-friendly flowers throughout the year. By bee-friendly we mean flowers that are rich in pollen and nectar. Many ornamental plants that are commonly found in British gardens, such as pansies and begonias, are of no value to wildlife. Years of cultivation for showy blooms mean that these colourful flowers often produce little pollen or nectar. There are hundreds of beautiful flowers that do offer these rewards though, including foxgloves, lavender, geraniums, herbs and wild roses that you can add to your collection and help save the humble Bumblebee!

WEST LAVINGTON SURVIVORS OF WORLD WAR ONEHaving completed the book, *Lest We Forget*, about the people recorded on our war memorial, I am now working on a book about the West Lavington men who marched off to war and managed to survive the experience.

So far I have researched 115 names, mostly taken from the Roll of Honour in the church. However this list only covers men who volunteered before the end of 1915. It doesn't cover men who enlisted, either voluntarily or under conscription from 1916 onwards.

There is no scientific method of obtaining this information. I have trawled through the 1911 census and identified some additional men, and I have also obtained a few names from Ros Hooper's photographic collection. However there will be many I have missed.

If you know of anyone with connections to West Lavington, who fought in WWI and survived, please let me have whatever you information you know. And if you have a photograph of the person, that would be excellent.

Your own WWI ancestors

I am always on the look-out to find ways of raising money for the Youth Club. If your family had no connection with West Lavington at that time, I will be happy to do some research to try to find out what your ancestors did during the war, for a small donation of £5-£10 to the West Lavington Youth Club.

Many service records were destroyed during a bombing raid in WW2, and it is often not possible to find much. If I can't find anything, then of course no donation would be expected.

Just let me have as much information as you know, and I will see what I can do... regardless of where the person came from. You never know; if enough people are interested there may be another book in it! If you have already researched your WWI ancestors and would like to provide me with your findings, I'll record the information and if a book of *Our Ancestors in WWI* becomes viable, I can include them.Lyn Dyson 01380 813943 e-mail: lyndadyson@yahoo.co.uk

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

If you live in one of the villages where this parish magazine is distributed, you can't have missed the fact that the army is close by.

You will have heard the big guns and, sometimes, will have been shaken by the explosions. You will have seen the flares at night and will have heard the rattle of machine gun fire. You may have observed the occasional convoys of exotic-looking vehicles on our roads or may have driven past as they waited to cross the public highway. You will have looked up as planes and helicopters fly low over our heads.

For most of us, these are reassuring signs of the presence of our defence forces. For some, however, they may also be reminders of the sounds and sights of conflict many years ago when our nation was in peril and when our brave men and women put their lives on the line to uphold our civilization against the forces of barbarity.

It is right that, over the coming months and years, we will remember the horrific carnage that took place a century ago because we owe our freedoms to that sacrifice. While that conflict marked the end of the glorious empires of the 19th century, it also marked the beginning of much that is good in the modern world.

I will write again about how I believe many positives came out of the horrors of war (technology, emancipation, etc.). Nevertheless, the very fact that the army is here on our doorstep is proof that, despite two world wars and a Cold War, the victory of good over evil is not yet complete.

In Wiltshire, therefore, we are honoured that nearly 5,000 more soldiers and their families (a total of about 8,000 people) will be stationed here as the MoD withdraws units from our bases in Germany over the next few years. The county will be the largest recipient of rebasing of any area in the country. Thousands of more families will need thousands of more homes, more school places, more doctors, etc. etc. Their presence will stimulate our economy in general and the business of the army will promote science and technology industries in the county in particular.

If the army will save our national way of life, will increase our local prosperity and will expand the opportunities for our young people, then I hope we can all put up with the bangs.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

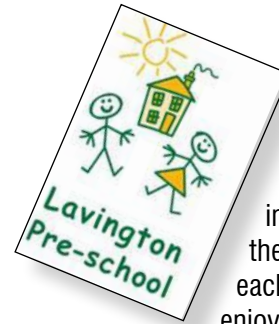

BOOKMARK



We gathered in April to discuss *Perfect*, the surprise new novel by Rachel Joyce and Khaled Hosseini's *And the Mountains Echoed*. Members found that although *Perfect* was intriguing – and definitely worth a second read, it was not deemed as beguiling as *The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry*. The story was structured in two parallel narratives, and although the connections between the two were slowly unravelled, the focus required following the busy plot – and dealing with the stark portrayal of mental illness was at times a little tricky. Nonetheless, we felt the novel was well written, containing superb characterizations and scored 8 marks out of 10 from our group.

We all agreed that *And the Mountains Echoed* contained the 'wow factor' for its emotional opening, which ricocheted throughout the entire novel. Hosseini's third novel set in Afghanistan was deemed a sad but powerful read; informative, tense and absorbing. It was also thought to be confusing as it was written in the first person and spoken by numerous characters over a period of time. We all confessed to much page turning and re-winds to confirm the current narrator, but agreed it was well worth the effort. Although some members felt this novel fell slightly short of *The Kite Runner* & *A Thousand Splendid Suns*, it still scored 9 out of 10.

One of our members spent a few days in the Brixham area and reported that Agatha Christie's House 'Greenway', bought by the author and her husband in 1938 and now a National Trust property, was well worth a visit. The house features in several murder mysteries, the setting is superb and once in that part of Devon there is the option to travel there by train, boat or bus (the bus being the old 1940s vehicle once used as a mobile library in the TV series *Heartbeat* – a beautifully renovated 'boneshaker'). Agatha Christie apparently didn't have a specific place in the house to write, but there on prominent display sits her faithful Remington Portable – apparently identical to the one many of us learnt to type on. Oh dear! Another piece of our childhood to be found in a museum!

Members will have met again at the Village Hall at 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday May 28th to mull over two Man Booker prize winning novels – *The Luminaries* by Eleanor Catton and *Offshore* by Penelope Fitzgerald. The former is last year's winner and the longest Man Booker prize novel – and the latter won the award in 1979, being the shortest Mann Booker prize novel. Our following session will be held on Wednesday July 2nd to discuss Katherine Stansfield's *The Visitor and The Goldfinch* by Donna Tartt. Meanwhile, there's a large glass of wine for every member who completes *The Luminaries* (all 832 pages!) - and I'm afraid I shan't be one of them as I fell by the wayside – on an undisclosed page!

Gardeners are always glad of the opportunity to see what fellow gardeners are up to. We cannot help peeping through hedges or over garden gates for a glimpse of what lies on the other side. So when three of our club

members invited us for a tour of their gardens there was no shortage of people eager to take part in the visits.

We were lucky to have a fine evening for the garden tours. We started in a beautiful, mature and well manicured garden. There were clipped hedges, well stocked borders, topiary shrubs, well shaped trees, and freshly mown lawns. And the vegetable patch was picture perfect. The owner had advised us at the start of the tour that we were welcome to pull out any weeds that we found but, despite looking very carefully, I could not find any.

As we walked to the next garden on our tour it was explained that what we were about to see was nothing like the first garden. And indeed it was very different. The former owner had used his garden as a place to restore old military vehicles. The new owners are artists and designers. They had to start from scratch to create their garden. Their emphasis was on shape and colour. Many of their plants were what is described in the catalogues as architectural and the colour of the foliage seemed important too. They had incorporated fabulous pieces of driftwood into the borders and had arranged bits of old ironwork as pieces of sculpture, and there was a glitterball nestling amongst a clump of driftwood. It looked to me as if some of the sculptures would produce different sounds in different weather and that frost and rain and snow would visually alter them. The garden was a feast to the eyes. The eclectic collection of objets enhanced the experience. It is a garden that will evolve and there is something there for every season.

The final garden on our tour had an old orchard at the end of the garden. Here, beneath the apple trees free range hens were roaming. A luxuriant rambling rose hedge, bursting with buds, divided the orchard from the lawned garden next to the house. When the owners bought the house the garden had been very neglected. But the structure was there beneath the weeds. And now the garden lives again with beautiful borders and raised beds with very striking layered stonework.

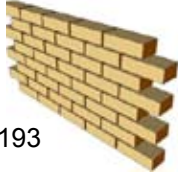
