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

## Dear Friends,

Whether Scotland becomes a separate nation or not will be known within 24 hours of writing this. It's an issue that seems to have come upon us very suddenly and one with huge repercussions that have scarcely been debated. I've been saddened by the short-termism of some of the debate – getting rid of Westminster governments when we all know that they come and go - and the unwillingness to consider the bigger picture. Whatever the result, half of those living north of the border will be unhappy and relationships within what is now the UK will change.

As we reflect on the Union and what constitutes unity, maybe there's something to be learnt from the Church. Unity is a question that Christians wrestle with, as we worship within different denominations and as we hold very different views within our own churches.

Famously in John 17 Jesus prayed for the believers that '*they may all be one*'. Such unity is not about all agreeing about everything, nor about all believing the same thing; rather it's about relationships. For Christians, as we come to fully appreciate God's love for us, so we are more likely to be able to respond positively to the command '*to love one another*'.

The cause of Christian unity both today and down the centuries has been hindered because people have loved their own religious organisations, their own creeds and their own rituals more than they have loved each other. If we realised how much God loves us, we'd be better at loving each other wherever we all come from.

# WHAT IS THE FUTURE FOR NHS SERVICES IN WILTSHIRE?

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group is led by local GPs. We plan and pay for the majority of NHS services that you use across the county. Over the next five years, we know that demand for NHS services in Wiltshire will continue to increase but the money we have available to spend on these services will not increase at the same rate.

Modern advances in healthcare are helping people to live for longer than ever before which is a cause for celebration. However, this does mean that the demand for NHS services from the over-65s is expected to increase significantly over the coming years. As a result, the CCG needs to adapt the way we provide NHS services so that they better meet the needs of our ageing population.

#### How will we meet this challenge?

The CCG has developed a Five Year Plan to enable us to respond to this challenge. Our plan sets out how we can continue to provide high quality but affordable health services in Wiltshire between now and 2019. We won't be doing it alone either. Our key partners like Wiltshire Council, GP surgeries, local hospitals and other NHS providers are vital to the success of the plan.

It will mean some major changes to the shape of health care services in Wiltshire. Our vision is that health and social care services should support and sustain independent living and as the organisation responsible for designing and commissioning those services, we are keen to make them both affordable and the best possible for local people.

Our model for the future of health care in Wiltshire is based on three key principles:

- 1. Encourage and support Wiltshire residents to take on more responsibility for their own health and wellbeing
- 2. Provide fair access to a high quality and affordable system of care for the greatest number of people
- 3. Provide less care in hospitals and more care at home or in the community

To achieve these aims we will need to change the way in which we spend our budget. We will:

- 1. Spend more money on health education and prevention to help people take more personal responsibility for their health and wellbeing
- 2. Spend more money to improve community care and increase the range of services provided in a local setting
- 3. As a result, we would need to spend proportionately less money on providing bed-based care in hospital

We are going to split Wiltshire up into 20 clusters of approximately 20,000 people. Each cluster will have an integrated team of GP surgeries, community nurses and therapists together with social worker support which will work together to ensure that we have a more joined up system of health and social care.

## How can you get more involved?

The CCG has already been carrying out a wide-ranging consultation about our Five Year Plan across the county and this has included public meetings, outreach events, and presentations to a variety of organisations. You may have been involved in one of these events?

Over the next few months the CCG will be giving presentations at the 18 Area Boards across the county. Each Area Board is planning a health fair with lots of different stalls for you to visit followed by presentations from the CCG and Wiltshire Council about our plans for improving health and social care. ## ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO Francis Herbert Marks killed in action 24th October 1914

Frank Marks was born in Bulkington in 1892, the son of George Marks and his wife Sarah Hobbs. George came from Bulkington, but Sarah was born in West Lavington. They had nine children.

In 1911 the family was living in Little Cheverell. George was working as a cowman, and their three eldest sons, including Frank, were all working as labourers on the dairy farm. The family moved to The Gables, 74 High Street, Littleton Panell around the time of WW1.

Frank served with the 2nd battalion of the Wiltshire regiment, which landed in Zeebrugge on 7th October 1914. They were engaged in the first battle of Ypres, and Frank was killed in action on 24.10.1914 at Beselare, Belgium. Superior numbers of German forces attacked the trenches at 5.30 a.m. They were initially repelled, with heavy German losses, but a second wave of attack was more successful, leading to continuous fighting for more than two hours. The Germans managed to breach the defences, and the Wiltshires were forced to retreat with loss of sixty six men, and many more were captured.

Frank has no known grave and is remembered on the Menin Gate at Ypres and the West Lavington war memorial.

## Arthur Beaven Budgell killed in action 31st October 1914


Arthur, or Beaven as he was known in the family, was born in 1894 in Fordingbridge, Hampshire. His father, Eli Budgell was a coachman, originally from Yeovil in Somerset. Eli's wife was Emma Marlow, and she came from Fordingbridge, the daughter of a miller.

Beaven was the youngest child of Eli and Emma. They lived at a' Becketts Cottage in Littleton Panell in 1911, so it seems likely that Eli was the coachman for the Holloway family who were living at a' Becketts at that time. Beaven had a sister and three older brothers.

Beaven was a regular soldier prior to the outbreak of World War One. He enlisted into the 2nd Dragoon Guards, otherwise known as Queen's Bays, and was with the regiment in Aldershot in 1911. At the outbreak of World War 1 his regiment was part of the original British Expeditionary Force, arriving in France on 16th August 1914. The regiment formed a part of the 1st Cavalry division, and they were charged with defending the ridge at Messines, to prevent the Germans from advancing to Ypres. On 31st October, the Germans began an attack at 4.30 a.m. After nearly five hours of

On 31st October, the Germans began an attack at 4.30 a.m. After nearly five hours of heavy fighting, they succeeded in breaking through the British line, and the British were forced to retreat, with a house to house battle as they made their way out of the town. It was during this battle that Beaven was killed, near Hollebeke.

It was during this battle that Beaven was killed, near Hollebeke. Beaven has no known grave, but is remembered on the Menin Gate Memorial, and the West Lavington war memorial.

## **NEWS FROM HOLY TRINITY C OF E PRIMARY ACADEMY** Great start to the school year!

We had a wonderful start to our school year - in the very first week of term, we took all our children to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard to see HMS Victory and the Mary Rose. This was a tremendous

way to start our topic centred around Turner's painting of The Fighting Temeraire (which was a sister ship to HMS Victory). Children have completed wonderful projects on this theme already - biographies of Admiral Lord Nelson and Turner, comparison between the Tudor ship, the Mary Rose, and the Georgian ship, the Victory, studies of life on board the ships, the Battle of Trafalgar and the food that was eaten, to name but a few. We have also seen some lovely art from the children on the theme.

#### **New children**

We are always delighted to welcome our new children into our school - most of them into the Foundation Stage but others in various year groups through the school. We are a warm and welcoming community and new children settle quickly. We have been particularly pleased with the youngest children who have adjusted to school life and routines remarkably quickly! Our strong and supportive families help to ensure that transition is effective and learning is outstanding.

#### Universal Infant Free School Meals

In line with government requirements, all children in the Infants (Foundation stage, Year 1 and Year 2) receive free school meals if they want them. This initiative has rolled out very successfully in our school, thanks to the careful planning and preparation of our catering and MDSA team. In addition to enjoying the food, children work hard on table manners, being polite to each other, engaging in good conversation with others at the table and helping the younger children so that important life skills are learnt at lunch time as they are through the whole school day.

#### **Academic Excellence**

Once again, the academic achievements of our children have been outstanding - our average point score in the KS2 SATS this year was 31.8 and every Year 6 child achieved a level 4 or better in all subjects. More than a guarter of our children achieved Level 5 in all subjects - an exceptional achievement. Comparative data (allowing us to compare ourselves with schools nationally) will be available in late October, and will show that we have, once again, excelled in all areas - phonics, KS1 and KS2 SATS.

# LAVINGTON PRE-SCHOOL

So far this term the children have been really enjoying their investigations into our topic area, 'the weather', and all our new children have settled well and made new friends. Last week we made our own sunshine using paper plates and bright tissue paper: we made lightening clouds with cotton wool and paint and we made some rainbows using various different materials, some collected from the garden. Some of the children also painted and took home some beautiful pictures of the people they love.

**TOP TIP:** As part of our monthly entry we have decided to incorporate a top tip to help extend your child's learning and development. This week you could 'help your child to notice and discuss patterns around them e.g. rubbings from grates, covers or bricks'. This is from the EYFS (Early Years Foundation Stage), Understanding the world, 40-60 months.

BRISTOL STANDARD: Lavington Pre-school has recently committed to gaining the Bristol Standard certificate. 'The Bristol Standard is a self evaluation framework that enables settings to continually reflect on their practice to improve the quality and effectiveness of their provision for all children and families'. If you would like any more information on this or have any questions please come and ask, we have a leaflet which explains in greater detail the framework of the Bristol Standard.

2 YEAR OLD FUNDING: In April 2014 the Government broadened the criteria for 2 year old funding for up to 15 hours per week and you may now find that you fall into the eligibility criteria if you have a child between 24 - 36 months old. If you are a parent in receipt of one of the following:

Income Support

Lavington

Pre-school

- Income based Job Seekers Allowance (JSA)
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Support under part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Tax credit and have an annual household income of less than £16,190 (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs).

Or if the two year old:

Schools News

- · Has a statutory statement of Special Educational Needs (SEN) or an Education, Health and Care plan. As statements and statutory plans are issued by Wiltshire council we are able to identify these children internally. Therefore parents are unable to self-refer for funding based on this criteria
- Has left local authority care through a Special Guardianship Order, adoption or a Residence Order
- · Is currently a Looked After Child, for example in foster care
- Is in receipt of Disability Living Allowance (DLA)

## A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

If you have a good memory you may recall that, over a year ago, I wrote about the benefits of joint working with other public sector organisations. The police are now sharing Wiltshire Council offices and one of the areas where that association is proving most valuable is in safeguarding vulnerable children. In recent times, this has been a very topical subject!

One other area where joint working is proving helpful is public health, which was integrated with the Council in April 2013. The new public health team has just published its first annual report for the year 2013/14. As I write, the report has only just been approved by the Cabinet and I cannot provide an easy link, but by the time you read this is will probably be available online via www.wiltshire.gov.uk/healthandsocialcare/ publichealthwilts.htm where there is much other useful information.

In its first year the public health team has successfully contained a measles outbreak. has supported around 2,500 people to stop smoking and has helped 285 people at risk of diabetes. It also successfully dealt with the health effects of the flooding last winter - remember that?

Other areas of importance include Early Intervention, ensuring children have the best start in life, reducing childhood obesity, reducing the impacts of drugs and alcohol and ensuring sexual health and wellbeing for young people. 5,900 young people were tested for Chlamydia of which 8.7% were positive and all of whom were treated.

For older people there were many other actions including assisting in the development of the Joint Wiltshire Dementia Strategy and supporting the "Before I Forget" campaign. More information is available at www.wiltshire.gov.uk/healthandsocialcare/ socialcareadults/healthandmedicaladvice/mentalhealthdementia.htm .

Wiltshire Council and the NHS CCG are working closely together on the wider aspects of mental health and a consultation will soon be underway on the strategy to deal with this. If this is an area that concerns you, look out for the publicity.

One other consultation that is now underway involves the Fire & Rescue Service that is considering a merger with Dorset and closer association with Wiltshire and Swindon Councils. # WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

After a glorious summer, it's back to work. The Parish Council's first meeting of the autumn season took place on Thursday, 4th September, with a very full agenda. You will find below some reminders and issues of particular importance that we'd like to bring to everyone's attention.

**Back-to-school:** The Footpath Working Group continues to be busy clearing paths and strimming. Now that classes have resumed, we would ask householders please to cut back (to their property line) any hedges which extend over the pavements in order that young people walking to and from school can have full use of the pavement width – many thanks!

**BMX track repairs and fencing damage:** Works to repair the surface of the BMX track have been completed. Repairs following vandalism to part of the fence line on the northern perimeter of the recreation ground - which subsequently resulted in an accident involving injury - have also been arranged. They will include improvements to the overall condition of the fence structure.

**Recreation ground littering and waste:** Sadly, casual littering around the recreation ground, never previously a problem, has become a serious issue over the summer. As a parish, we are very fortunate to have such marvellous extended playing facilities. In order that all may enjoy them fully, users are urged to bin their litter in one of the bins provided or take it home for disposal.

New arrangements for waste removal from the recreation ground have been put in place. They will be managed by the Village Hall cleaner with grant funding from the Council. Three bins will be in service - in the Village Hall car park, Robert's Playground, and next to the BMX track - plus a new suite of six dog waste bins located around the perimeter of the grounds. The litter bin situated outside the recreation ground between Eastfield and Holmfield will be removed.

**New police communities crime and anti-social initiative:** Wiltshire Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon are looking to involve communities in the prevention and reduction of crime and anti-social behaviour. Working alongside Neighbourhood Watch, Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging aims to improve the flow of information between communities and the police. All residents can subscribe directly for free messages - by email, text or voicemail - about policing and crime matters relating to their area.

# BOOKMARK

Our members met at the village hall in September to discuss Margaret Forster's The Unknown Bridesmaid and The Aftermath by Rhidian Brook. Neither novel was a barrel of laughs, but we still enjoyed reading them. We agreed the former wasn't one of the author's best novels, but it was



deemed interesting, although slightly disturbing. The protagonist is a somewhat spooky child psychologist who has a sympathetic eve and ear for troubled children - because she was herself defined as a problem child. But the adult Julia has not moved on from her own situation, which questions her career choice and ability! We liked Margaret Forster's writing and agreed with a high profile literary review – but we had to look up solipsistic! We scored the author's latest novel 8 marks out of 10.

The Aftermath is a post-apocalyptic story set in Hamburg in 1946, where occupying British forces attempt to filter and classify a destitute German population. In a harsh winter, countless displaced adults and feral orphans compete to survive in an era of denazification and non-fraternisation. The novel is a narrative of both sides' barbarities and repercussions, but is not altogether a tale of doom & gloom. The characters seem to jump out of the page, and there are many lighter moments, including compassion, human decency, adolescent humour and a little romance. Our group found The Aftermath to be both absorbing and enlightening on a subject we knew little about. We awarded this novel 9 marks out of 10.

The final two reads for our book club this year will be The Signature of all Things by Elizabeth Gilbert and Lori Baker's The Glass Ocean - to be discussed on October 29th at Great Cheverell's village hall (7.30 p.m.)

In Tokyo they found some small gardens that were a green oasis surrounded by high rise. In Kyoto they visited Kinkaku, a temple covered in gold leaf that appears to float above the mirror pond. 
