



THE NESTLING TRUST

In March this year I returned to Nepal.

The Nestling Trust were organizing a four day Dental Camp in the village of Marbu, where the Trust has been supporting a health clinic for the past year.

During my visit I was also happy to meet the building contractors whom the Nestling Trust appointed to construct the Children's Home at Sarangkot.

On 9th April '15 it was agreed for building work to commence.

On the 25th April 2015 at 11.56 local time a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Nepal. It killed more than eight and a half thousand people and injured more than 19,000. A second earthquake measuring 7.3 magnitude occurred on 12th May adding to loss of life and injury. Massive destruction was caused in Kathmandu, and other towns and many villages were reduced to rubble.

I would like to thank the many, many people who supported me through this time. Your prayers and messages gave me strength when I needed it most.

The Nestling Trust was able to offer immediate aid and took medical supplies, water. food, tents and plastic sheeting to remote villages. We are continuing to provide materials so villagers are able to construct simple bamboo and tin homes before the monsoon season arrives. The health clinic at Marbu is in ruins but our nurse continues to provide vital medical aid from a tent facility.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

Lt Col John Carden Killed in Action 10th August 1915

John Carden was born in 1870 as the youngest of a nine children in a prosperous family. After education at the Royal Navy School he served in the Bulawayo Field Force and served in the Boer War. As a result of prominent service there he was appointed to the Order of St Michael and St George

He retired from the Rhodesia Police Force in 1912 and returned to England, where he settled with his wife and son in West Lavington. He took up the tenancy of Russell Cottage in Stibb Hill from December 1912. They also had a residence in south -west London at 67 Egerton Gardens. John volunteered his services when the Great War started and was given the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the 5th battalion Wiltshire Regiment.

At 1am on 10th August the battalion marched on a steep and winding course towards a gulley at Salzli Biet in Gallipoli. The Battalion was guided by a New Zealand Officer and they arrived two hours before sunrise about 3am. The men were told to dig into dugouts and make themselves comfortable as the position was quite safe. Men therefore removed their equipment and rifles. As soon as it was light machine guns opened fire on the men lying in their dug outs. About 1/4 of an hour later there was a rush of Turks from both sides of the depression which drove the men, unarmed and unequipped down the gulley.. The bottom of the gulley was commanded by machine guns and so escape was cut off.

At the end of the day at least twelve officers and many men had been killed. Lt Col John Carden was listed as missing. He was later recorded as killed in action. He was mentioned in despatches for gallant and distinguished service in the field.

Lance Corporal Henry Blagdon PO/6388 Killed in Action 27th August 1915

Henry was one of twelve children born in West Lavington to agricultural labourer James Blagden and his wife Sarah Anne Early. Henry was born in 1871, and he grew up in Duck Street, West Lavington. His father died in 1884, and his mother remarried in 1889. Her new husband was Job Bailey, and the family lived in Church Street, West Lavington.

In 1891 Henry was working as an agricultural labourer. He was called up on 2nd August 1914 and was a part of the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force from 28th February 1915, serving with the 2nd Royal Marine Battalion. He became part of the Royal Naval Division which landed at Gallipoli on 25th April 1915.

Henry received four good conduct medals and achieved promotion to Lance Corporal.

On 27th August at 5pm the British contingent at Gallipoli, along with detachments from the Australian and New Zealand forces advanced on the Turkish troops with a heavy artillery bombardment.

The battle continued for two days, but there was eventual success with very heavy loss of life on both sides. The result was complete command of the hill overlooking the Anafarta Sagir valley, and safer lateral communications between Anzac and Suvla Bay. Allied casualties in this hotly contested affair amounted to 1,000. It is estimated the Turkish casualties were no less than 5,000. Three Turkish machine-guns and forty six prisoners were taken, as well as three trench mortars, 300 Turkish rifles, 60,000 rounds of ammunition, and 500 bombs. Four hundred acres were added to the territories of Anzac. Henry was killed in action on 27th August 1915 at Gallipoli, in this battle.

DOG FOULING: DANGEROUS AND ANTI-SOCIAL A message from West Lavington Parish Council

Dog faeces left in public are unsanitary and an eyesore. With summer weather on the way, they will smell and attract flies. They can carry a parasite which, if ingested by humans, can cause toxocariasis, which may lead to blindness and other health problems. 10% of all abortions in cattle in this country is caused by neosporosis. spread in dog faeces. Yet this highly dangerous and anti-social practice is increasing in the Parish of West Lavington!

A significant minority of dog owners leave their dog's mess for others to stand in. Children fall into it while playing on the recreation ground or step on it when walking along the path to school. Mothers push a pram through it. It is disgusting and dangerous. Even worse are those who put the faeces in a poo bag and then toss it away. Volunteers strimming our footpaths can accidentally explode discarded poo bags full of the faeces into the air.

The cure is simple. Clean up after your pet, using a poo bag. Then dispose of it in one of the 6 red dog bins provided by the Parish Council around the parameters of the recreation ground, or get rid of it at home.

Let's not give Wiltshire Council a reason to introduce dog mess DNA testing, as has happened in London, or force dog owners to register their pets on a DNA database or impose a serious fine on any dog walker found without a bag to collect waste.

Please help to eradicate this issue from the parish!

WEST LAVINGTON VILLAGE HALL FUNDRAISING

The Village Hall needs £8,000 to update the heating and lighting and we estimate a further £7,000 to replace damaged panelling and redecorate when the work is done. Thus far we have raised £5778 from grants, £500 from local businesses, £600 from the Spring Fayre and £128 from private donations, the vast majority of which was donated during the Spring Fayre. Whilst we continue to seek grant funding, we are

still £8,000 short of the money needed. If you can spare a donation, however small, there are collection boxes in Cost Cutters and the Bridge Inn. Village Hall Committee members will also be pleased to take your money. Thank you in anticipation.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division In one of my recent Messages, I suggested that the General Election could be seen as an expression of the liberty of the people that can be linked back to the Magna Carta, signed 800 vears ago.

A mere two hundred years ago, another event curtailed the career of a despotic ruler of the time and that too has had implications that resonate today. I refer, of course, to the Battle of Waterloo.

In the years before Waterloo, Napoleon had sought to extend his hegemony across the whole of Europe. Military power was part of it but Napoleon had also sought to diminish the prosperity and growth of his rival, Great Britain, by the imposition of a large-scale embargo against British trade. This policy was known as the Continental System and it was, in part, successful. British trade dropped considerably, but the law of unintended consequences applied and Marseille, Bordeaux and La Rochelle also suffered from the loss of trade. Across the continent, food prices rose and the resentment of client states against Napoleon increased. Russia's refusal to join the Continental System led eventually to the invasion of Russia in 1812 and Napoleon's defeat there marked the beginning of his downfall.

Indeed, the support of other nations was vital to Wellington's success at Waterloo. His army was described as a Coalition and included Dutch and Belgian troops and soldiers from various

German states as well. The battle was eventually won only after the intervention of the Prussians under Blucher.

I am not sure if we can draw any lessons from this. The power of free trade? The need for alliances? The fact that what seems like a good idea at the time can have unintended consequences?

I can't help noticing that the Waterloo battlefield is very near to Brussels and, in a year or two's time, the liberty of the British people will again be expressed in the EU Referendum. It will be interesting to see if that too becomes a landmark in history.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council's last meeting before the summer break takes place on Thursday, 2nd July. The Council will reconvene on Thursday, 3rd September.

Clerk's appointment: At the time of writing, the Council's personnel panel is in the process of interviewing applicants for the Parish Clerk position left vacant following the retirement of Peter Baxter at the end of June after 5 years of outstanding service to the Council and the community. As a consequence of his leaving, the Council's email address has now changed to clerk@westlavington.info.

BMX track: A contractor has been engaged to undertake refurbishment of the BMX track. The work will take in the region of 10 days to complete. It is intended that use of the track will resume by the time of the Church Fete on Saturday, July 11th.

Playground benches: An offer has been received from the Playgrounds Committee to fund replacement of two rotten picnic benches with products made of recyclable materials.

Hedge cutting: Property owners are reminded of their responsibility to cut back hedges that overhang pavements and footpaths on their land.

Loose manhole covers: In response to correspondence regarding loose manhole covers and gullies in Littleton Panell High Street, the matter has been reported to Wiltshire Council highways officers.

Semington Brook railings: In response to the Council's notification to Wiltshire Council's highways officers concerning the condition of the railings in Church Street, the Council has been informed that the reduction in the local government grant and budgetary pressures within Local Highways means that they are only able to carry out works which are a statutory duty and works to the railings are unlikely to be possible within their budgets.

Streetscene: Initial steps to enhance Littleton Panell/West Lavington's streetscene have been completed. Planting has taken place at Willow Court, the bus shelters, Hooks Court and Duck Street. Clearing of weeds from pavements abutting the road has also been undertaken. However, re-growth has already appeared. We applaud the neighbour in Littleton Panell who was witnessed re-clearing the weeds from in front of her house! Please help her and the streetscene volunteers to keep our street weed-free.

Scam arrest: Following an alert by Trading Standards passed to parish councils by the police. an arrest took place recently thanks to the vigilance of a local Councillor. The scam, mostly targeting elderly vulnerable people, involved door to door fish sellers who stated the price of their fish as "three fifty" but, instead of £3.50, typed £350 into the card reader to which the customer unwittingly entered his or her PIN number. Consequent upon the police warning, the gang were spotted at work in Sandfield and the details were forwarded to the police. Two men were arrested on suspicion of fraud.

NEWS FROM HOLY TRINITY C OF E PRIMARY ACADEMY Donations to enrich our provision

We were delighted to receive a very generous donation of £750 from the Edington Station Yard Ltd this year, with a commitment for a similar sum in the next two years, to support music in our school. Until recently, Government funding has been available

to support projects such as instrument tuition with a music specialist for every Year 3 child, but now that this funding has been withdrawn, we are going to have to find other sources of income to continue with our programme of enrichment. We were, therefore, extremely grateful when the Board of Edington Station Yard Ltd approached us with this offer of funding – their generosity will ensure that the Year 3 programme can continue. We are most fortunate to be part of such a strong and supportive community.

Changes to Education

We are preparing for a change of curriculum, assessment and inspection regimes in line with the Government's new protocols. It is not clear yet how the new system will work but we know that our children will continue to achieve in the outstanding way in which they always do – our teachers are outstanding, our children are committed and aspirational and our families are supportive and engaged.

This term is one of our favourites, with so many different things happening – all our children have had a trip to American museum in Bath, to support our topic on "The Quiltmaker's Gift" – this was a really interesting trip with children learning about Native Americans, European settlers and the culture of the early Americas.

Everyone has also had a workshop on renewable energy and a trip to the Solar Farm in Devizes as the result of a generous donation of time, buses, specialist input and resources by Gaiger Bros Ltd. This project has enriched the work we do on helping children to understand their role as "Stewards of Our World" - our children are going to have to deal with climate change and need to have a solid understanding of the issues involved. We are very grateful to the Gaigers for their support with this work.

News & Views, July & August 2015



Our June meeting was the first in a series of garden visits that we will undertake this summer. We went to heverells Windmill Cottage, in Market Lavington, which is a one acre cottage style, wildlife friendly garden.

The dwelling is in the middle of the plot and surrounded by garden. There is a large pond with an adjoining bog garden. There are many flower beds full of trees, shrubs and flowers. And there is a substantial vegetable garden, and fruit trees and fruit bushes. Between the flower beds there are tightly mown pathways. There are also plenty of patches of long grass left here and there in the garden to provide habitat for wildlife. Some of the boundaries of the garden are delineated by mixed hedges and a clear space has been left between the far side of the hedge and the actual boundary to allow room to prune the outside of the hedge. There are some paved pathways which must prove their worth in the winter. And there is a woodland walk to one side of the garden. Here and there rambling roses or other climbers are supported on archways and other structures. There are plenty of mature trees. Some of these trees were already in the garden when the current owners, Rupert and Gill Wade, moved in. Many of the trees were planted by the current owners and they are already large trees.

Tucked away at the far end of the garden is a large polytunnel filled with seedlings and plants at various stages of development. Rupert belongs to many garden clubs, some of which do seed and plant exchanges. Some of his seedlings are for sale but many are there to restock his own garden. He has a small glasshouse near the vegetable patch. English country gardens always appear as if they would require nothing more than a bit of pruning, mowing and weeding to keep them looking perfect. After all there are plenty of bulbs and shrubs and perennials that will just put on a good display each year, you might think. But as a garden matures different microclimates develop and you may find that plants are no longer thriving in a particular position. For instance, Rupert has found that some of his trees are providing more shade as they mature. So he has had to move his sun loving plants to other areas of the garden. Gardens evolve and require hours of hard work and planning to keep them looking as fresh and vibrant and as beautiful as the garden at Windmill Cottage.

As we moved through the garden the hedge rows and trees were alive with birds. We Noticed that the hostas had no slug damage despite the fact that no slug pellets are used. Perhaps the birds, animals, frogs and toads, and insects in this wildlife friendly garden keep each other in check. Rupert has a painterly eye for colour and there were many exclamations of delight as particular flowers caught our attention.
As the sun began to set we adjourned to the large conservatory for tea, coffee and delicious home-made cake. In July we will visit some garden club members' gardens.




