

WEST LAVINGTON VILLAGE HALL NEWS


Since our last bulletin we have been busy inside the Hall. New lighting on the wall pictures, and uplights above, have much improved the ambience. New blower heaters have been fitted at both ends of the Hall to boost the heating and all coin-in-the-slot meters have been replaced by timers. As heating will no longer be paid for by coins-in-the-slot meters, a small increase in hire charges is required and is published in this issue.

The 50 year old hardboard panelling has been replaced, where not already repaired, and plastering carried out to make good all the electrical and carpentry works. Next is to decorate the whole of the main Hall, which the committee hopes will be completed in October.

Clearly all this work has to be funded. We have applied for another grant from the Area Board of Wiltshire Council, and may be lucky with another separate bid, but nonetheless

will have to dig alarmingly deep into reserve funds. You can help by donating in our boxes in Costcutters and the Bridge Inn or to Committee members at 3 Fieldside. 2 Strawberry Hill or 56 High Street. A really good alternative is to support the Howden-Jones Concert on 29 October, 7 p.m. for 7.30 in the Hall by buying tickets and perhaps bringing a little extra to help fund the improvements. It will be an opportunity to admire the latter and to enjoy a concert which was very popular last year. Details are provided in this issue. We hope to see vou there.

DEVIZES CARNIVAL 2015 Littleton Panell Leads The Way (with a little help from others) We started arriving on The Green from 2 p.m., a motley collection of cowboys, Red Indians, builders, GIs and leather-clad bikers.

We were 'People of the Village' doing Village People! It all started at the end of July when a couple of us decided that it was more fun to actually be in the carnival than to watch it! The word spread and more and more people came forward wanting to join in and we ended up with over seventy in our troupe, with ages ranging from 5 to 70 years old!



We had three or four dance rehearsals over the summer and gradually people learned the routines and began to get their own costumes together. We wanted each group to be more or less identical, so builders all had gold hard hats; Red Indians all had the same set of feather headdresses; cowboys all had identical Stetsons and chaps;

The GIs wore camouflage and the bikers wore all black. A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division Where would you draw the line? I am not thinking about social behaviour (as you may have guessed) but geographical, administrative boundaries. To a geography geek like me, it is an interesting subject.

The definition of administrative boundaries is an ancient art. You may know that the origin of shire counties goes back to Saxon times (Sussex = south Saxons, Norfolk = north folk, etc.). So do parishes. It is not by accident that five of the parishes in this Division are on the spring line at the edge of the Plain (Erlestoke, Great Cheverell, Little Cheverell, West Lavington and Market Lavington) and each has a component on the high chalk-land (grazing) and the lower greensand and clay (arable and forest). It is not by accident either that the parish once owned by the Bishop of Salisbury (West Lavington, formerly called Bishop's Lavington) has the strongest spring and the largest area of the Plain. Look at the map if you want an indication of where power then lay!

Today, the sense of identity that runs with these ancient boundaries still runs deep. How many of you would wish Little Cheverell to merge with Great Cheverell? West Lavington with Market Lavington? Marston with Worton?

No such changes are planned but, elsewhere, change is in the air. Before the next town and county elections in 2017, Roundway parish will merge with Devizes Town, and bits of Bishops Cannings will too. This will reflect the fact that Devizes has effectively grown to absorb these formerly rural areas.

After 2017, boundary changes to Unitary Council Divisions will be necessary to accommodate the population change that army rebasing will bring to Tidworth, Ludgershall, Bulford and Larkill. Perhaps that review will also correct the current anomaly that Poulshot, in sight of Devizes, is aligned administratively at county level with Melksham.

Not long ago, the national Boundary Commission proposed that this Division should become part of a new constituency of Shaftesbury and Warminster. We saw off that foolish idea but the fact that it arose in the first place indicates that the bureaucrats charged with reviewing boundaries are not always aware of geography. Clearly, the Boundary Commission knew nothing of Salisbury Plain.

Council The administrative boundaries of the Police and Crime Commissioner, the Fire Service, the NHS and the EU are also potentially contentious. We geographers have much to keep us interested. Wiltshire

heverells hub bit dry? Not a bit of it, in September we had a lively and entertaining evening with Carl Gill. He arrived laden with prunings, which he handed out freely to us for identification and comment. Interesting discussions ensued about pests,

poisons, pruning, and a host of other things. He wore his learning lightly, spoke from and about experience and we all found out new things.

We heard, for instance, that you should not burn laurel in an enclosed space – it contains cyanide – and don't carry laurel prunings to the tip in your car without plenty of ventilation. We were taught how to tell the difference between hornbeam and beech, even when they have no leaves (look at the buds).We identified cedar by scent and learned that, improbably, cotoneaster, pyracanthus, apple trees and roses all belong to the same family (rosaceae – look at the shape of the flower petals and fruit). The brown spots on sycamore leaves and black spot on our roses are not all bad news – these fungi flourish only when the air is clean.

Capital letters, lower case letters, inverted commas and x in plant names can tell us a lot about the plants – acer grosseri hersii – a maple with white striped trunk and branches, was a spontaneous mutation in the wild, but acer platanoides "Crimson King" has been cultivated; primula x kewensis is a cross between two primulas, but the overpowering leylandii hedge, x cupresso leylandii, was an accidental cross between two totally different types of conifer – and we were given some good alternatives to it for hedging too.

The Latin names which some of us struggle to remember are not all Latin – some come from Greek or indeed English. Although they can help us know exactly which plant we're talking about, they can change. A plant discovery, given a name we know, may years later be found to be something which had already been identified and named, or the naming

rules may change. Often the familiar name persists and is widely used – alyssum maritima, that lovely white useful ground cover is actually, apparently lobularia maritima. But there is the possibility that the plant you try to buy in a garden centre, where someone much younger than you tells you " Sorry, no, we don't have that", is there all the time, but they know it by its newer name.

Our September fun show was no less entertaining. Tables were laden with herbs and vegetables, flowers and fruit, drinks made with garden produce, scones and sponges. Sidelong glances were cast – thought bubbles invisibly hovering: "Is mine better than that one?" or "Oh it's certainly not as good as that" as we placed our own offerings and admired others. We trooped back after the judging for coffee and cake – either celebration or comfort in defeat and a most enjoyable morning of convivial rivalry ended with a judicious sampling from some of the bottles.

On to the next meeting – on October 13th you can learn about "Winding down for winter" from Alan Christopher, who trained with Bath Parks Department, became landscape clerk of works at Bath University and moved on to running his own garden maintenance business. We meet in Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 for 7.30 – non members (£2) and new members are always welcome.


