

It will be a different type of job, living on a traditional agricultural estate. The move involves quite a degree of uncertainly for us, but I'm reminded of the title of a challenging book by the Christian writer John Ortberg, 'If you want to walk on water, you've got to get out of the boat'.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

The process of determining where new housing should go is not entirely straightforward. At a high level, the National Planning Policy Framework has set the principles in favour of more housing and the Wiltshire Core Strategy has laid down policies and minimum numbers for the county. In some cases, the Core Strategy specifies where new housing should go but in nonstrategic locations like this Division, the picture needs colouring by other means.

The first driver for new developments can be developers themselves. Some of you will know that one developer proposed a very unwelcome housing estate outside Great Cheverell. Fortunately, they were seen off at appeal last year after much helpful input from the community. At a smaller scale, the Eastern Area Planning Committee has recently rejected a proposal in Market Lavington on the grounds that entry and exit to the site would be very dangerous, but this may yet face challenge at appeal.

A different problem has been encountered in Victoria Park where many residents would welcome some housing development if it would facilitate repair of the crumbling roads and footpaths and allow their adoption by Wiltshire Council. However, despite already having 50 houses, Victoria Park is designated in planning terms as "open countryside", which would normally prevent new development. I am trying to find a way around that problem.

More positively, Neighbourhood Planning teams in West Lavington, Market Lavington and Worton, are working to identify possible development sites and to assess community opinion about them. The required procedures are challenging to say the least, particularly for a small community reliant on volunteers with little or no professional experience. I commend their hard work (and some of you may know I should probably declare an interest here).

In all of these considerations, one common theme is the problem of highways and traffic. Our local road network is among the worst in the county. Let me know if you have a spare £15,000,000 or so, which could fulfil my ambition for a relief road on the Plain.

Together we did it! We often hear about community spirit and there are many who

say that those days are gone never to return. So what is 'Community Spirit'? There are many definitions but what they all have in common is that they talk about:

- Community, fellowship
- Shared by all or many
- Community of relations or feelings
- A body of fellows or fellow-townsmen
- Union of common ownership

In our parish we are fortunate because we have large numbers of individuals who share the same feelings of a common ownership of the responsibility simply to help others and to make our parish as good as it can be.

This 'Community Spirit', for that is what it is, takes many forms:

- Talking to someone so they feel less lonely.
- Helping to run one of the many local groups and activities
- Taking people to hospital, to doctors' appointments, or luncheon clubs etc.
- Local fundraising
- Fighting off the brambles when clearing footpaths
- Writing/distributing the News and Views parish magazine
- Cleaning outside of your own home
- Being a Parish Councillor
- Supporting a variety of religious activities

These are just a small selection of a vast amount of activity that takes place by largely unsung heroes across our parish throughout the year. We know many of these people but others stay in the background shunning publicity, content in the knowledge that they are doing their bit for this parish and the people who live in it.

The national campaign 'Clean for the Queen' which the parish supported on Saturday 5th March was not about cleaning our parish because we thought the Queen was coming, although that would be nice. What it was about was that thing called 'Community Spirit'; it was about fellowship and about ownership of the place where we live - our parish. Whilst the Queen would probably not be pleased that we found so much rubbish (it filled 47 litter bags), I am sure she would be delighted with our 'Community Spirit' because that is what 'Clean for the Queen' was really about.

Answering the call were individuals who cleaned various streets/locations before the day, and others who have committed themselves to ongoing cleaning projects. In addition we had 26 people turn out on a bitterly cold morning. A substantial clean took place of the playing field and play areas, the Village Hall car park. High Street. Church Street and several of the bus stops.

We still have further work to do and more volunteers will be needed in the future (possibly 21st May) but we have made an excellent start. Homeowners/landowners can assist greatly by cleaning weeds/leaves/

Post Office re-opens

Costcutters' shop-keeper, Siva Raguparan, re-commenced post office services at the shop at 12 noon on Thursday, March 24th. The parish has been without a post office since the death of Derek Hinton in 2007 and, with closures of post offices country-wide, the reinstatement of services was unexpected, but very welcome, news. By the time you are reading this, a formal opening of the service will have taken place at the shop on Tuesday, March 29th at 11.30 a.m. Councillor Richard Gamble, along with members of the Parish Council, which supported Mr Raguparan's application from the outset, were present. So too were customers, neighbours and friends. We very much hope that now it's back, you will support and use the new-style branch!

DAPS' Ofsted Report

The Parish Council extends it congratulations to Dauntsey Academy Primary School and its new Head Teacher! Following an inspector's visit on 3rd February, the school continues its Ofsted rating of Good. The inspector remarked that the leadership team has maintained the good quality of education in the school since the previous inspection, providing strong and determined leadership and displaying a clear vision with high ambitious for the pupils, staff and parents of the school.

Resilience

Wiltshire Council is fully committed to responding to and supporting their communities at times of emergency and crisis. However, to minimise the impact of such situations, the most powerful response is for communities to organise themselves beforehand to produce their own Community Emergency Plan. Local people know their neighbourhoods better than anyone and prior planning can make sure that the local response is as effective as possible and that our community can recover speedily from an emergency.

Emergency episodes are not unknown in the parish. Many will remember the dam burst alert over a decade ago when, at dead of night, Dauntsey House residents had to be evacuated to Devizes Hospital and other residents moved to the Village Hall. More recently, high water levels in Sunnyside as a result of run off from Dauntsey's School playing fields following heavy rains gave rise to another occasion of serious concern and sandbags were deployed. Folklore, all within living memory, also recalls a very heavy snowfall that incapacitated the parish for several days and power cuts.

Your Parish Council has decided to take advantage of the new Devizes Area Emergency Planning initiative. Following a recent Wiltshire Council workshop, we have provided contact details of Parish Risk Committee members to the Council and will be seeking community participation as we draw up our own emergency plan. It will take time to complete but our aim, like that of the boy scouts, is to be prepared! **Clean-up and replanting**

All you need in order to be successful at growing vegetables is deep enough soil, good light levels, available water and heverells feed. This goes for growing in containers, window boxes, raised beds or directly in the garden. At our March meeting, Chris Bird, Lecturer in Horticulture at Sparsholt College

, delivered a fact filled talk about growing vegetables. There was plenty of audience participation.

Sparsholt, as well as being an agricultural college is also the home of the BBC Radio 4 Gardeners Question Time potting shed and garden. As such the College could claim to have a finger on the pulse of the British gardener. Chris certainly seemed to be up to date on developments such as new alternatives to peat, new varieties of vegetables bred to prevent early bolting and other problems, and new propagation trays developed to ensure straight untangled roots on the seedlings. He also scattered plenty of topical tips throughout his talk. For instance, he encouraged us to read the plant by dates on seed packets, and pointed out that at the end of a season suppliers are keen to clear rack space, and so there will be plenty of bargains with enough life to be used for next season's sewing. He advised feeding crops little and often to avoid getting sudden soft growth and thus attracting aphids. He said that the sow dates given on seeds had to encompass a wide geographical spread, and to determine when the soil was warm enough in your garden the appearance of worm casts on the surface was a good indicator. Covering crops with enviromesh, which keeps out pests such as white fly but allows water to penetrate, is a good alternative to spraying with pesticide.

There was a useful discussion about what crops to grow. Apparently there has been a decrease in the demand for brassicas and an increase in squashes. The main thing is to grow what you like to eat. And if you want more variety and have limited space then share your wish list with your neighbours and plan who will grow what and share the produce. And if you do not have a vegetable plot there are many vegetables and herbs that will look good among the flowers in the border. Growing cut and come again salad bowl mixtures of lettuce in a window box near your kitchen is a cheap way to ensure you have a regular supply of fresh salad leaves.

Chris also pointed out that gardening is a multi generational activity. If you grow something that your children or grandchildren like to eat you will soon capture their interest. You can also introduce them to new vegetables. They will learn where food comes from and about seasons.

Our April meeting will be about growing fruit in your garden. In his talk Find room for Fruit Mike Burgess will be encouraging us to make space in our gardens for fruit growing and will be giving us tips about fruit growing on a small scale. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 for a 7.30pm start, on Tuesday 12 April. New members are always welcome. There will be a charge of £2 at the door for non members. The Cheverells Garden Club will be holding a plant sale on Saturday 7 May in Great Cheverell Village Hall. There will more details on local notice boards nearer the time.


