### Dear Friends,

When someone leaves an organisation and they are not replaced immediately, it usually means more work for some of those who are left. In the Church of England, the appointment for a new vicar/rector is a fairly tortuous process. And so as Mary and I prepare to head to East Sussex, some in these five parishes will be preparing to carry extra burdens. Given that no one is getting any younger, that is not a prospect that fills everyone with relish.

There is that saying, that you are as old as you feel. General Douglas MacArthur wrote on these lines:

'Youth is not a period of time. It is a state of mind, a result of the will, a quality of the imagination, a victory of courage over timidity, of the taste of adventure over the love of comfort. A man doesn't grow old because he has lived a certain number of years. A man grows old when he deserts his ideal. The years may wrinkle his skin, but deserting his ideal wrinkles his soul. Preoccupations, fears, doubts and despair are the enemies which slowly bow us towards the earth and turn us into dust before our death.'

One of the features of our times is that many of us are living longer than previous generations and are doing what our forebears did when they were ten years younger. Whilst 'age is a state of mind' has some truth, there are days when we might wish that the medical profession did a line in reconditioned bodies.

In the Eighth Century BC, the prophet Isaiah had these words of encouragement, 'Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.' (Isaiah 40:30-31).



# **RUNNING WITH A PURPOSE**

It was SO exciting. It was just before 9 a.m. and I was lining up with over thirteen thousand other runners and I was so glad to have made it to the start line without any injuries. People were chatting as we waited - two girls said the furthest they'd done was a half marathon and one man said he'd previously done just 8 miles - that made me feel slightly more confident as I knew I'd followed, and stuck rigidly to, a good training plan! During the week before the off, I'd reduced my mileage considerably and, in order to avoid "the dreaded wall", eaten pasta for nearly every meal! And now, here I was, ready to go.

It took nine minutes for me to cross the start line and I kept telling myself to take it slowly. You can't help but go off more quickly than you planned, so, after a couple of miles, I had to make myself slow down. I was still doing 10 and a half minute miles - far guicker than I'd done on any of my long runs. It was a warm day and I had planned to take on water at every station and walk whilst I drank it. However, with the excitement of it all. I missed the first one completely! Nearly the whole of the 26 mile route was lined with people. Spectators and marshals were all clapping and waving, children wanted to hi-five as you went past, bands played, choirs sang and the local churches had bowls of jelly babies and plates of Jaffa cakes on offer! The organisers had arranged for pace



runners and for the majority of the time I managed to keep up with the 'five hour lady'. At around twenty two miles, however, I lost her! No matter how much effort I put in, I just couldn't keep up with her. By this time, I'd decided that I just wanted to finish. As I came over the hill, I was spurred on when I could see the finish line. I crossed it in 5 hours 17 minutes 23 seconds and got my medal. I'd done it! What an amazing day! If anyone watched the London Marathon (or any other race) and thought "I'd like to do that", then have a go. DO IT and sign up! It's a great feeling- I am so proud of myself: I came 170th in my category and my medal, which is hanging up in the kitchen, makes me smile every time I look at it.

# THE WILTSHIRE REGIMENT IN WORLD WAR ONE

My latest book is a month by month account of what each of the battalions of the Wiltshire Regiment was doing during the Great War.

I am not a military historian, so the book is more about the social aspects of the lives of the soldiers, rather than army tactics, although there has to be some of that. It tells where each battalion was, details when they were in the trenches, what they did when not in the trenches, which battles they fought in, when they had baths, what the weather was like, etc.

So if you had ancestors who served in the Wiltshire Regiment, this book will give you a good idea of what they did during their military service.

# **100 YEARS AGO** May 1916 Private William Copeland Austin Killed in Action 11th May 1916

William was born in Sussex in 1896, the son of Scottish parents, Robert and Isabella Austin. Robert was a domestic gardener, and in 1901 the family lived in Shaw, Wiltshire where William's younger brother, Hector, was born.

In 1911 Robert, Isabella and Hector were living at Russell Mill in Littleton Panell, while William was in lodgings in Devizes and working as an apprentice printer. By 1915 the family was living in Hawkswell Cottage, Little Cheverell.

On 9th November 1915 William enlisted in the Royal Scots (Lothian) Regiment, and he was posted straightaway. After training he embarked at Folkestone on 10th March 1916 and joined the 13th Battalion in the field in France on 1st April 1916.

William was posted as missing on 11th May 1916 at Loos in France, and later presumed killed in action on or around that day. His brother Hector later served with the 3rd Battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment in Ireland.

# **MARKET LAVINGTON SCOUTS**

There has been a scout group in Market Lavington since the 1920s. The group has its own hall and has many young members from the local villages as far away as Seend. At the end of the year 2 leaders who have each been with the group for over 20 years are leaving.

Full training is provided for all roles, along with support from the scout district and county. The training is recognised for membership of the Institute of Leadership and Management.

These are the roles that need to be filled.

#### **Cub Leader (Akela)**

The cubs meet 28 times a year. The leader wears uniform, plans and leads activities, and follows the full training scheme.

#### **Cub Helper**

Cub helpers help run the meetings about 7 times a year, running activities and acting as a witness to the events of the evening. There must always be at least 2 adults at every meeting.

#### **Group Scout Leader**

This is the person, who is the public face of the group. He or she will manage and support the Scout Group and its Leaders to ensure it runs effectively and that Scouting within the Group develops in accordance with the rules and policies of The Scout Association.

#### **Training Advisor**

The key role of a Training Adviser is to support a learner through The Scout Association's Adult Training Scheme.

# A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division Where do you think responsibility should lie for the various functions that must be undertaken to support and maintain a civilised society?

The list starts with each of us as individuals. Above that there are tiers of family, community, nation and human society as a whole.

Corporately, in administrative terms, the tiers of authority are parish council, unitary council, national government and European Union. Perhaps I should top the list with the United Nations but I am not sure if I can credit that august body with "authority".

My view is that, if you want things done, the best place to start is at the bottom! If you can, do it yourself. If you can't, ask the parish council, then Wiltshire Council, then government, etc. If you see litter, pick it up. Don't rely on someone else to do it. If your footpath needs clearing and you can't do it yourself, ask the parish council (but then why not volunteer to help?). Notice a pot hole in the highway? That's a job for the professionals, so Wiltshire Council may be able to solve it (but money is scarce, remember). Worried about national defence? Best leave that to the government. I'm not going to mention the EU!

Of course, you may be a person who rebels against any authority, established order, or ruling power (and I will admit that my desk does have a touch of anarchy about it). But selfish individuality simply does not work in a family, let alone in a community. Anarchy is a state of lawlessness or political disorder and, you may agree, it is almost certainly less desirable than a functioning democracy.

At the other end of the scale is tyranny, which is defined as "a situation in which someone or something controls how you are able to live, in an unfair way".

Your next chance to take part in our democracy is the Police and Crime Commissioner election on May 5th. I hope you will make your mark!

#### 'Ready for anything'?

Are you ready for anything, is your family, is our community, your business, your organisation, your Parish Council, ready and prepared to stay safe in the event of an emergency happening on our doorstep?

When an emergency happens will be the first time that each of us will find out whether we really are 'Ready for anything'.

Some will say "We don't get emergencies here they only happen in other places". No doubt that is exactly what the people in those places used to say also!

Even in our parish, we had the dam burst alert over a decade ago in West Lavington when, at dead of night, Dauntsey House residents had to be evacuated to Devizes Hospital and other residents moved to the Village Hall. More recently, high water levels as a result of runoff from Dauntsey's School playing fields gave rise to another occasion of concern and sandbags were deployed. Many of us can remember very heavy snowfalls that incapacitated the parish for several days and power cuts.

Climate change has brought more storms with high damaging winds. Pandemic flu, diseases of farm animals, loss of heating, loss of telephones, and our proximity to a large military training area have potential for serious impacts on each of us in being able to go about our day to day activity.

Emergencies can and will affect everyone, you, me, our families, our organisations and our neighbours and so we really will be 'All in this together'. By 'all' I mean, for example, residents, schools, churches, surgeries, businesses, surrounding parishes, village organisations, youth organisations, Link organisations, care homes, the young, the elderly and the vulnerable, landowners/farmers, the military.

We can never replace the work of local emergency responders, but there are fewer of them nowadays. We can, however, complement and support them and help reduce the impact of an emergency. We can become more resilient.

We know our streets and neighbourhoods better than anyone and the most powerful thing we can do is to work together now before any emergency happens to produce our own '**Community Emergency Plan'.** 

The Parish Council on your behalf has decided that we will prepare such a plan that will assist us all, and we have already started, but we need your help.

#### So what can you do? - Two things!

1. Understand that you, your family, your organisation/business/institution/or group could have Counci an important role to play in protecting yourself and others. That role could be identifying those in the community who need safeguarding, in evacuating vulnerable members of the community to safety, in providing a refuge, transport, or accommodation. It could be in just reassuring and talking to someone who is on their own during an emergency.

#### LITTLE CHEVERELL PARISH COUNCIL Meeting on 13th April 2016

Three members of the public and Cllr Richard Gamble were in attendance. The following were the main items discussed.

#### 1. Village Roads and Signs.

1.1. Complaints were received about the potholes in Low Road and the Chair agreed to report the matter to Wiltshire Council.

1.2. There were still incidents of HGVs using Low Road. Cllr. Gamble said that in order for a log of this to be kept all cases should be reported to him as soon as possible Wherever possible the registration details and company name should be noted with a view to a police prosecution and a direct approach to the company involved.

1.2. Anne Venus said that the new road signs ' Single Track Road No Passing Place' had been approved and were awaiting installation.

1.3. Complaints were received that little had been done about hedge trimming along Low Road and the Chair said he would report the matter again to Wiltshire Council.

#### 2. Low Road 20 mph Speed Limit.

2.1. Michael Maxwell reported that the Parish Council's letter that he had drafted was scheduled for discussion by the Community Area Transport Group on 20 July 2016.

#### 3. Superfast Broadband.

3.1. Concerning the very low broadband speed at roughly ten houses at the north end of Low Road, Mr Maxwell briefed the Council on his frustrating and as yet unsuccessful dealings with BT. The Council agreed that a letter be written to BT offering to pay  $\pounds 250$  for a survey to be conducted as to the feasibility of rerouting the wiring to the affected houses from the cabinet in Littleton Panell a much shorter route to the cabinet in Great Cheverell.

#### 4. Village Hall Improvements.

4.1. Improvements to the village hall were discussed; Cllr. Gamble took the opportunity to inform the meeting that Lottery and Area Board funds were available for this and he outlined the funding for recent major improvements to nearby village halls. After a brief discussion one idea that was put forward was for a new kitchen. The Chair said that he would be happy to receive suggestions from all members of the village.

#### 5. Footpaths.

5.1. Gil Rooke reported that he would shortly sort out a programme of works to put into effect the alterations to stiles and gates approved by the Pathways Improvements Grant Scheme.

#### 6. Next Meeting.

6.1. The next meeting would be the annual Parish Meeting and AGM at 7pm on Tuesday 24th May in the village hall.

#### WEST LAVINGTON PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN Summary of Draft Neighbourhood Plan Consultation 2015/16

The results of the Consultation exercise have been extremely interesting and most valuable to the process of preparing the final Plan. As a result of the significant level and quality of feedback received it is possible to regard the results as a genuine reflection of the community's views which will give added force to the proposals in the Plan as they are developed.

The community response to the levels of housing growth showed no clear consensus other than rejecting no growth or over 100 houses. The proportion choosing less than 50 houses to that wanting 50 to 75 houses was very closely matched with only a 2% difference. There was also some limited support for 75 to 100 houses. On balance therefore the response tended to favour a slightly lower level than that put forward by the Draft Plan's recommendation of a range between 50 to 100 houses. It will be necessary to take all of this into account before putting forward a finely judged range of growth for the final Plan if it is to meet with widespread support.

By contrast there was a substantial majority in favour of the proposed minor changes to the Settlement Boundary.

With regard to the choice of development sites there were some definite preferences expressed. A clear majority of the responses, 68%, supported Option B (the single site 7) as their first preference with 23% supporting Option A (site 7 combined with site 2). Support for Options C (sites 3 & 5/6) and D (sites 3 & 2) as first choice was down to 5% and 4% respectively.

There is no widespread view in the community in favour of putting forward other options that have not been identified within the Draft Plan.

The proposed Plan policies were supported by 85% of people and there were no common issues raised by a large number of people for new policies. However, there was a good deal of useful comment received which will be studied in relation to developing both the policies and proposals of the final Plan.

With warmer weather around the corner, residents will soon be looking to get out and take advantage. We wish, therefore, to remind householders and landowners that, where overgrowth is from gardens adjacent to public pavements and rights of way, there is a duty in law to control their overgrowth to keep public paths and pavements clear.

Another legal duty of which everyone needs to be aware concerns fly-tipping, which is the dumping of waste (including garden waste) on public or private land. To do so is an offence for which a fine can be imposed and heavy costs. Fly-tipping is also an eyesore and can be a risk to health.

**Dog waste** creates a very unpleasant nuisance if you step in it, fall in it, cycle through it, or wheel your pushchair through it. It presents a serious health risk to children playing in fouled recreation areas and also a potential health risk to farmers' livestock when dogs are allowed to stray. Furthermore, it is a criminal offence not to clear up immediately after your dog.

**For the general well-being and enjoyment of inhabitants** of Littleton Panell and West Lavington, please cut back your garden overgrowth (avoiding, of course, nesting birds), dispose of garden or other waste in the recognised legal way and ensure that the poop is scooped and binned properly! At our April meeting, Mike Burgess, a retired lecturer in horticulture, explained how we could 'Make Room for heverells Fruit'. He illustrated his talk with photographs showing each example as a tree ready for planting, in blossom, laden with fruit, and before and after shots of the pruning

process. Having a small garden, Mike maintained, does not mean that you cannot grow fruit. Nowadays there are fruit trees available that take up very little space. The growth of these fruit trees is restricted by the root stock on which they have been grafted. Further restriction is managed by pruning and training. So we now have fruit that we can grow in containers and some new varieties do not even require much pruning. There are also varieties of bush fruits, cane fruits and soft fruits suitable for small gardens.

Mike explained how the use of different rootstocks restricted the growth of fruit trees. He also described for us the summer pruning and training techniques used to produce cordons, oblique cordons, French double U cordons, horizontal cordons or espaliers, fans and other space saving shapes. He explained that there were now some columnar varieties of fruit tree suitable for growing in containers. And for those nervous about pruning there are even some columnar varieties where the buds are so close to the trunk that it requires very little pruning, for example a variety called Terrace Pearl.

Pruning allows sunlight to ripen the fruit and ensures good cropping the following year. When summer pruning you cut back any new shoots (laterals) more than 8 inches long arowing from the main stem to 3 leaves above the basal cluster of leaves. You also cut back any new shoots growing from existing side shoots to one leaf above the basal cluster. Apparently blackcurrants are not easy to grow in a small space but there are now some new compact varieties. There are some blueberry varieties and compact raspberries suitable for growing in containers. Mike also demonstrated how you could prune gooseberrries to

grow as a cordon to save space. Strawberries take up a lot of space when grown on open ground. However they are happy growing in strawberry barrels where they are planted on all sides and at different heights, thus taking up very little space.

The audience were very interested to learn about fruit growing in small gardens. There were plenty of questions from the floor and the plants that Mike Burgess brought for sale were snapped up eagerly. Mike did caution that we should consider the yield of each fruit tree before planting too many. His photographs showing the laden baskets of fruit picked from each of a selection of fruit trees illustrated clearly that small trees can produce a good crop of fruit.

The May meeting will be a talk by Mike Read about the fascinating world of dry land plants, entitled ' Cacti and succulents-myths, magic and mammillaria'. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 for a 7.30 p.m. start, on Tuesday 10 May. New members are always welcome. There will be a charge of £2 at the door for non members.

The Cheverells Garden Club will be holding a plant sale on Saturday 7 May in Great Cheverell Village Hall, from 10am until noon. There will be tea, coffee and cake available for purchase too.

# BOOKMARK

At our meeting on 23rd March we discussed the two books we had read that month. The first was *The Go Between* by L.P.Hartley and is set in the early years of the Twentieth Century. Many could remember seeing the film with Julie



Christie in the lead role. The story tells of a young boy who spends part of his summer holiday at the home of a school friend who comes from a slightly more wealthy home. Leo begins to act as a messenger between the young lady at the Hall and a local farmer. He becomes drawn into their secret meetings. The story has a tragic ending and Leo is never to forget the events of that summer. The book was written in the 1950's and we found the language used had dated and was, we felt, rather verbose. The book did give a very clear picture of a society governed by class and convention in the years leading up to the First World War. Opinion was divided among us and only two members really enjoyed it, so our overall mark was 6.

The other book was Life Studies by Susan Vreeland. We had previously read another of her books called *The Boating Party* which was the story of a painting by Renoir. *Life* Studies begins with historic tales that, rather than focusing on the great Impressionist and Post Impressionist masters themselves, tells of those around them, their lovers, servants, children. We learn how painters such as Monet, Van Gough, Manet and others impinge on the lives of others. Vreeland then comes forward to more contemporary art and artists. The range of stories from 1890s Paris to the 1970s proved fascinating. We enjoyed the book and awarded an 8.

#### EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH Identity Crisis

One of the big things at the moment is 'identity politics'. Some people define their sense of who they are according to their gender identity or sexual orientation. Several student groups have tried to ban speakers from university meetings because their views may challenge the way in which some young people perceive themselves. The recent attempt to ban feminist firebrand Germane Greer from a such an event on account of her outspoken views on gender identity is a case in point.

Others build their sense of identity around their work. They are first and foremost an accountant, businesswoman, professional athlete, builder, or whatever. The trouble with that is when people lose their jobs or have to retire from work, their whole identity is thrown into question. They feel at a loss, not knowing who they are any longer, or what they are going to do with themselves.

The Christian's sense of identity is based on knowing that God created all people in his image and that he loves all human beings, whatever our gender, race, or social background. The believer also sees himself or herself as being accepted by God in Christ. We don't have to try and impress God by our efforts. He graciously forgives all who believe in Jesus and gives us a new identity in Christ. That new identity in him is rock solid.

I was struck by the words of Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby in response to revelations concerning the identity of his father that must have have a disorientating effect on who he perceived himself to be. He wasn't blown off track by the breaking news testifying, "I know that I find who I am in Jesus Christ, not in genetics, and my identity in him never changes."

In an age where many are suffering from an identity crisis, its a joy to know who you are in Jesus.


