Dear Friends,

When someone leaves an organisation they are often asked to choose a favourite this or that. The Bible plays an important part in my life and probably my favourite passage is the Jesus' Parable of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15. The story is well known: the younger son demanding his inheritance whilst his father is alive, and then squandering it in a foreign land; when his money runs out, his friends all desert him; he resorts to working on a farm, so hungry that he wishes he could eat the pig's food. Then he comes to his senses, determines to go home and apologise and offer to work for his father.

Luke 15:20 continues, 'So he got up and went to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms round him and kissed him.' The younger son's planned apology is cut short; he is welcomed back, totally forgiven, unconditionally loved.

The key point is that in that far-off society a father would never, ever have run to meet his son in that way; it was unimaginable. It is a picture of God's extravagant and unwarranted love for each one of us, whoever we are and whatever we've done. I always find that profoundly moving.

It is in the person of Jesus that God enables us to benefit from his unwarranted and extravagant love, for it is Jesus who offers to walk beside us through life if we will only let him.

Thank you for the privilege that Mary and I have had of working alongside many of you during these past almost eight years, of being part of your lives both on happy occasions and at sadder times. We may be moving on, but the extravagant, unconditional love of God in Jesus will remain for ever.


MARY DICCOX

LOCAL ORGANISATIONS TO BENEFIT FROM FETE PROFITS

The Parochial Church Council recently discussed the success of the West Lavington Fete, and how much pleasure it gives to the communities of West Lavington and Littleton Panell. It was felt that it would be an additional benefit if a significant proportion of the Fete proceeds were given to local village charities and other village organisations supported by those who both help to run and attend the Fete. The PCC has now agreed that one third of the Fete profits should be divided equally between two charities/organisations nominated by Fete volunteers. This should result in donations of over \pounds 500 to each cause. Hopefully we will be able to continue this arrangement in future years, which will mean that over time many local charities and organisations will benefit.

After canvassing the Fete volunteers, helpers and organisers, the two organisations nominated to share one third of the 2016 Fete profits are West Lavington Youth Club and the Village Hall Fund. All the more reason to come along to the Fete on Saturday 16th July!

THE WILTSHIRE REGIMENT IN WORLD WAR ONE

My latest book is a month by month account of what each of the battalions of the Wiltshire Regiment was doing during the Great War.

I am not a military historian, so the book is more about the social aspects of the lives of the soldiers, rather than army tactics, although there has to be some of that. It tells where each battalion was, details when they were in the trenches, what they did when not in the trenches, which battles they fought in, when they had baths, what the weather was like. etc.

So if you had ancestors who served in the Wiltshire Regiment, this book will give you a good idea of what they did during their military service.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division Keep it in perspective, they tell me. Don't sweat the small stuff!

Actually, I think the small stuff is often important. There are many issues that bother people but some are more tractable than others (I can't recall ever using the word "tractable" in my Message before, but the Cambridge English Dictionary says it means "easily dealt with").

So if you are worried or annoyed about something, let's hope it's tractable. On the whole, clearing footpaths, mending potholes, collecting litter - all should be manageable if common sense and goodwill can prevail. It must be said, however, that regulations and bureaucracy sometimes get in the way of common sense and one of the hardest parts of my job is finding a way around such barriers.

Issues arising from human character can be more intractable. Dog poo in a public place is probably a reflection on the ignorance or arrogance of the owner rather than the dog, and that may require sociologists to find a solution. If you have unpleasant neighbours, you may need the involvement of the courts to arbitrate.

At a higher level, defining problems and finding solutions are inevitably more complex. Climate change, education policy, immigration, the NHS, the EU – we all know there are problems but it is naive to think the solutions are simple. (I can't ever recall using the word "naive" but it means "innocent, unsophisticated, artless, ingenuous, inexperienced, guileless, unworldly, childlike .. ").

What we see from the media on each of these topics often appears to be a war between zealots rather than an informed debate. Like you, probably, I have opinions about the issues but I don't pretend I am certain about the solutions. There are always questions to be asked. Are my ambitions for the outcome realistic or merely idealistic? Is short term pain worth long term gain? Can I rely upon the probity and efficiency of the institutions involved? More often than not, the answers are less than perfect.

If "certainty" implies "ignorance", I suspect the more zealous the commentator the more wrong they might be.

Your judgment is a good as mine on what is right but, on 23 June, we are no longer dealing with the small stuff.

He shared some of his expertise in propagating and caring for cacti and succulents and, among other things, we learnt:


- that soil can be sterilised for sowing seed in a plastic bag in the microwave.


WORTON AND CHEVERELL F.C. 'The Badgers'




