

This year's Edington Music Festival takes place in Edington Priory Church from Sunday 21st through to Sunday 28th August. Its theme is "The Seven Ages of Man", as described by William Shakespeare in "As You Like It", a link to the Bard's 400th Anniversary.

As ever, three choirs composed of the top Cathedral and Collegiate choristers, under the direction of three of the country's top choral directors, will sing a wide range of sacred music four times daily. 



The Parochial Church Council recently discussed the success of the West Lavington Fete, and how much pleasure it gives to the communities of West Lavington and Littleton Panell. It was felt that it would be an additional benefit if a significant proportion of the Fete proceeds were given to local village charities and other village organisations supported by those who both help to run and attend the Fete. The PCC has now agreed that one third of the Fete profits should be divided equally between two charities/organisations nominated by Fete volunteers. This should result in donations of over \pounds 500 to each cause. Hopefully we will be able to continue this arrangement in future years, which will mean that over time many local charities and organisations will benefit.

After canvassing the Fete volunteers, helpers and organisers, the two organisations nominated to share one third of the 2016 Fete profits are West Lavington Youth Club and the Village Hall Fund. All the more reason to come along to the Fete on Saturday 16th July!

100 YEARS AGO

July 1st 1916 was without doubt the worst day of the 1914-18 war, the outcome of which resulted in the death of 19.000 men. Unlike many counties from the North of England, Wiltshire soldiers were less involved and hence the comparatively small loss of life. Nevertheless there were four fatal casualties in July which are recorded below.

Private John Wilfred Smith 21899 Killed in Action 1st July 1916

John Wilfred Smith enlisted in the Kings Liverpool Regiment in Liverpool on 7th November 1914. He stated his age as 19 years and 6 months, but this was an exaggeration, as he would probably have been under age 18. He gave his occupation at the time as a clerk. His parents were living at Bush Bottom Farm, West Lavington, where William was working as a gamekeeper.

John went to France with the 18th Battalion of the Kings Liverpool regiment on 7th November 1915. He was killed in action on 1st July 1916, the first day of the Somme offensive, when his battalion was involved in the capture of Montauban. On this day over 19,000 British and Commonwealth men were killed and a further 19,000 men were wounded. This was the worst day the Army has known, but the battle continued for months, and the German High Command claimed that the Battle of the Somme was when they started to lose.

John has no known grave but is remembered on the Thiepval Memorial.

Private Frederick Charles Giddings 15251 Killed in Action 1st July 1916

Frederick was born about 1892 in West Lavington, where his father James Giddings was a farm labourer. Frederick's mother was Mary Ann Gillett and in 1911 they were living at New Coppice Farm in West Lavington. Frederick was living at Ford, near Salisbury in 1911, and was working as a shepherd.

Frederick initially joined the Wiltshire Regiment, but was transferred to the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. It is worth noting that in 1916, when conscription was introduced in England, Scotland and Wales, it did not apply in Ireland. Troops from England were therefore drafted there.

Frederick served in the 2nd Battalion of the Roval Dublin Fusiliers. This Regiment saw action on the Western Front, including the Battle of Cateau, the Battle of the Marne, the Battle of Aisne and the Battle of Messines. Then in 1915 they were involved in the Second Battle of Ypres, where the battalion suffered from a gas attack.

On July 1st 1916, Frederick was in the trenches on the Somme. It was the first day of the battle of the Somme. The Dublin Fusiliers had received orders to attack, and as they left the trenches, they were mown down by German machine gun fire. Apparently, there had been an order to halt, but this was never received.

Frederick has no known grave, but is remembered on the Thiepval memorial.

Private Reginald Vere Collins 22815 Killed in Action 7th July 1916

Reginald was born in Little Cheverell in 1894, the son of Joseph and Mary Jane Collins. Joseph was originally from West Lavington, but settled in Little Cheverell following his marriage to Mary Jane Sainsbury. He worked as an agricultural labourer and he and Mary Jane had five sons and one daughter. Reginald was the second son.

In 1911 Reginald was working as a shepherd. He enlisted in the 1st battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment.

On 7th July the battalion was in the trenches at the Leipzig salient in France. At 12.15 am they received orders to attack the German trenches. Whilst the matter was still being discussed, they encountered a very violent hostile counter attack. This started at 1.15am. The Germans tried to rush the trench, and managed to reach the very edges of it and they dropped bombs and opened fire. The Wiltshires managed to fight them off and they inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. For the next two hours they endured very heavy bombing, and intermittent bombing afterwards until about 5.30am.

At 9.30am the battalion mounted its attack on the German trench, which was successfully captured.

At 1pm a second wave of attack was made. In this action a large number of Germans were killed and 23 were taken prisoner. The captured trench was consolidated, but being very wide it offered little protection. At 1.30pm the enemy opened a terrific bombardment with high explosive. This bombardment lasted about five hours and the battalion's casualties were enormous; about 160 men were wounded or killed. One of these was Reginald.

Lance Corporal Thomas Plank 19916 Killed in Action 14th July 1916

Thomas was born about 1886 in Lavington, the son of William Plank a farm carter from Rushall, and his wife May Ann who came from Urchfont. The couple had six surviving children, and Tom was the second son.

and transferred to the 8th battalion of the Devonshire Regiment.

On 14th July, the 8th Devonshires were involved in the British offensive at the Battle of Bazentin Ridge, which marked the start of the second phase of the Battle of the Somme. The objective was to take the villages of Bazentin le Petit, Bazentin le Grand and Longueval, which were located on the top of the ridge.

& Information The battle lasted all day, with the result that the British did take most of the Bazentin Ridge, but over the coming weeks and months it changed hands several times. The British losses on that day were 9,194 men, compared with German losses of 2,300. Thomas Plank was killed in action during this battle. His older brother, William had been killed in action near Ypres in January 1915. News

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Do you want some good news for a change?

Wiltshire has a thriving and growing economy. Only 0.6% of the working age population is claiming Job Seekers' Allowance, which is about half the national figure. Not bad, I'd say! Schools are doing well. Over 90% of our children are being educated in schools that are rated Good or Outstanding by Ofsted, which puts Wiltshire very nearly at the top of the national list. The proportion of students getting GCSE Grade A*-C including English & Maths is well above the national average.

Another positive point is that, on average, men and women in Wiltshire live in good health for longer than those in other parts of England.

But when more of us reach old age we may need more help. Wiltshire Council's Adult Care Services have supported 26,483 individuals between April 2015 and March 2016. This includes residents who received both long term and short term support. Help to live at home is designed to help people who are frail, sick or disabled to live at home for as long as it is safe and it helps people to continue to look after themselves in their own home.

To help the environment, waste diverted from landfill continues to exceed the target of 75%. Landfill = Bad. Recycling = Good. Please keep it up!

Less happily, the number of incidents of fly-tipping increased by 22% over the year. Actions to reduce the number of incidents include increased camera surveillance and increased joint working operations with the Police to intercept waste which is being transported illegally. In addition, the Council will make full use of the new fixed penalty notice (introduced in May 2016) as an added deterrent to would-be fly tippers.

Support for local communities last year came in the form of grants from Area Boards, which totalled £1.7 million, supporting 1,038 local projects. For every £1 of grants an additional £4.53 was leveraged from other sources so the total investment in Wiltshire communities totalled over £5.7 million. LITTLE CHEVERELL PARISH COUNCIL Meeting on 24 May 2016.

This was a combined AGM and regular council meeting.

At the AGM the Chairs of the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council delivered their annual reports which highlighted the developments of the last twelve months. The following are the main items that were discussed at the regular Council meeting. Village Roads

It was reported that Wiltshire Council had repaired the potholes in Low Road that were deep enough to be repaired with cold tarmac. Anne Venus said there were potholes near the stream bridge on the Great Cheverell Road and agreed to report these to Wiltshire Council. The Chair reported that Wiltshire Council had replied to the complaint about overhanging foliage along Low Road saying there was no immediate danger but they would continue to monitor the situation.

Superfast Broadband and Telephone Service.

Michael Maxwell was unable to attend the meeting but had supplied a written report to the Chair who gave a summary. As a result of recent complaints the issue was now being dealt with by BT Openreach High Level Complaints Dept. In parallel, BT had discovered a fault in the main connector at the railway bridge at the north end of Low Road and after rectification some improvements were expected. We would continue to press for the Broadband connection to be switched from the cabinet in Littleton Panell to cabinet 3 in Great Cheverell. Michael also reported that nine subscribers had applied for compensation from BT for poor service.

Council Vacancy

A discussion was held on the procedures for filling the vacancy created by the recent resignation of a Councillor and how it could be publicised throughout the village.

Vacancy for School Governor Can vou help?


Did you know that school governors represent England's largest group of volunteers (currently some 300,000 strong), who are dedicated to school improvement. Governors make important decisions with regard to the running of the school - that is, with regard to curriculum, pupil targets, school improvement, budget, staffing, health and safety, management of premises ...

If all this sounds rather daunting, remember that school governors are drawn from all walks of life and no specialist knowledge is required just enthusiasm. Support is offered in the form of websites, helplines and training, some specifically for new governors. Along with more experienced governors who are always on hand to provide advice and information.

Governing bodies act corporately and are collectively responsible for decisions. The emphasis is very much on collaboration with other governors and the Headteacher. The amount of time devoted to governance varies, but an average might be one or two governing body meetings per term, plus one or two committee meetings.

Governors report that they derive a range of personal benefits from the work - indeed, many find the role enormously rewarding and stay with the same school for years. These benefits include: the chance to acquire new skills and upgrade existing ones, undertake an exciting and challenging role, meet new people and work together towards a common goal. Governors also report immense satisfaction that, in giving up a few hours a term, they can help make a real difference to children's lives.

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH Citizens of Hope

By the time you read this the result of the EU referendum will have been revealed. I am neither a prophet or pollster so I'm not going to try and anticipate the outcome here. Whatever that may be, one of the defining issues of the referendum campaign was our sense of political identity. Are we first of all Europeans and then British, British and then European, or simply British? The answer to those questions is partly based on a sense of cultural belonging and partly on political matters such as sovereignty and citizenship.

There is no 'Christian view' on whether we are better off in or out of the EU, but the Bible has something to say about citizenship and the role of the state. A decent government will defend its citizens, uphold the rule of law and harness the power of society to serve the common good. But there's only so much the state can do, both at the national level and as states work together in organisations like the EU.

The Christian attitude towards politics is summed up well in the words of Jesus, 'Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's.' We are to give 'Caesar' or the state its due by obeying the laws of the land, paying our taxes, and acting as good citizens. But the state has no power to change the human heart, or command our worship. That is God's domain.

Jesus proclaimed the good news of the kingdom of God. Its power is not of this world and cannot be measured in terms of military might, GDP, or global influence. King Jesus did not come to destroy his enemies, but to die for them. He did not seek to enrich himself, but by his poverty to bestow the riches of God's grace upon others. Belonging to this kingdom is not a matter of race, or national citizenship. All who believe belong. None of this means that Christians have little interest in politics, or that we wish to withdraw from society. Jesus calls his people to play a full part in the life of this world and to seek the wellbeing of their local communities. But for the Christian, our ultimate citizenship isn't measured by the words on our passports, but our hope in the Lord, 'our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ' (Philippians 3:20). That thought helps to put the raging political controversies of the day into perspective.
