



100 years ago Lance Corporal Dean Shore 19215 Died of Wounds 20th November 1916

Dean was born around 1890, the son of George Shore, a farm labourer, and his wife, Louisa Cooper.

The family lived in Duck Street, West Lavington in the home in which George grew up, a thatched cottage next to the Old House. George and Louisa had four children, and also appear to have adopted a grandchild, George born in 1911.

In 1911 Dean was working as a Gentleman's domestic servant.

Dean served with the 6th battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment and achieved the rank of Lance Corporal. He was wounded at the Somme and taken to the 49th Casualty Clearing Station at Contay where he died of his wounds on 20th November 1916. On that day four soldiers of the battalion were killed and a number wounded when they successfully attacked the German trenches.

It gives us an idea of what life was like in the village during the turbulent years from 1914-1918. The book should be available in October at Devizes Books, Amazon.co.uk, or from me at £6. I have also produced a little book about the chequered history of the Shaftesbury Fountain, better known as Eros, in Piccadilly Circus. This is called "Forever Eros" and is available at £4.99. (I should point out that this one is not part of my charitable local history project, but I really enjoyed researching it and I think it makes an interesting read.)



Communicating with you - Email DATABASE. West Lavington Parish Council aims to be as effective as possible and wants to communicate with the community using a variety of means.

At this time we use our website, a twitter site, display information/noties on the village notice board, and give regular updates in the widely distributed News and Views in addition of course to talking to people.

There is always more we can do such as being both more proactive and timely with the provision of information to the parish.

One way to do this is to compile a database of e-mail addresses of anyone who wishes for the Parish Council to send information directly to their e-mail inbox. This would enable very timely circulation of information across the parish without you having to wait several weeks for the minutes of meetings, delivery of the News and Views, or go to the notice board.

This system will not replace the existing and highly praised News and Views or our web-site, but those who sign up to it will start to see information from the council pop up in their 'in box' in a very timely fashion.

The Parish Council is registered with the Information Commissioner for this purpose. By law your details must and will be held in strict confidence and will be protected, it will not be shared with any third party without your written consent; and you can have your details removed from the database at any time by making a written request to the Clerk of the council.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Mystery tours can be quite exciting but, generally speaking, if you are on a journey it's probably good to know where you are going.

The same is true about money. Most of us have at least some idea of what to expect next month or next year, even if the exact amount could vary a little. None of us, I assume, would wish to be in the situation of not knowing where our next meal was coming from.

For Wiltshire Council, there has always been a degree of uncertainty about how much income the local authority should expect for the financial year ahead. Government has often left it quite late in the budget-setting season before disclosing how much the council will receive in grants so planning expenditure on all sorts of services has been a matter of guesswork.

Of course, quite a lot of the government money that passes through Wiltshire's hands is ring fenced for specific purposes so the Council does not have any direct influence on the income or the expenditure. Of the annual budget of about £900 million, £558 million is already committed for schools, benefits or the Housing Revenue account. The remaining £342 million comes from Council Tax and something called the Settlement Funding Assessment. The SFA (you may think the initials are apt) is what government gives us back from the rates paid by businesses on their properties in the county (they take it all and we then get some back) or as Revenue Support Grant.

Now, for the first time ever, the government has offered the Council the opportunity to sign up for a settlement that covers the next 4 years. You might reasonably think that is not exactly exciting news, but it actually marks a substantial change. For the first time, Wiltshire Council will know how much it will receive from government not just next year but up until 2020.

Good news? Well, yes and no. On the one hand, Wiltshire will be able to plan its budgets with certainty. On the other hand, the government will continue to cut its contribution under the Revenue Support Grant until, by 2019/20 it disappears altogether. They will give us back a little more of the business rates collected in the county but a large chunk of that money will still go to support poorer areas (Scunthorpe is often used as an example, but I don't know why they are singled out). The net result will be we have to find another $\pounds 30$ million savings over the next few years.

The Council is experienced at becoming leaner and fitter. I wish I was the same.

Their team leader Bonnie Matters must also be applauded for her energy, enthusiasm and expertise in all things horticultural. As ever, our children behaved beautifully – this is why we enjoy taking them off-site. We know that we can rely on them to understand exactly how to behave, showing compassion and courage at all times. We are always very grateful to our wonderful staff and volunteers who put so much effort into making these trips fun and safe for our children.

School Council

Each class elects two counsellors to represent their views at our school council meetings. These councillors help us to decide how to improve our provision and come up with really creative and innovative ideas. Some are a bit impractical (they would love a school dog but it would not be manageable and would not be fair on the dog!) but many others are excellent and we act on every suggestion that is within the realms of practicality. It was the school council's creative ideas that started the massively successful outdoor classroom project. And their views on improving collective worship have resulted in much more outdoor worship, more meditation worship, more worship led by the children themselves and improved choice of hymns and songs.

The Emmanuel Collaboration

Holy Trinity has entered into a formal collaboration with Five Lanes CE Primary, St Barnabas CE Primary, St Thomas a'Beckett CE Primary and Urchfont CE Primary. By sharing resources, good practice and economies of scale, we hope to raise achievement of all children in the local area. The name, Emmanuel, means "God is with us", reflecting our determination to ensure that every child is valued and challenged to be the best they can be within the Christian ethos of our schools. We have decided that, at this stage, we will not be joining any Multi Academy Trust (MAT), and will rather retain our autonomy and control of our own finances whilst enjoying the benefits of closer collaboration.

Last term the children enjoyed learning 'all about me' when we all got to know about one another for the beginning of the new school year and everyone has settled in so well. This term at Lavington Pre-school we have been basing our investigations around 'winter and the weather'. As part of our topic we have been looking at the changing season and talking about how when the weather changes we change what we wear to keep us warm and dry. heverells hub At our October meeting two of our members, Janine Fanshawe and Caroline Wilkinson shared their enthusiasm for pelargoniums with us – and it was a really generous sharing, with beautiful photographs interspersed with fascinating facts, more than a dozen

cherished specimen plants for us to have an envious look at and even shoots from their collections so that we could take our own cuttings following one of those expert demonstrations which makes it look so easy.

Many of us knew that the plants which some of us were brought up to call geraniums are more properly pelargoniums, with the geranium name really belonging to the hardy plants related to our native cranesbill. But it was news to most of us that the name pelargonium derives from the Greek pelargos – stork – a similar reference to the shape of the seed head which we see when we dead head our summer bedding.

All single pelargoniums have 5 petals, arranged with 2 above and 3 below, but the shape of the petals varies from the blowsy regal pelargonium flowers through the rounded shape of the zonal petals to delicate narrow stellar shapes. The leaves vary too; the zonal pelargonium has rounded leaves which may be blotched, veined or variegated; the name of another type, ivy leaved, speaks for itself. Some have scented leaves and inconspicuous flowers and the regal pelargoniums have large leaves on woody stems. Sometimes the name will give you a clue: Black Velvet has very dark burgundy coloured leaves and stems and Arctic Star has a delicate white stellar flower. Who could resist a type known as Angel Eyes? But the blotched flowers are easier to picture if you know that elsewhere this type is known as pansy faced. If you buy a pelargonium the label may carry a code – one labelled ZDB will be the zonal type with double flowers and variegated foliage, but if they are different letters you'll have to ring Janine or Caroline. We learned how to over winter pelargoniums safely. If you want them to carry on flowering put them somewhere warm and carry on watering and feeding them. Otherwise trim them back, water only very sparingly and keep them cool but frost free – they are not hardy, so need a greenhouse, conservatory or perhaps a room you don't heat. Increase your stock by taking cuttings from the trimmings and if they are left undisturbed to root over the winter they should be ready to go next spring. In the \Box meantime, although most pelargoniums flower from late spring to summer, Cordifolia flowers from November to April, so maybe it's one for your Christmas list. Our next meeting is on 8th November when Sara Gruzelier, a renowned garden designer,

will talk to us about pruning hardy shrubs and roses. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 - all welcome, non-members £2.






