

NATIONALISM WITH A PURPOSE

Monthly Letter

The Rt Revd Nicholas Holtam, Bishop of Salisbury

There's a strong nationalism at the Olympics, particularly when looking at the medal table. Team GB has done us proud.

A healthy nationalism knows that to belong everywhere you have to belong somewhere. The instinct is that by loving our own country we are better able to relate to the wider world. The Olympic movement is international.

It was good in Rio to have a few competitors for the first time who are refugees and have no country to represent. Half are South Sudanese living in refugee camps in Kenya. They, too, are part of the Olympic ideal.

The way we tell our history and describe our present circumstances makes a very big difference to the way we live in a world of threats and opportunities.

When we go abroad we see things differently. We've been in Germany. After the Second World War 14 million German speaking people were moved into Germany as defined by the Allied powers.

No wonder Mrs Merkel has encouraged modern Germany to receive 1 million from the present migrant crisis. It's in their history to do so.

In Munich there is a Victory Gate, the Siegestor, that looks much like the Arc de Triomphe in Paris or the Wellington Arch in London. Built in the nineteenth century to celebrate Bavarian valour it was badly damaged in the Second World War.

Its restoration has incorporated on one side the destructive marks of battle and the inscription now reads: 'Dedicated to Victory; Destroyed by War; Urging Peace'. It turns a disaster into a hope.

This is a Biblical pattern. In seeking Christ in today's world we face reality and ask where and how hope is reborn. Christ is in our history and is a very present reality that transforms the future.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REPORT

Following the extensive public consultation process carried out over the Christmas period, and analysis of the results, the Parish Council agreed at its July meeting that the shortlisted option site off Sandfield adjacent to DAPS (site 7 in the first draft of the Neighbourhood Plan) should be adopted as the preferred choice for the Neighbourhood Plan. The council also agreed that the remaining three option sites identified in the draft plan should no longer be considered as potential sites for development within the Plan. An important factor in the council's decision rested on the public consultation response which placed site 7, on its own, overwhelmingly top of all site options at 68%. When coupled as an option with another site, it came second in the second preference, meaning that some 90% of respondents supported the development of this site in either of these options.

While all shortlisted options have drawbacks, including access, comments on these sites from Wiltshire Council officers noted that the sites have 'come through a robust shortlisting process' and indicated that they regard site 7 as the most acceptable in terms of sustainability because of its position in the village in relation to facilities and footways.

Again, with a view to the consultation results, this time regarding housing numbers, the council looked at such issues as dwelling and household growth in the last decade and benefits to local trade, schools etc. It took particular note of the fact that 44% of consultation respondents showed a preference for less than 50 new houses while 42% favoured 50 to 75. This led the Council to consider that a broad level of around 50 new houses should be adopted

However, it was also felt important that some scope for flexibility should be built in to allow for scope in design solutions that might be needed to reflect a mix of different types of houses and larger and smaller units. As a result, the Parish Council concluded that a range of between 40 and 60 new dwelling units should be agreed for the adopted site.

Consultation with Wiltshire Council by the Steering Group continues with regard to site 7 on issues such as site access, surface water run-off and drainage, all of which were raised by respondents during the consultation. These will be the subject of serious consideration by the council prior to further community consultation on a second draft Plan and a sustainability report that will focus on plan policies.

The Nestling Trust – Update Children's Home

Some great news that we would like to share is that work has begun on the construction of the Children's Home in Sarangkot.

Following the earthquake last year work was unavoidably delayed until the government decided upon new building regulations. Our building was the first to receive permission in that area at the end of July '16 and we hope it will be completed after a year.

Marbu Clinic

The Health Clinic at Marbu, a remote village in Dolakha has now been operating for two and a half years. It began in April 2014 with support from TNT working with the District Health Office. The original building was destroyed in the earthquake so a temporary building is being used. TNT has plans to build a new clinic as soon as permission is granted from the Ministry of Health.

Lapilang and Chilankha Clinic.

Villagers have just completed building two simple clinics in these remote villages in Dolakha, funded by TNT.

Water connection

In the remote villages of Marbu, Lapilang, Chilankha and Bhirkot the earthquake caused the water supply to dry up due to changes in water courses. TNT have funded the materials such as piping equipment,taps etc and men from the villages have provided the manpower, now three villages are reconnected and have piped running water, and work on the fourth is almost completed.

Krishna

The 4 year old little boy suffering cerebral palsy, rescued by TNT and now undergoing physio treatment, is now able to walk unaided and can play with toys and feed himself. Shrijana

A 16 year old girl suffering disability from a foot deformity is undergoing corrective surgery and receiving physiotherapy treatment funded by TNT.

Health Education Project Gulmi.

5 remote village communities of Harmichaur VDC in Gulmi have taken part in health awareness days where they received information on hygiene, nutrition, drugs and alcohol and sexual health. Health auxiliaries received training and they will continue to support the communities and spread the information to neighbouring villages.

One of the many good things about living in this area is the evidence of community spirit and good neighbourliness. We all get on with each other, don't we?

Most of us do, but I see a regular flow of issues that could be defined as un-neighbourly behaviour and they are some of the hardest matters to deal with.

Un-neighbourliness can take a number of forms. Littering is a common problem. It was staggering how much rubbish was collected from verges and hedgerows by the Clean for the Queen event. Don't drop it; take it home!

Dog poo is another perennial issue with deeply unpleasant results on pavements, footpaths, and grass areas. There are places where children cannot play and fields where farmers cannot allow their livestock to graze owing to the risk of infection from the faeces. Don't blame the dogs for the problem.

Shouting, loud music, smoke from bonfires, revving of engines – all are examples of crass behaviour that can peak in the summer, so I hope you have not been one of those to suffer this year. Overgrown hedges is another summer complaint. If vegetation from your land overhangs a public right of way or intrudes upon a neighbour's property, it's your duty to cut it back.

On the other hand, if one of your trees is a valued feature for the neighbours and the neighbourhood, please look after it. Trees take a lifetime to grow. If you own a good specimen, or if you own a forest, don't cut if you don't have to.

Inconsiderate parking that blocks driveways or prevents large vehicles from using roads and lanes is another common complaint. Just because a section of highway does not have formal restrictions does not mean it's OK to park. It's a criminal offence to obstruct a highway so think before you park. It could be a matter of life and death if an emergency vehicle is prevented from getting through.

Finally, if you are putting up a fence or building a shed, you may have a legal right but think of what it looks like from your neighbour's property. If they won't like it, try to find something more acceptable.

The message is "Do as you would be done by". It's an ancient principle. It's the Golden Rule.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

With the Parish Council's first Autumn meeting taking place on the first of September, here's a reminder of what was happening before the August break and notice of some things in the

Renaming an old landmark: At an extraordinary meeting of the council on the 29th of June, members came together to name the site comprising four new houses behind the old Stagepost pub. It is the duty of parish councils to name new developments. In view of the history of the site, Wheatsheaf Mews was the councillors' unanimous choice. Houses will be numbered 1 to

Landowners' meeting: In early July, local famers and landowners met with councillors. The aim was to learn of any particular concerns, gain a better understanding of how the Parish Council might be able to assist and build communication channels for the benefit of all. Topics ranged from dogs to litter, flytipping, hare coursing, rural crime and communications. Other subjects raised included fracking licences, resilience planning and flooding, rights of way, hedge cutting, and electric and non-electric fencing. It proved a very informative evening with many common concerns expressed.

Vandalism: Vandalism to the Village Hall recently has resulted in damage to property including broken windows and destroyed drain pipes. In addition, rowdy group behaviour around the Village Hall late in the night has been experienced. Drug taking has been detected on the playing fields. A rubbish bin has been set alight and its plastic cover burnt to the ground. The police have visited. They have requested that residents, particularly those living nearby who may witness incidents of anti-social behaviour, report any ongoing incidents by dialing 999 and any incidents that are no longer continuing by calling 101. We thank all those who have brought these occurrences to our attention. Please continue to do so.

Activities for the Elderly: The Parish Council has supported young people for many years, in particular by grants to the Youth Club. Having recently succeeded in building up our reserves, we would now like to redress some of the balance by funding activities for the elderly. In particular the council is looking to provide three or four trips for elderly members of the Friendship Club. and would also welcome on these outings elderly non-Friendship Club parish residents. A starter computer course at the village hall for those who have no or minimal computer skills is also planned. This course focuses on ways that older relatives can keep in touch with family via emails and skype. The course will be free. Details appear in this issue.

Community well-being: The Parish Council will begin a parish campaign in the Autumn to end dog fouling in public spaces and our lamination when the dogs for their co-operation. However, despite numerous polite requests to remove their dog's poo and attempts to raise awareness regarding the associated health risks, dog faeces still abound on grounds where people walk, children play and livestock graze. More bewilderingly, poo bags full of faeces are left to rot on hedges and have had enough and farmers feel the same! - **6. Low Broadband speed.** Mr Michael Maxwell reported via the Chair about his ongoing efforts to improve this.
- **7.Footpaths**. Dr Gil Rooke informed the meeting that footpath number 6 running toward Littleton Panell should be cleared in the next couple of weeks.

BOOKMARK

Our meeting in July took place on a sunny although chilly evening in Anne Marie's garden and we enjoyed nibbles and Pimms as well as books. As our June meeting had to be cancelled we had four books to review. The first was *At Hawthorn Time* by Melissa Harrison which has a proloque describing the bloody afternoon aftermath of



a car crash on a lane outside a village from which the story tracks back. We are not told which of her protagonists are involved. There is Jack, an itinerant farm worker; Jamie. a local boy; and Howard and Kitty, who have taken early retirement and relocated from Camden. They are all adrift in their own particular way, struggling to find a life in the countryside and to belong. Each chapter is headed with the names of plants in bloom at the time. We all enjoyed this descriptive novel; the atmosphere created and the family relationships described were excellent. We voted it 9/10. The next book was very different, A Dictionary of Mutual Understanding by Jackie Copleton and is set around a Japanese woman who lives through the atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki. When a badly scarred man knocks on the door of Amaterasu's retirement home in America and says he is her grandson, she doesn't believe him. But if you have become adept at lying can you tell when someone is speaking the truth. Amaterasu has always believed that her daughter and grandson had died the day the bomb was dropped on Nagasaki so this man is either a miracle or a cruel trick. The stranger forces her to revisit her past: the hurt and humiliation of her early life, the intoxication of a first romance and the fierceness of a mothers love. This book caused prolonged discussion, it is an interesting and emotional read, with vivid descriptions of Japan in 1930's and the aftermath of the bombing . Again we felt it was a 9 book and also would pay re-reading. Hild did not feel it was for her and had not read it. The third book was Sweet Caress by William Boyd. The story of a woman photographer. Amory first remembers her father returning on leave during the First World War but his absences, both actual and emotional, are what she remembers. Her photographer uncle Grenville supplies the emotional bond and when he gives her a Camera and some lessons in photography unleashes a passion that dominates her life. She begins an apprenticeship with Grenville in London photographing socialites but then her search for life takes her to Berlin in the late 1920's, New York in the 1930's and to the Blackshirt riots in London and France in the Second World War. William Boyd has created a panorama of some of the defining moments in modern history told through the camera lens of a woman. Not all of us had read this but those who had were enthusiastic about it and again thought it worth a 9.

The last book of the session was *The Wolf Border* by Sarah Hall. This is the story of Rachel a zoologist working in Idaho as part of a wolf recovery project. She spends her days, and often nights, tracking the every move of a wild wolf pack. It is a fairly solitary existence but she is content. Rachel receives an approach from a wealthy Earl who is interested in reintroducing the grey wolf to Northern England and she agrees to a meeting. She is certain that she wants no part of the project but the Earls estate is close to the village where Rachel grew up and where her mother now lives in a care facility. Rachel has not been home for a long time but she returns to run the project. We found much to discuss in this novel which has marvellous descriptions of weather and scenery. Rachel's handling of relationships led to much discussion, especially following the birth of her son. The project to reintroduce wolves also led to discussion on other reintroductions into the wild, such as beavers and the impact it can have on the eco system. By now we were all talked out! We did agree this was a good read 9/10.

Setting targets, sharing recipes and other ideas, and working together as a group to overcome challenges and celebrate success is so important to a successful journey. That's why, at my Slimming World group, there'll be tons of support, encouragement and fun.

"Like a lot of slimmers, I had tried to lose weight so many times before by following numerous diets but they were never sustainable because I'd always get tired of restricting what I ate. There is nothing so quintessentially English as village cricket, except, perhaps, the English garden. In Erlestoke there is an idyllic spot where cricket and gardening history have come together. The home of the Erlestoke and Coulston Cricket Club is within the confines of a Victorian walled garden. On a fine

August evening we visited the walled garden and Patrick Stayt the groundsman gave us a tour and an interesting talk about the history of the garden. He also shared some secrets about what is involved to get the cricket pitch ready for matches.

The walled garden was part of the Erlestoke Manor Estate. The enclosure carried out in 1782 when ancient common rights over the surrounding fields, marshes and downs were swept aside and the land allocated into private ownership, allowed the owners of the Manor to landscape the property. They put in lakes and planted the valley side with the trees and shrubs which now form the backdrop to the walled garden. In 1819 the property was sold to the rich owner of a West Indian plantation, Simon Taylor, Eventually it was inherited by Anna Taylor, wife of George Watson. The Watson Taylors continued to own the estate for the next 100 years and it was probably during their time that the walled garden was built. When the family fortune of the Watson Taylors began to dwindle the property was broken up and the house and gardens were sold in 1920's. There were various owners thereafter. Eventually it was taken over by the War Department and used as an officer training centre. As with many walled gardens during the war years the place fell into disuse or alternative use. When the cricket club took out a 21year lease on the the walled garden in the 1980's it was little more than a rubble filled field with a few fruit trees. The cricket club repaired the wall and removed the rubble and created a verdant cricket field. Then in 2013 they managed to negotiate the purchase of the walled garden thus securing the future of what must be one of the quirkiest and most beautiful village cricket grounds in England.

Maintaining the pitch even for village cricket involves a lot of cutting, rolling and scarifying. And at the end of the season it all has to be dug up and reseeded to get it ready for the next season. One of our garden club members had researched walled gardens and gave us a talk about them. We learned that the walls provided protection from the wind and also security for valuable plants. An acre of garden could provide food for 12 people. To maintain an acre took 2 to 3 gardeners. The gardens were often sited far from the main house so that they did not impinge on the landscaped views. The Victorians were great explorers and plant hunters and estate owners often vied with each other over who could grow the best exotic fruits or flowers. Whilst being the head gardener was regarded as a good job the average life span of a gardener

in Victorian times was 35 years. This was because of the poisons used as pesticides and the danger of injury because of the nature of the work.
