CHANGE FOR THE BETTER

Welcome to our first colourful front page! This facility been kindly made available to us, with the result that our covers will, in the foreseeable future, be appearing. with topical, seasonal, local and colourful covers.

The present cover is a combination of almost all of these elements, even though it is probably not familiar to most of our readers. This roundel can be found on the North wall of West Lavington Church. For the benefit of those who cannot fully understand the details, it is a conglomeration of pieces of glass taken from the apparently shattered windows during WW1. It is therefore colourful, local, topical and seasonal as it commemorates 100 years since Passchendaele – during the Autumn months when the horror of deaths by drowning in the mud were at their worst.

We have to be grateful to Brigadier General Thompson who obviously once owned it, and equally to Ron and Meg Barron who presented it to the church. Ronald Barron and his wife were closely associated with Dauntsey's – he as a senior member of staff for 42 years and she as a wartime teacher there. The circumstances of the previous ownership of the roundel are not known.

The wording around the edge informs us that:

This stained glass was collected at Ypres Cathedral during the Great War 1914-18 by Brigadier General Thompson K.B., C.M.G., R.A.

Special thanks are due to Fred West who suggested this picture and to Neil Lockhart who has photographed and converted it into this month's cover. If anyone who has read this can think of, or preferably take pictures of, suitable subjects for a cover, please contact the present editor, though with a growing bank of offers one cannot guarantee that it will appear.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

One of the many joys about living in this area is that we can feel safe. Statistics show that crime rates in Wiltshire are among the lowest in the country. Indeed, The Lavingtons & Erlestoke area is one of the safest in the county (at least, if you exclude anything that may happen inside Erlestoke Prison).

But that doesn't mean it's all sweetness and light. From time to time, and especially in a few regular places, there are instances of vandalism and anti-social behaviour that can upset the tranquillity that most of us enjoy. At one level, anti-social behaviour can include littering, dumping rubbish, dog-fouling or noise. When these occur, the happiness of all who are affected is reduced. At its worst, vandalism can cause serious damage. Threatening or intimidating behaviour can cause serious distress. Sometimes a single culprit is to blame for the issue. In other cases, there may be several perpetrators. In such situations, face to face confrontation with the offenders is probably unwise. So what to do?

Obviously, one's thoughts may turn to the Police. If a crime is underway that may count as an emergency, then call 999. To report a crime that has occurred in the past, phone 101. Wiltshire Council may also be able to help. Details of the council's role and the services provided can be found here: http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/community-safety-anti-socialbehaviour. You can contact Wiltshire Council's public protection officer by telephone 0300 456 0107 or by email asb@wiltshire.gov.uk.

All reports of anti-social behaviour will be taken seriously. Some problems can be resolved quickly but others take time. There are a number of interventions that may be appropriate and the council's team works in partnership with other agencies including the Police, the Fire & Rescue Service, the Probation Service, the NHS, the Crown Prosecution Service and various voluntary bodies. In the worst cases, enforcement such as civil injunctions and orders can be employed.

So if you are affected by anti-social behaviour, you don't have to suffer in silence. And if you are one of those who causes a nuisance, the message is "Behave – or else...!".

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Although officially in summer recess, councillors have been very busy during July and August.

An application to central government was successful for grant monies to appoint a planning consultant to take the **Neighbourhood Plan** forward to the next stage. In late September, households will receive a Housing Needs Assessment Survey on affordable housing as required by Wiltshire Council. This will be followed in November by further proposals and policies and the opportunity for members of the public to make representations over a 6/7 week period before the Plan is submitted to Wiltshire Council for the final stages of the process.

The Parish Council has also applied for grants for CCTV equipment at the Village Hall including the Youth Club and BMX track area. Following months of anti-social behaviour temporary police CCTV was installed for 3 months, when vandalism ceased. However, it has begun again with a drain pipe ripped off and deposited in the Robert's Playground, earth dug up to make an unauthorised extra height jump on the BMX track, log stepping stumps in playground chipped away, fly tipping in the vicinity of the track and littering. All these incidents have required substantial personal time on the part of councillors and the clerk to remedy. The Parish Council has taken the police's advice that CCTV is an important deterrent and we await the result of our grant applications to the Area Board (matched funding) and PCC Action Fund.

The BMX track was repaired two years ago at a cost of £5,000. Nevertheless, it has become evident over the intervening period that more work will soon be needed to maintain and keep the track in a repaired and safe condition. The cost of a more sustainable surface is significant and applications are now with the Area Board (matched funding) and Sport England.

At the beginning of June work started on a car wash in the centre of the village without planning permission. The council registered its objection and work stopped. It is understood that the owner of the site was informed that the canopy is in breach of planning control and that the car wash use must not commence without planning permission. At the time of writing, no application has been received. A request to Wiltshire Council for removal of the existing canvas structure and rubble resulting from drainage excavations was made at the beginning of August.

The council's application to have **The Churchill** listed as an Asset of Community Value, has been accepted by Wiltshire Council on the basis that it is the last remaining pub in the village and the only place to be able to have a meal socially. WEST LAVINGTON PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Parish Council is resuming work on West Lavington's Neighbourhood Plan following a pause brought about by the retirement from its Steering Group of several key volunteers who had been developing the Plan since its initiation in 2012/13. Recommencement of work has been enabled by receipt of a central government grant and engagement by the Parish Council of planning consultant, Anthony Northcote.

So where have we got to? In early 2016 a first draft of the Plan had been published and an eight week public consultation undertaken. 1050 questionnaires were distributed and 30 % returned - a significant and valuable level of feedback.

With regard to the choice of **development sites**, a definite preference was expressed. A clear majority of the responses, 68%, supported the single site 7 (adjacent to DAPS), with a capacity of up to 50 houses, as their first preference. A further 23% again supported site 7 combined with site 2 (adjacent to The Farm development). Support for other sites or combinations was very low.

The community response to the levels of **housing growth** was closely matched with nearly half the proportion wanting 50 to 75 houses and about the same number wanting less than 50 houses. There was only limited support for more than 75.

Overall, the proposed Plan **policies** were supported by 85% of people and there were some useful comments and suggestions that may be included in the final Plan.

What to expect next?

Wiltshire Council is currently consulting on a Settlement Boundary Review to which the Parish Council will be responding. The (relatively minor) changes that are being proposed will be overtaken by the Neighbourhood Plan in due course.

At the end of September, households will receive a Housing Needs Assessment Survey required by Wiltshire Council to establish if there is a proven need for affordable housing in the parish and to use the findings to inform the Neighbourhood Plan.

- The first section looks at existing households in the parish and also describes the levels of new housing, if any, which would be supported by respondents to the survey (a potential overlap with the findings of our NP public consultation referred to above).
- The second section examines the numbers of households who have a current need for new affordable housing.

In November, the Parish Council will undertake a Pre-submission Consultation to publicise details of proposals and policies in the next draft of the Plan. The community will be invited to comment - during a 6/7 week period - following which the Plan will be submitted to Wiltshire Council. From there, all being well, examination and referendum will follow during 2018.

NEWS FROM HOLY TRINITY C OF E PRIMARY ACADEMY

Welcome Back. Everyone!

It is wonderful to welcome all our children and their families back after the holidays. We especially enjoy welcoming all our new children and their families into our warm and friendly

school community. There are so many exciting stories to share and so many wonderful experiences to reflect on after the summer break.

Themes for this year

We encourage children to learn through topics and themes as far as possible - it is always much more fun to learn how to write a report or a story or a poem if it is relevant to the topic. And maths makes more sense if children are using their maths skills to solve problems that have to do with their topic or theme. As part of our historical studies this year we will be having a focus on invaders of the British Isles. We shall have field trips to Bath to see the Roman remains and many other field trips throughout the year to bring learning alive.

Some topics will be covered by all classes in the school, others will be specific to the class - often a topic will be suggested by the children's interests. Topics will unfold over a term or half term, often ending in a big project - a film, a class museum, a meal, a class art gallery, a musical performance or some project that provides an end point for the learning around the topic. Parents are encouraged to come into school for Sharing Assembly every Friday afternoon to see how each class is progressing through their work.

Democracy in school

At the start of the school year, each class will vote in two representatives who will sit on the student council. These councillors will help the leadership team to make strategic decisions by offering the viewpoint of the children themselves. We encourage every child to come to us with their ideas for school improvement, either by popping into the headteacher's office or by writing us notes or by mentioning things to their teachers. The student council provides another avenue for us to listen to the children themselves in a more formal context. We always take account of the children's views because if the children are happy at school they will be excellent learners. We want children to enjoy school.

Christian care for families Shonda Project. This small independent charity was set up 20 years ago to provide

children in a very poor part of Kenya with affordable primary education. It all started in 1993 when Mick and Angela Prentice travelled to Kenya on holiday. While they were there they saw many young children sleeping and living rough by the Likoni ferry terminal on the south coast of Mombasa. They made enquiries and discovered that many of these children had been orphaned following the Likoni ferry disaster in which 200 people had died. Mick and Angela wanted to help these vulnerable children so they were put in touch with a Baptist Minister who was trying to provide a school for the children. Following that first meeting they returned to the UK and started fund raising. When they returned a year later they found that work on the school building had begun. The school has now grown in size with classrooms being built entirely funded by UK donation. It has several school and church links and there are skype calls between schools. The community there is made up of both Christians and Muslims and the school has a Christian ethos and welcomes children from all faiths. 14th August Meeting: Anne Wilson was enrolled as a member by Janet Hodges and warmly welcomed into the Branch. Our topic for the afternoon was the Tear Fund Charity and the work they do with partner organizations around the world to help the poor and needy, eradicate poverty and bring relief in times of crisis. Many people around the world are starving because of the changing climate and people are being taught to help themselves resolve this problem by an innovative alternative method of cultivating crops called 'Foundations for Farming'. Most farming methods take the goodness from the soil but do not replenish it. This new method can reverse the damage by protecting and preserving the soil and retaining moisture. It is inspired by how soil is naturally replenished, with no ploughing and using mulch cover from leaves and plant materials. By adopting these methods it is possible to increase yields tenfold. For our July meeting we visited Seend Head House garden. This is a private garden that often opens for the heverells National Gardens Scheme. The owners are enthusiastic amateur gardeners. Over the past five years they have set about making a delightful garden where the previous

owners had allowed free ranging pigs and hens to modify the previously landscaped well kept garden. This has involved clearing briars and scrubland, digging out years of puddled mud from original ponds, planting lots of trees in the garden and parkland, and building new bridges across the mill race.

On the evening of our visit it was if we were getting enough rainfall to make up for the previous month's rain deficit. We rang ahead to check if we should cancel the visit but were delighted to be told that we were still welcome. The garden at Seend Head House is bordered on the north side by a high stone wall, lined on the inside in places with brick. The back wall of the fine 18th century dwelling is contiguous with the wall. The lawn in front of the house slopes down to a leat which serves a nearby mill. Bevond the leat is an island bordered on the other side by Semington Brook, a tributary of the River Avon. To the east of the house is open parkland with mature trees and some younger trees planted by the current owners. The leat too is lined with a mixture of mature and young trees. Ducks and geese roam free in the gardens. Near the house, in front of the brick lined wall is a 'hot' bed with beautiful red and orange flowers. Nearby, by contrast, is a bed with cool colours. Other borders had large lilies in an exquisite range of colours. In one area there was a fenced enclosure with raised beds where an amazing array of flowers were being grown for a friend's daughter's wedding. Even in the rain this garden appeared colourful and interesting and obviously well tended.

Our August visit to local gardens was cancelled because it was so wet underfoot and heavy showers were forecast.

For our September meeting we will be visiting Poulshot Nurseries. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 5.40pm on Tuesday 12 September.

We did manage to generate some heat in the discussion on the two books we had read. *Vinegar Girl* by an American novelist Anne Tyler, is a modern take on 'The Taming of the Shrew.' Kate is stuck running house and



home for her eccentric scientist father and her pretty uppity younger sister. Plus Kate is adored by her pre-school charges but their parents don't always appreciate her forthright manner. Then her father hatches a scheme for her to marry his brilliant lab assistant so he will not be deported. An interesting and easy read which gave rise to varying opinions but we agreed that it is a recommended novel for easy summer reading.

The second book was *The Essex Serpent* by Sarah Perry - a very different story. Set in Victorian London and Essex Village in the 1890"s and enlivened by the debates on scientific and medical discoveries of the era.'The Essex Serpent' has has at its heart the story of two extraordinary people who fall for each other, but not in the usual way. Cora is a well-to-do London widow who moved to an Essex parish where Will Ransome is the local vicar. The village is engulfed by rumours that the mythical serpent,once said to roam the marshes claiming human lives returned. Cora a keen amateur naturalist is enthralled but Will sees his parishioners as being gripped by moral panic and deviation from the faith. There are many strands to the story and for richness of prose and depth of characterisation and is well worth reading.
