From the Rector

In obedience to their laws, Jews have spilled into the city from all over Israel and still more, entering by every gate. People packed into the narrow streets. Walking under rows of washing hanging high across the streets to dry in the heat of the day and breathing in the smells wafting out from the open doorways as they pass. Women trying to keep hold of excited children. The elderly looking to see if old friends or family have arrived yet. Men at all the city gates, conducting business. Herdsmen bring in the lambs for slaughter. The temple full of the comings and goings of priests, Pharisees, Sadducees, temple guards and men, conducting business. Traders everywhere selling their wares, eager to cash in on so vast a crowd. And the roman soldiers looking on. Watching, waiting, ready to stop trouble before it can escalate into something more. And in to this heady mix of excitement and tension underlined with the fear of an occupied country, come the cries of children's voices calling Hosanna. The voices become louder and men and women join in, "Hosanna to the son of David" and "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" and "Hosanna in the highest."

Now you can see the crowd, some running ahead, some waving branches, some spreading their cloaks on the ground before.... before what? Then you see him, the rabbi, the one everyone has been talking about for the last year or so. This gentle and humble man, RIDING INTO JERUSALEM ON A DONKEY.

Palm Sunday marks the start of Holy Week. A week when Christians everywhere reenact, read about and reflect on the events of the last week in the life of Jesus. It starts with a celebration and ends with another celebration on Easter Day. But in between is a roller coaster of emotions waiting to carry us all the way to the foot of the Cross and the heart wrenching death of Jesus. BUT on Easter Day, that very first Easter Day, the whole world was given the hope of a new life.

OUR VILLAGE PUB

In the 19th century there were nine public houses and beer houses in West Lavington and Littleton Panell. We had the Railway Inn, later the Chocolate Poodle in Littleton Panell; there was an inn on the corner of Pagnell Lane called The Fox; which was closed down after some dangerous backsword games. The Cross Keys was on the site of Dauntsey's School. By the end of the 19th century it had become a teetotal coffee house. Opposite that was the Wheatsheaf, later renamed the Stagepost which was a centre of village activity until recently. Then there was the Horse and Jockey which closed within living memory, as did the Lamb Inn which was down by Dial House. And very recently we have lost the Bridge Inn.

There were also illicit beer houses to add to these. Now we have only the Churchill Arms.

The lesson we can learn from this is that the future of public houses is somewhat fragile. They are an important part of our history, but also of our communal life to this day. If we want to keep our one and only village pub we have to use it rather more than we have been doing.

Recently we celebrated a significant birthday with dinner at the Churchill Arms for 25 people. The dining room, which John and Lesley have refurbished beautifully was set out with long tables and looked really welcoming. We chose a menu and wines with John and Lesley, and they prepared a super three course meal for us. John may not have trained with any of the top chefs, but he can certainly cook. We all had a great time and the food was highly complimented.

So what I am suggesting is that we try out a dining club. Once every month or every two months, John and Lesley will put on a special three course meal on the first Saturday of the month. The club members will choose a menu in consultation with John and Lesley, and order in advance; with a choice of perhaps two starters and two mains and two desserts. The cost will be £25 a head. We will all sit together and eat together. making it a very social evening as well as a gastronomic one. Lesley will also get in some interesting wines (which are not included in the price of the meal).

John's pub grub is very good, but it would be lovely to be able to enjoy a special meal close to home, wouldn't it?

By the time you read this we will have had an introductory dinner on the 1st April. The next dinner will be on Saturday 6th May.

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100 YEARS AGO The Battle of Vimy Ridge

The main assault began on 9th April, and progress was slow but steady as the Canadians fought to take the ridge. The weather was cold and later changed to sleet and snow. Although this was physically uncomfortable for everyone, the German troops suffered the disadvantage of having the snow blowing in their faces. Light Canadian and British artillery bombardments continued throughout the prior night but stopped in the few minutes before the attack, as the artillery recalibrated their guns in preparation for the synchronized barrage. At exactly 5.30 am, every artillery piece at the disposal of the Canadian Corps began firing. Thirty seconds later, engineers detonated mine charges laid under no man's land, destroying a number of German strong points and creating secure communication trenches directly across no man's land. The battle continued until 12th April, by which evening the Canadians were in full control of the Ridge. The Canadians lost over 3500 men in the action.

It was at this battle on 12th April 1917 that Private Edward Lye was killed.

Edwin was born in 1886 in Market Lavington, the son of Henry Self Lye, a labourer, and his wife Mary. He was one of eight children. The family was living at Manor Lodge in Market Lavington in 1891, but they had moved to Littleton Panell by 1901. Edwin was at that time working as a labourer in a dairy.

In 1908 Edwin married Jean Smith and they had one son, George Henry Lye, born 16th September 1908. In 1911 the family was still living in Littleton Panell, and Edwin was working as a domestic gardener.

Edwin served in the The Prince of Wales's Leinster Regiment, otherwise known as the Royal Canadians. At the time of the Great War this infantry regiment was based in Ireland, and it is likely that Edwin was sent to that Regiment to make up a shortfall of numbers. Some details of his war service are unknown but it is certain that he was killed at the battle of Vimy Ridge when a concerted attack, largely by Canadian soldiers 2hicch resulted in victory, despite the loss of 3.500 men. Among the casualties was Edward Lye. He has no grave recorded but his name appears on the Arras Memorial

A JUST CAUSE

ANNE WILSON IS WALKING FROM WEST LAVINGTON TO WESTMINSTER ON 15TH-19TH JUNE to raise funds for the MNDA and Dorothy House Hospice and to raise awareness of the changing places campaign.

My husband Dave was diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease (MND) 10 years ago. MND leads to weakness and wasting of muscles, causing increasing loss of mobility in the limbs, and difficulties with speech, swallowing and breathing. I am hoping to raise £5000 to support The Motor Neuron Disease Association (MNDA) and Dorothy House Hospice, two of the organisations which have supported Dave. I also want to raise awareness of the lack of adequate toilet facilities for people like Dave who have significant physical disabilities.

AS Dave's MND has progressed he has become more limited in the things he is able to do but we still try to go out and about as much as possible. The main factor which limits what we are able to do is the lack of suitable toilet facilities. Dave has very limited mobility and requires a hoist and the help of carers to get in and out of his wheelchair and on to a toilet. A standard disabled toilet is not suitable for Dave. He needs the cubicle to be big enough to fit Dave, his wheelchair and two carers, along with the kit we have to carry with us. It also needs to have a hoist so that he can transfer in and out of his wheelchair.

There are very few places with fully adapted toilets like this – only about 928 across the UK. Changing Places campaigns for better adapted toilet facilities. There is currently a campaign to try and get enough signatures to generate a parliamentary debate on the need for public buildings to have Changing places toilets in addition to standard disabled toilets. The petition needs 100,000 signatures before it will be debated in parliament. You can sign the petition at https://petition.parliament.uk/petitions/177423. Meeting on 15th March 2017 in Little Cheverell Village Hall.

Proposed installation of a defibrillator - The meeting began with a presentation for village residents by Julia Doel, Assistant Community Responder Officer of South Western Ambulance Service. At the end of the presentation a show of hands confirmed that those attending the meeting supported the initiative.

The following were the main items discussed.

- 1. The Parish Steward Scheme The Parish Steward concentrated on potholes and brambles on March 9th. The PC Chair reported that the chevron near the Village Hall had not been repaired. Sue lvey is attempting to arrange for the council to bring more robust equipment to deal with silt in School Lane and brambles along Low Road. Please contact Sue on 813439 or sueivey3@aol.com to report any issues that you notice. The Parish Steward comes to Little Cheverell for one day every month.
- 2.Low Road 20 mph a successful outcome following recent metro-count. At the next Community Area Transport Group meeting it will be proposed that the institution of the 20 mph limit will go ahead, but this could take up to a year to actually happen.
- 3.Low Broadband speed The Wiltshire Cabinet member for Broadband has notified us that Little Cheverell is to be excluded from the Phase 3 Gainshare rollout. However our Devizes MP is holding an advice surgery in May, for affected communities in order to investigate how connection problems could be overcome.
- 4.Parish Council Elections Nominations close by 4 p.m. on April 4th and polling day is May 4th. Nomination packs are available on the council website.

5.Next Meeting: Wednesday 7 pm 10th May 2017.

The Great British Spring Clean exemplified the pride Littleton Panell and West Lavington feel in our neighbourhood. Wiltshire Council provided equipment and later collected the large pile of stuffed sacks of rubbish, the Youth Club unlocked its doors to allow

Spring Cleaners to gather at 9.30 am and West Lavington Twinning Association ran a brilliant 'Cafe Continental' in the Village Hall.

Most of the 64 bags of rubbish collected consisted of leaves and roadside debris but, although early in the year before the weather permits people to be enjoying the out-of-doors, there were still, sadly, signs of litter:



cans smashed wantonly into drainage grates; bottles discarded or crushed; and torn up remnants of sweet wrappers. On a positive and welcome note, however, only one pile of dog poo was found on the playing fields and reports, since the day, indicate a reduction in the amount of dog faeces on several footpaths. Our anti-dog fouling campaign will be continuing, but we are grateful for this improvement and, as always, to all responsible dog walkers.

Finally, a very big thank you from the Parish Council to everyone who turned out for the West Lavington parish's Great British Spring Clean, to those who cleaned before the event, to those who helped to organise the day - and to Cllr. Steve Coxhead who managed it all.

Parish and Wiltshire Council Elections, 4 May

Your local Councillors are again up for election. This is your opportunity, through the Ballot Box, to say whether you think they're doing a good job. Great Cheverell has 7 Councillors, and Wiltshire Council's Lavingtons and Erlestoke Division has 1 Councillor. You will receive the usual voting card from Wiltshire Council in due course. But why not think of becoming a Councillor yourself ? It's not an onerous task, but it does allow you to steer the village in the best interests of its residents. "Ask not what your village can do for you " as somebody once almost said. If you want to stand, you need to submit your application by 4 pm on 4 April, so timing is tight. NEWS FROM HOLY TRINITY C of e primary academy

School Council: Because we want to make sure that our school is as good a possible for our children, we always encourage them to make their views about improvements to the school known to us. One of the forums for finding out what the children would like

is the School Council. The Councillors are elected by each class and we have council meetings in which various aspects of school life are discussed. The Councillors are very good about canvassing opinion on matters of the moment and reporting back very sensibly. They have asked us for some new playground equipment and the Councillors are working with our design team to come up with a "Space Ship" which will provide a new role play area on the school field. We hope that this will be completed before the end of the summer term.

Pancake Races: As a church school, we like to mark the important liturgical events wherever possible. We always mark the beginning of the Lent and Easter season with a morning of pancake races. This is taken very seriously and the points are added to the total won by each team over the year for various events, with the winning team being awarded the trophy on Sports Day in July. This year, Red team won the coveted Frying Pan trophy for winning the pancake races.

PE at Holy Trinity: We use the government funding for PE to employ professional sports coaches for our children, to improve our equipment and to provide opportunities for children to try out a variety of different sports. Sport has always had a high profile at our school and children enjoy PE lessons. It is good to see them integrating their maths, science and literacy with PE – for instance, by checking their pulse before a PE activity and then afterwards, seeing what the impact is of exercise on the outcomes of an arithmetic test (counter intuitively, children do worse in these tests after they have run around the field!) and writing up reports on their PE activities.

Science at Holy Trinity: Some of our children are using the topic of "Bread" for their studies this term, and they carried out an investigation on bread and yeast, using different temperatures of water to start the bread mixing. The water of 70C killed the yeast and the bread was heavy and leaden. The temperature of 40C worked the best. Temps of 20C and 4C were more successful than might have been predicted. This topic has also offered great learning opportunities for history, geography, maths and literacy. **Come and see our school:** If you think your child would enjoy being at our school, please make an appointment to come and visit us, have a look around and chat to the Headteacher. BOOKMARK GREAT CHEVERELL

Our meetings are now held in the afternoon, with tea and cake to add to our enjoyment. We discussed Expose by Helen Dunmore, novel set in London in 1960 at the height of the Cold War. Spy fever fills the newspapers and the political establishment knows how and where to bury its secrets. The story is of forbidden love,



intimate betrayal and the devastating power of exposure. The story revolves around a missing file and by the impact on a family when the husband is arrested on a charge of espionage. A great read, very descriptive of the 1960's. Highly recommended.

When we arrived at the Village Hall for our March meeting we found large bundles of willow, cornus and hazel heverells prunings from Rupert Wade's garden. For his talk about and demonstration of willow weaving Rupert had also brought various structures that he had made earlier. There

was a vine that he had woven into a circle. This when placed on legs would be a useful support for a peony he explained. There was some hazel wound into a circle with some pieces bisecting the circle so that it looked like a rose or circular window frame. When placed on canes this could be used to support a clump of lupins or delphiniums. And there was some green willow woven into a heart shaped, carpet beater style object which Rupert said would look good in multiples used as edging for paths or flower beds. Dominating the display was a tall obelisk with a large woven ring part way up and another higher up. This structure was destined to support a clematis plant in Rupert's garden and there was a spiral of willow ascending the structure to encourage the plant to wind around the obelisk. Rupert then proceeded to demonstrate how to make an obelisk. Firstly he selected seven sturdy canes for the uprights. It needs to be an uneven number of canes as became clear later when he started to weave in and out of the canes. He held the canes tight in a bundle with an extra stubby cane on the outside. He then bound the bundle together at the apex with cornus or hazel or other flexible material. As he approached the end of the binding he removed the stubby stick and used the gap created for threading through and securing the ends. It was at this point that we discovered why we needed a 2ft square piece of cardboard for our 'have a go' session. By threading the uprights through it and moving it up from the base it became a support for the structure so that you could commence the weaving of the rings. If you were working outdoors you could of course plant the poles in vour lawn instead.

We had come equipped with gloves and secateurs for our 'have a go' session. Manipulating long whippy prunings in a confined space was a challenge. Happily no injuries were sustained. Luckily Rupert had cautioned us not to create anything too large to carry home! Even so it was entertaining to watch the audience trying to exit the hall with their creations at the end of the evening.

It was an interesting and fun evening. During the hands on session Rupert offered help and advice and answered our questions. He showed us how to manipulate the sticks to make them more flexible and he encouraged us to use different colours to make more interesting structures. Most of us went home confident that we could make structures that would look good even when the plants had not yet grown over them. Suitable material is available in most gardens or can be begged from neighbours. And it is very satisfying to create something both beautiful and useful.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 11th April. Carl Gill will be talking about planting up containers. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 p.m. for a 7.30 p.m. start. New members are always welcome. There is a charge of £2 per meeting for non members.


