

This year's Harvest Festival will be at 11am on September 30th. The service will be followed by lunch in the church. All are welcome.



# COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH UPDATE

Your parish Community Speed Watch team continue to volunteer and give their time freely to help keep our roads safe. Although some motorists protest, the majority are supportive. We have eleven volunteers in the team. Whilst it is true that most are retired, some work and have school age children, so even if you can only give an hour every 3 weeks or so, all are welcome.

So far this year, the team have spent 83 hours checking vehicle speed at 6 sites in the parish. These sites are risk assessed by the police and we can only operate at those locations.

Members of the team are trained by the police and strict operating rules have to be complied with such as not hiding. The speed device we use is not a camera and does not take photographs or record vehicle registration numbers.

This year a total of 222 vehicles have been recorded as travelling over 36 mph, 62 of them were over 40 mph and 16 over 45 mph. Three were over 50 mph and one was at 55 mph. All of these vehicles have been reported to the police and the owners will have been sent warning letters with the more serious ones actually being visited by a Police Officer.

We all know that these figures are only a snapshot and that many more vehicles threaten our safety by going far too fast.

Times and locations of roles vary. Full training will be provided. All roles require DBS clearance and some roles require Prison Vetting Clearance. Please note these checks can take a number of weeks to process.

# WEST LAVINGTON VILLAGE HALL, Latest news

You may well have heard on the grapevine about significant changes to the management of the Village Hall. At the last meeting, it was agreed, that with major support from the Parish Council, we would create part time paid roles to make the task of managing the building efficient and viable. There is no doubt that the jobs required to run the hall go way beyond the remit of a volunteering role, and it has only worked over the past few years thanks to Lynne Rayner's role in particular in managing the booking system. With significantly increased hiring of the hall, this has created more and more work, to the point that it could not continue on its previous form.

A caretaker has already been appointed, and we are currently advertising for a parttime Clerk/Hall manager to undertake the booking and financial tasks, together with a range of responsibilities associated with running a semi public building.

Whilst this process will relieve the committee of the day-by-day management of the Hall, the need for new volunteers is still paramount, particularly for people prepared to plan and develop a strategy to improve the building, and enhance the activities which take place. We need volunteers to help market the hall, to oversee finance (day by day finance will be managed by the new clerk) to help plan the ongoing maintenance and improvements to the building, and also to trigger new events and activities for the village. So please, if you think you might be able to help, and not be bogged down by mundane day by day tasks, then you are, please, wanted!

And just to update you on the current situation regarding officers, I was elected Chairman at the last meeting, Lynne Rayner promised to continue her input until later in the year, and Richard Durrant, current treasurer, has clearly asked to be allowed to step down, but is currently holding the fort. The village owes a considerable vote of thanks to them both. Under the "new" regime, there will not be a need for a formal treasurers position, (it isn't included in the constitution) although there may well be a need for a secretary in order to carry out formal legal procedures.

# 100 YEARS AGO

#### August 1918 Private Charles Edward Blagden 92408. Killed in Action 24th August 1918

Charles was born about 1887 in West Lavington, the son of William Blagden, a gardener, and his wife, Mary Elizabeth Topp. Charles had a younger brother and two sisters. The family lived in one of the cottages at Speke, on Strawberry Hill.

At the age of 14, Charles was working as a page boy. He remained in domestic service, as in 1913, when he married Eliza Jane Smith in Bethnal Green, he was working as a butler and living at Warrenfield, Southbourne, Sussex. Charles' sisters, Edith and Rose were also in domestic service in London.

Charles originally joined the Kings Royal Rifle Corps, but was later transferred to the 3rd battalion Royal Fusiliers. In August 1918 they were involved in the third Battle of Albert, during which Charles was posted as missing. This battle was the opening phase of the Second Battle of the Somme, which eventually led to the armistice. It was not until November of 1918 that Eliza received confirmation that Charles had been killed in action on 24th August 1918.

Charles and Eliza had a daughter, Gwendoline, born in 1914. She married William Lane in Paddington in 1938, and they had a daughter Edwina born in 1944 in Bath, Somerset.

Eliza remarried in 1920, a George Evans. She was still living in London at that time.

#### September 1918

#### Gunner Walter Sim Dennett 145638. Died of Wounds 3 rd September 1918

Walter, known as Sim, was born in Horsebridge, Hampshire in 1885, the son of Samuel Dennett and his wife Mary. Samuel was a publican, and, in 1891, the family was living at the Bear and Staff public house in Michelmersh, Romsey, Hampshire. Sim had three older brothers and a sister. In 1901 they were at Bockhampton, Christchurch, Hampshire.

Sim, having grown up in pubs, became a beerhouse keeper. He married Gertrude Weeks in 1910 in Christchurch, and they had one son, Simon Theodore born in 1915.

Sim first signed up in May 1916, and he was put on the Reserve. He wasn't called up until 26th March 1917, when he was living at Littleton Panell, and his occupation was recorded as a cowman. He served as a gunner in the Royal Garrison Artillery, 124th Heavy Battery.

On 3rd September 1918, a telegram was sent to Gertrude informing her that her husband

had been dangerously wounded. Permission to visit him would not be granted. He had received a gunshot wound in the back. On 12th September a further telegram was sent to her to inform her that Walter had died on 4th September 1918. He was buried in Ligny-St Flochel Cemetery, Averdoingt. Later, Gertrude received her husband's personal effects, which comprised letters, photos, a religious book, his wallet, a comb and file in a case and a dictionary.

#### Private Frank Evan Sainsbury 146424. Died of Wounds 11th September 1918

Frank was born in 1896, the only child of Charles Sainsbury, a bricklayer, and his wife, Rosanna Beaven. They lived in Little Cheverell. In 1911 Frank was working as a labourer on a dairy farm. He joined the Wiltshire Regiment but was transferred to the 14 th Company of the Machine Gun Corps.

In August and September, he would have been involved in the second Battle of Bapaume, and it was probably during this battle that he was wounded. He was taken to the Casualty Clearing Station at Watten, where he died of his wounds on 11 th September. The British and Commonwealth attack at Bapaume is often taken to be the turning point of the First World War on the Western Front and the beginning of what was later known as the Allies' Hundred Days Offensive. Improved armoured support and artillery bombardment weakened once impregnable positions and helped the Allied forces tear holes through trench lines.

Frank was buried in the Bleue Maison Military Cemetery in Eperlecques.

#### Petty Officer Telegraphist Albert Henry Kelsey Amor P0/231633. Died 16th September 1918

Albert, or Bertie as he was known, was born on 2nd January 1888 in Easterton. His father was a retired Royal Navy man, Mark Amor. His mother was Agnes. Mark came from Bromham, and Agnes from Bedminster. They had six children, and the family lived in Cheverell Lane next to the Wesleyan Chapel. They later moved to Fir View, Little Cheverell.

Bertie followed his father into the Royal Navy and he achieved the rank of Petty Officer, Telegraphist. In 1918, he was serving aboard the HMS Britannia, based mainly in Sierra Leone, and operating on patrol and escort duties in the Atlantic.

Bertie was taken ill and died in Freetown, Sierra Leone on 16 th September 1918. He was buried in King Tom Cemetery, Freetown.

HMS Britannia was torpedoed and sunk two days before the armistice, with the loss of fifty



### A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Phew! Summer is over – and what a time it's been! Heat, drought, fires (here and across the globe), earthquakes, floods. The natural world may be trying to tell us something. I hope you have been OK in the midst of such drama.

If that was not enough, the political world has been pretty traumatic too. Tory turmoil over Brexit and Boris and burkas. Anti-semitic socialists. Trump's trade wars. Russian attacks on Salisbury. Agitation in Turkey. Migrants, Malta, Mexico, even Manchester, and continuing misery in the Middle East. The list of trouble spots goes on and on.

The media used to call August "the silly season" because there was nothing sensible to report. I wish!

And yet, now we are in September, how is it for you? Here? Now? I know it's tough for some but, for most of us, I'll bet life's not too bad, although it may not always feel like it. Almost all our schools are still "Good" or better. Our economy in Wiltshire is growing in almost every sector. Unemployment is at a historic low. Life expectancy is higher than it has ever been. Most potholes have been filled. Wonderful music, art and culture is here for everyone to enjoy.

And, unlike some local authorities, Wiltshire Council is not in financial meltdown.

Looking back, life wasn't always rosy. Problems with Russia? I remember the Cold War, which only ended in1991. Dealing with insurrection? - Bloody Sunday (1972). Industrial unrest? - the 3-day week (1974) and the Winter of Discontent (1979). Extremists? - the Militant Tendency (1980's). Financial insecurity? - Black Monday (1987, when stock markets crashed) and Black Wednesday (1992, when we withdrew from the European Exchange Rate Mechanism). Weather? - we survived the winter of '62, the drought of '76 and the hurricane of '87. All that and many other traumas!

I don't want to echo MacMillan by suggesting that "we've never had it so good" but I have not yet spotted the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse. Let's hope they're riding in the opposite direction.

# WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

While you were enjoying the summer of 2018! The refurbished BMX track was opened by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire, David Scott, on Fete day, 14 July. PC Cllr Peter Blundell's historical display showed photos from its 2008 beginnings to its recent revamp. Members of the Area Board (which helped with funding) attended the ceremony as did riders from Ramp Nation in Devizes. Unitary Cllr Laura Mayes went on to open the very successful West Lavington Fete.

An NHS consultation began for a **new pharmacy** in West Lavington within 450 metres of Courtyard Surgery. The application is by A&H Pharmacies and the consultation continues until 14 September. Following Parish Council representations:

- an Examiner for the **Neighbourhood Plan** has been appointed by Wiltshire Council, following the unexpected forced Regulation 16 consultation extension. Examination should begin in September, to be followed by the referendum.
- a Wiltshire Council enforcement order was served to remove the carwash structure erected over a year ago at the junction of Sandfield and the A360 (amounting to a change of use without permission). The remaining structures have now been fully dismantled and WC's file is closed.
- agents erecting estate agent signs at the Millennium Cross and at the corner of Duck Street received a Wiltshire Council enforcement order to take them down. Legislation only allows display of temporary advertisements regarding the sale or letting of dwellings on the premises themselves.
- The damaged bus shelter between The Mercers and Wheatsheaf Mews was finally removed. The stop is still in use for buses to Salisbury.

Sunnyside and Orchard Place will be closed for resurfacing from September 12 to 14. Russell Mill Lane was resurfaced on 27 July.

The Parish Council made further grants to the Village Hall for the appointment of a paid caretaker and hall manager/clerk following volunteer resignations. Volunteers are still sought for supervisory treasury and secretarial roles, marketing and hirer viewings. We, and the new hall chairman, Mike May, encourage you to step forward!

Dog poo in public places is again on the increase. Please recall earlier health, environmental and societal cautions. Also, a report was received recently of an unattended dog, with in the village confines, attacking and killing a deer. Please keep your dogs under control.

We last had a Garden Club visit to Windmill Cottage, Market Lavington in June 2015. This time we visited in August when many plants had finished flowering. It was interesting to see how this garden had withstood the long dry spell. Despite the drought Rupert Wade

had opened his garden regularly for the NGS throughout this year. We were the last visitors of the season and already preparations were in hand to spruce things up for next year.

In this one acre, cottage style, wildlife friendly garden the many mature trees had provided some cool shade for the borders. Most of the flowering plants were past their peak but there was still plenty of colour to be seen. And everywhere cyclamen flowers were peeping through under the drying stems of the herbaceous plants. The garden is well served with pathways, including a woodland walk. A new addition this year was a bench at the end of the woodland where one could sit and contemplate a wonderful view of the surrounding countryside. There were many apple and plum trees laden with fruit. Birds and insects were gorging themselves on this fruit and no doubt at nightime the local badgers would be joining in the feasting.

As we progressed through the garden we kept spotting seedlings and cuttings in pots ready to replenish the flower beds for next year. Rupert collects seeds from the garden and propagates plants for sale, exchange and for home use. He also takes cuttings. His polytunnel, when the tomato harvest is complete, is used to overwinter some of the seedlings.

Because Windmill Cottage is at the brow of a hill on free draining greensand, drought would be a challenge. But because of constant mulching and the microclimate afforded by the canopy of trees and the diversity of the planting Rupert managed to keep interest and structure throughout the seasons. Instead of taking a well earned rest now he will be, like his fellow gardeners, preparing for the next season.

We finished the evening relaxing with tea and cake and watching the creatures in the pond.

For various reasons we have had to cancel our planned vegetable show in September. Also the speaker that we booked for September has cancelled. Instead we are holding a mini Fun Show at our September meeting on Tuesday 11 September. There will be six classes. Details have been e-mailed to members and leaflets have been distributed locally. Using data collected by our local weather recorders we will also be holding a discussion comparing this year with previous years. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start. #### EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH The Art of the Possible

On occasion adulation has been the order of the day. Remember the euphoria that greeted Tony Blair's election in 1997? New Labour, New Britain. 'Things can only get better', was the song. We all know where that ended. When it comes to our elected leaders we need a good dose of realism. Politics, as has been said is 'the art of the possible'. 
Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save.
