FEBRUARY REFLECTION FROM THE RECTOR

So here we are again. Christmas is but another memory. The winter storms have come and thankfully gone and now we turn to thoughts of spring and the promise of warmer days, colourful bulbs and longer daylight hours. The cycle of the seasons never fails to excite or lead us further on our journey through the years.

And so it is with the Church. Candlemass sees the end of the Christmas story and for traditionalists; this is the time to pack away the Crib for another year. Having celebrated the birth of Christ, the Church turns to Lent and preparations for celebrating the death and resurrection of Our Lord.

The season of lent, as with Advent is a time of waiting and making ready. In Lent the making ready is time for self examination. To summarize – Several interesting points worth mentioning this year:

- The average temperature was slightly lower and rainfall considerably lower.
- It is guite surprising to note that the driest month was April, guite unusual in fact.
- Several points to note on December 10th Lowest barometric pressure, wettest day of the year and highest wind speed recorded this year together with wet snow.
- As for snow, there was about 2 cm of wet snow in the early hours of December 10th which of course soon melted away but locations a little further north had considerably more.
- We also had a dusting of snow on February 11th.

Having completed 40 years of recording weather on a daily basis at this location there are some very interest points which could to be noted here but where would we start? However here are a few of the most interesting points:

Wettest vear: 2002 Total rainfall 1258mm (49.51 ins)

Driest year: 2011 529mm (20.81 ins) Warmest year: 2011 11.61C (52.88 F) Coldest year: 1987 8.4C (47.1 F)

Note - The warmest and driest year were both 2011, so what will 2018 bring?!

A Very Short History of England's Cathedrals



A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

Southern England is one of the most densely populated regions in Europe, even the world. Yet I don't need to remind you that our immediate area is largely wide open countryside. The nearest large urban centres of Swindon, Bath or Southampton are far away and the journey to any one of them can take up to an hour or more.

Indeed, our relative remoteness is one of the most attractive features of this area. If you have a car, it is possible to reach all the shops and services you may need with relative ease. But what if you can't drive, or if you can't afford a car, or if your partner is using the one family car and you are left behind? Well, you use the bus of course! Regular and reasonably frequent bus services link us with Devizes, Salisbury, Trowbridge and Bath and many people rely on them.

Public transport is a lifeline to those who need it, but it would be a mistake to take services for granted. Half of all bus journeys in the county are subsidised by Wiltshire Council - and I do not need to remind you that the Council's budget is being squeezed ever more tightly.

It is a relief, therefore, to report that responses to the recent consultation on car parking have shown considerable support for a rise in parking charges, which will help support the buses. For the coming year at least, I am assured that subsidised bus services are safe. By contrast, residents in some neighbouring counties have not been so fortunate, where rural bus services have been decimated.

And what of the trains? Devizes is more remote from a railway station than any other town in Wiltshire, although we have a main line running right through the area. Think of the benefits of having a station that could link us to Reading, to London, to Bristol, to Heathrow, to Taunton and Exeter, etc. Well, I am very pleased to report that the Devizes Development Partnership has set up a group to try to develop a parkway station near Lydeway.

The first requirement is to identify services that could stop there. The HSTs that currently serve the far south west could not stop, but the advent of the new bi-mode trains that use either electric or diesel power will provide a window of opportunity for such services to be possible.

GWR is currently undertaking a consultation on the possible extension of its franchise into the 2020s and DDP are asking for support for a new Devizes Parkway station. You can find more details of the consultation here https://www.gov.uk/government/ consultations/great-western-rail-franchise and you have until 21 February to respond. For the first time in many years, there is a real possibility that Devizes could have a station. It's not yet a certainty, but you could say we are travelling hopefully.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

NEW COUNCILLOR: Councillors were delighted at their January meeting to co-opt Bridget Herniman to fill the casual vacancy on the council left by Bonnie Matters. Bridget has lived in the parish for over 20 years. She is active in the community including running, to great acclaim with her husband Steve, the Bottle Stall at the village fete and recently taking over as Poppy Appeal Co-ordinator. She has, in addition to many other roles, served as a governor in a local primary school culminating in taking over as Chairman. Bridget says "I love my village". She also describes herself as "an action focused individual". Without doubt, just what the council and community needs!

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN: The Parish Council thanks all who participated in the consultation. Consultation meetings have taken place with Wiltshire Council and Gaiger Brothers, owners of the community's preferred site for development. Completed response forms from residents, statutory consultees and other bodies are in the process of being analysed and some changes to the Plan will be made as a result of consultees' comments. Once the analysis process has been concluded, a full report will be presented to the Parish Council. However, I am pleased to tell the council's February meeting that support for the Plan from those responding to the consultation was overwhelming.

PRECEPT: The Parish Council has set the precept for 2018/19 and an amount of £30,668 has been accepted by Wiltshire Council. The new annual rate is £65.49 for a Band D house (an increase of £1.28) and represents a 2% rise in precept on last year. The Parish Council supports community assets and amenities such as the Village Hall, the Youth Club, the BMX track and Robert's Playground. It maintains rights of way and enables projects including the Neighbourhood Plan. The council also provides facilities for the elderly and pays for overheads such as the clerk's salary, insurance, waste collection and grass cutting.

CCTV: You may recall that the Devizes Area Board supported the Parish Council's application for matched funding for CCTV cameras at the Village Hall following vandalism to the hall and play equipment, many instances of anti-social behaviour and evidence of drug dealing. All these incidents required substantial personal time on the part of councillors, the clerk and Village Hall volunteers and staff to remedy. Significant repair bills were incurred. The police were kept very busy with visits and patrols but the perpetrators were never caught. The police advised that CCTV can be an important deterrent and can help detect criminal and anti-social behaviour. Moreover, when they installed temporary police cameras for a trial period at the hall, the activity stopped. Installation of the council's own CCTV system at the hall is now beginning. The system will comprise five high definition cameras installed around the hall and a further long range high definition camera which will provide cover for the far end of the playing fields in the vicinity of the BMX track. When ready to operate, prominently placed signs will indicate the area controlled by the cameras. The council's intention is to ensure that this public space will for the future be and remain free of criminal and anti-social behaviour and that people using the facilities will feel secure.

BMX TRACK: It has become evident that a more sustainable modern track surface is needed to maintain and keep the BMX track in the recreation grounds in a repaired and safe condition. Several quotes have been sought and the best value for money comes out in the region of £13,000. Two applications for grants have been made to Sport England without success. An application of £5000 is now before the Area Board, this being the maximum amount of grant available from the Board. The balance of the sum required will need to be found from precept or CIL funds.

CHEVERELL MAGNA PARISH COUNCIL

The Council last met on 8 January, and will meet again on 5 February and 12 March – 7.30pm at The Pavilion, Witchcombe Close, All interested parties are always welcome to attend. The Minutes of the last meeting (in December) are available to see on the website, the Notice Board outside the shop, and Victoria Park.

At the January meeting, the Council co-opted Pete Cadwgan of The Green to the vacant Councillor slot. Welcome, Pete! We'll find a specific responsibility for you soon...

The Council continues to focus on the protection and maintenance of the village, in particular traffic issues (where we are in discussion with Erlestoke PC over the shared use of Speed Indication Devices), street lights, potholes and footpaths (especially the ongoing dog fouling issue). Many of these issues require rectification by Wiltshire Council, with whom we enjoy a good working relationship (the recent clearance of the fallen tree in the drainage ditch from Green Lane to Weavers Mead being a case in point). The Council also supports local charities and events, such as the forthcoming Summer Fayre at Holy Trinity School at the end of June, and the Soap Box Derby in August.

The Council also regularly reviews the condition of the Playground next to the Pavilion, and the facilities provided. It has recently decided to buy two metal benches for parents supervising their children, and is also considering specific picnic tables. Consideration is also being given to planting a hedge along Witchcombe Lane to protect the western edge of the playing field.

The condition of Victoria Park is an ongoing concern. Regular updates are received from Wiltshire Council and the Victoria Park Residents Association (VPRA) about the pressure being put on the Ministry of Justice (as its on Prison land) to undertake remedial work to the roads, which are in very poor condition. The Council is particularly concerned about the number of failed street lights.

The Council has just received a significant piece of work by Councillor Andy Alexander on an Emergency Plan for the village. This will cover those unwanted occurrences such as flooding and traffic accidents, and even worse things such as a rail crash or a military accident. It's a good thing to plan for such things, however unlikely. Further work will be undertaken on this.

And, finally, the Council has agreed its budget for the next financial year, and the resulting 2018/19 Precept. It is, unfortunately, increasing, but only due to the need to undertake the 5-yearly tree survey for the protection of residents. A 4.67% increase has been agreed, which sounds horrendous until you realise that it's only a £545 increase over last year, which is an increase of £1.79 for a whole year for the average Band D property. Still a lot less than a pint in The Bell!

- 1. The Parish steward's next visit is scheduled for Jan 22nd. The main priorities for this time of year have been logged with Northern Highways. They are: keeping drains clear and repairing small potholes. Please contact sueivey3@aol.com with any tasks you think the steward may be able to tackle.
- 2. There was an objection to the Low Road 20 mph speed limit so this will now be subject to a special report and the final decision will be made by a County Council cabinet member.
- 3.Low Road will be closed for 30 metres near The Terrace from 21-23 February.
- 4. The idea to create a group email of village residents has progressed. Preliminary enquiries have found that those village residents asked, so far, are in favour. If you would like to be part of this initiative please send an email to the chairman at: littlecheverell@gmail.com,
- 5. The mud on roads was discussed and its link with building work and large hgv vehicles which have travelled down Low Road in error. The parish council is investigating the possibility of moving some signs at the railway bridge end of Low Road to improve their visibility and removing a sign which is thought to be misleading. Also, there is a suggestion that the parish council could pay for mud to be cleared from Low Road and School Lane if no other solution can be found.
- 6.It is the intention to hold an informal meeting with refreshments, during the day so that young families would get a chance to speak to councillors about issues that affect them. The decision on a date for this has been deferred until after the next meeting.
- 7. There was further discussion about parking on Low Road and the possibility of finding a piece of land to buy/rent for about 12 cars.
- 8. The next meeting will be on Wednesday 14th March 2018 at 7pm in the Village Hall.

We have also been regularly visited by ACTIVE Trowbridge this term and the children have loved this opportunity to learn new games and explore new equipment.



There was a good turnout for our first meeting in 2018. We were delighted to have as our speaker, Denise Plummer, a local farmer, who also writes a weekly column in the Wiltshire Gazette and Herald. In her talk 'My Farming Life', Denise provided us with a very entertaining evening

of anecdotes about her upbringing and her career in farming.

She was very amusing about always being in the wrong place at the wrong time and how this had led her into being voted onto committees or ending up undertaking tasks for which, initially, she felt ill equipped. Undaunted, it seemed that she had embraced the opportunities, steeled her nerves and surprised herself with what she was able to achieve. She once found herself thrust into the limelight during a foot and mouth outbreak when the media wanted a farmer's viewpoint. And she had undertaken some media training thereafter as she was often in demand for radio programmes to cover country and farming topics.

Throughout her evening with us, it became obvious that she has a passion for farming and the environment. She drew analogies between the farmer's duty of care for their animals and the environment and gardeners needing to be aware of pests and diseases and their duty to protect our environment.

By special request, Denise gave us a short lecture about rearing poultry at home and how to find out what rules and regulations apply.

Denise was very positive about the future of farming. She said that the use of satellite technology and robotics have taken the guesswork out of a lot of things and enabled precise measurement of input and output. It has enabled farmers to use less fertilizers and pesticides. The use of robotics in a milking parlour can assist with record keeping, optimise feed rations, and indicate the best cows to breed from, as well as reducing the number of humans that need to be employed. The invention of new machines for picking crops has cut back on the demand for seasonal labour.

On Tuesday 13 February, our speaker will be Charlotte Howard. Charlotte runs a garden maintenance and design business. She will be talking about garden design and especially the use of colour to create striking effects. Meet at Great Cheverell Village Hall at 7.15 for a 7.30pm start. There is a £2 charge for non-members.

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH Hope for the World

It is often assumed that Christianity is a declining faith. Recent surveys in the UK have that shown that fewer people now call themselves Christians than used to be the case. But that is not the whole story. In China the number of practicing Christians grew from 2.7 million 1975 to 75 million in 2010. The increase has been no less spectacular in Africa, from 1.6 million Christians in 1900 to 182 million in 2010.

There are report of many people turning to the Christian faith even in places such as Iran and North Korea. In countries where growth is most rapid following Jesus may well mark a person out for harsh persecution, but still they believe and refuse to renounce their faith for an easier life.

Where growth is in evidence it tends to be among churches that take the Bible and its teaching seriously. That is the case even in the secular West, After all, why bother going to church only to be told that you don't need to believe the stuff? And why do people believe the stuff? Because they are convinced that it is true.

Some might object that science has disproved God, but deciding whether or not God exists is outside of the remit of science. Science can tell us a lot about the universe, but it cannot explain why there is a universe in the first place, or how come science is even possible? As Einstein said, the most incomprehensible thing about the universe is that it is comprehensible. Why should it be?

The Christian faith teaches us that God created the universe and made human beings in his image that we might glorify and enjoy him. That is why we can appreciate and understand something of the world that he made.

The trouble is that we have turned our backs upon God and made a mess of his wonderful world. But he has not forsaken us. God sent his Son, the Lord Jesus to rescue us from sin by his death on the cross and resurrection from the dead. This is the good news that people all around the world have come to believe. A message of hope for everyone.
