An Antidote to Chaos

No, I'm not going to propose a solution to the political malaise over Brexit. My guess is as good (or bad) as anyone's on that one. Rather, I want to say a word or two about 12 Rules for Life, the bestselling book by Canadian psychologist, Jordan Peterson. Heard of it? The title has sold over 2 million copies so far. Peter-son's lecture tour has packed out venues across the world. He rose to prominence in the UK following his interview with Channel 4's Cathy Newman. The thing went viral, attracting 14 million views on YouTube. Agree with him or not, you have to admire Peterson's ability to hold his own under hostile questioning from the newscaster. Google it.

Wanting to know what the fuss was all about. I've just finished listening to an audiobook version of 12 Rules for Life. Peterson's essential message is that life is hard, but we need to take responsibility for our actions and start to turn our lives around. Instead of moaning a about our lot, he lays down the principle, "Set your house in perfect order before you criticise the world" (Rule 6). Peterson sets out a way of living an honest, responsible and decent life. In his book he draws on his clinical practice as a psychologist and his study of some of the great thinkers of history. The author hopes that following his 12 Rules will help provide an antidote to the chaos of evil and suffering we encounter in the world.

Interestingly enough, time and time again Peterson refers to the Bible to illustrate his points. He does not profess to be a practicing Christian, but recognises the deep wisdom that is to be found in Holy Scripture. The message of the Bible, however, isn't, 'Here are some rules. Keep them and all will be well.' Yes, the Bible includes lots of rules, like the Ten Commandments. The trouble is we don't keep them. We therefore need God's forgiveness and the power to live a new life. That is why the apostle Paul writes, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast," (Ephesians 2:8-9). We are not put right with God because of what we have done for him, but because of what he has done for us. That's grace. God sent Jesus to keep the rules on our behalf and die for our sins. By the power of the Holy Spirit believers are enabled to live a new life in line with God's will.

Jordan Peterson's 12 Rules for Life is certainly worth a read (or a listen). Many people have found what he has to say very helpful. His call for us to grow up and take responsibility for our lives deserves to be widely heeded. But one thing is missing. Only God's grace in Jesus can provide the true antidote to chaos.

I am sure by now all the Christmas decorations are once again packed in boxes and stored for next December. All thoughts of new year celebrations over and the reality of another year passing into the history of our personal diary's complete as we turn to the last year of another passing decade.

For me this year starts with Candlemas as this will be the Sunday I return to work after surgery in early November. In the first meeting of 2019 Ray Broughton shared with us some topical tips and new ideas and regaled us **heverells** with hilarious stories about his 28 years of experience talking to garden clubs and other groups. He proved to be a very accomplished and engaging speaker and the

audience remained amazed, amused and entertained throughout the evening.

At one unidentified venue Ray turned up at an empty village hall and, as the start time was fast approaching, he decided to put out all the chairs. Eventually people turned up. No one from the committee spoke to him or introduced him and at the end of the evening everyone left without putting the chairs back or paying him. Needless to say, that one is on a black list! At another venue there was an electricity meter that only took old shillings and, as noone had brought any, the meeting had to be cancelled. Quite recently there was a hall that only had round pin sockets and no round to square pin adapter. Ray now always carries such an adapter with him and has had occasion to use it three times in recent years.

As the evening went on Ray recalled some even more embarrassing and hilarious situations. Luckily, he interspersed his stories with some gardening tips so that we had a chance to recover our composure. For example, we learned that tomato ketchup when smeared over secateurs or other cutting implements serves to clean, sharpen, lubricate and sterilise. You can sow potatoes shallowly in flat ground and then heap a ridge of organic barley straw over them. The potatoes are easy to pick by hand out of the straw mound. White flowered varieties of runner bean are wind pollinated and therefore more reliable at producing a good crop than the more decorative but insect pollinated and thus weather dependent red flowered varieties. Snipping the stigma out of your tulip flowers makes the flower display last longer. A softwood saw can be used for hardwood but a hardwood saw cannot be used for softwood. Often when greenhouse plants get a bit leggy it is because they need carbon dioxide and a big dollop of horse manure wrapped in cling film with six puncture holes will provide a steady and (we were assured) smell free supply.

Ray also told us about some useful new products in development. For instance, the Japanese are developing a replacement for peat pots using recycled fibre impregnated with nutrients and water retention properties. One company is coating seeds with nutrients, water gel and germination enhancers. Cardboard coffee cups are being recycled and made into an environmentally friendly peat compost alternative.





Acting on a dinner party tip from a lady, he feels convinced that he has hit on just the chap to cover a promising little war in the African Republic of Ishmaelia. He sends for the William Boot who writes nature notes for the Beast by mistake, for John Boot a novelist and traveller. This results in confusion caused by William who has never been far from his home in the West Country where he lives with a lot of very eccentric relatives. On arrival in Ishmaelia, he has to rely on the good will of other reporters as he has no idea of how to compile a report from a war zone. Scoop is a very amusing and irreverent satire of newspapers and Fleet Street in general in the pursuit of hot news. If you have not read this book, we recommend it.

Finally, we managed to discuss "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. Most will know the story of Scrooge and the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Still to Come. Dickens' picture of life in Victoria England is quite sombre for the poverty depicted. Scrooge shows how those with little sympathy for the less fortunate take a very hard attitude to appeals for help. Dickens tale of Scrooge's reinvention after the visits of the Ghosts and his becoming a kindly Uncle figure was an appeal to readers at the time for charity towards the less fortunate. A message that still applies today.





WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

REFERENDUM - Neighbourhood Plan: Wiltshire Council is currently considering the recommendations of the independent Examiner appointed to carry out the examination of the West Lavington Neighbourhood Plan and will decide by 31 January on whether the Plan should proceed to Referendum. A favourable outcome, that may include the need to modify the Plan, would mean that a Referendum would be held within 56 working days of the decision being published in line with regulations.

There is every likelihood that 31 January will see a decision to proceed to Referendum in April. The Referendum is the final stage of a very long process started by the Parish Council in 2012. Neighbourhood Plans are the creation of localism legislation designed to give residents the ability to shape their neighbourhood. Our Plan is intended to provide a planning framework and policies that will stipulate appropriate development for the community into the future, particularly for young families and older residents. Through community consultation, overwhelming support (68%) was shown for potential development of the site adjacent to DAPS and the playing fields the. The owners, Gaiger Bros, are currently working on their detailed plans which will be the subject of a public presentation. Dates will be publicised and the event will give all members of the community the opportunity to view and discuss them before the Referendum. Please be aware that the Plan contains policies that seeks to enhance the local community, community facilities and services while conserving the village and countryside environment. A "yes" vote in April will help achieve these community benefits. Your vote will really count!

PRECEPT: Parish councillors, at their January meeting, decided to keep the precept per household unchanged having regard to the present financial climate. The Parish Council will continue to use the precept monies it receives to support community organisations, assets and facilities, such as the Village Hall, Youth Club, the elderly, BMX track, equipment in Robert's Playground, rights of way, NHP, the parish council website, CCTV together with parish commitments such as the clerk's salary, insurance, waste collection and grass cutting.

COMMUNITY WELL-BEING: There has been an incident of fly-tipping on Strawberry Hill but the debris was removed within 24 hours. Wiltshire Council is prosecuting offenders when they can be identified and the public is encouraged to report any incident through myWiltshire. Reports that dog fouling is on the upsurge in the parish have been received. It is a criminal offence not to clear up immediately after your dog.

SPRING CLEAN: The annual Great British Spring Clean will this year occur over a month rather than a week-end. Details will follow.

CHEVERELL MAGNA PARISH COUNCIL

The Council last met on 7 January. The Approved Minutes of the previous meeting (in December) are available to see on the website and the Council's Notice Boards. The next meeting will be on 4 February (7.30pm at The Pavilion).

The Council received an informative presentation on the work of the village Community Speed-watch Team from Andy Jenkinson, the Team Leader. They, in conjunction with Wiltshire Police, perform an unglamorous but important task in slowing down those drivers who use our village as a 'rat run' and, in particular, help to keep our children safe at school times. But the number of volunteers is disappointingly low, which reduces the number of sessions they can undertake. Please consider volunteering to play your part in maintaining the safety of our village. It's not a huge commitment – a couple of hours every 3 weeks would help a lot. The Council is considering road signs and anything else that could help, to demonstrate its full support.

In other ways, fortunately, we live in a low-crime area, as the monthly Police re-ports on the website show. There is, however, an ongoing issue of people trying to throw illegal substances over the wall into Erlestoke Prison. If you see ANY-THING suspicious, just ring 999 – this is a high priority for the Police. This also applies to the first indication of any more illegal raves on Salisbury Plain.

Wiltshire Council is undertaking a process of transferring unwanted parcels of land to other bodies, thus reducing their maintenance responsibilities. The Council is pursuing an application regarding the area of Highways land outside The Bell, in order to preserve this important parking area for village use. Other areas, mainly green space, are under consideration.

Work continues on planning for a Playpark extension. Having obtained ideas from Holy Trinity School (which would meet National Curriculum requirements) the Council is now getting quotes from suppliers, after which we will seek funding. It's not too late to submit YOUR ideas, though

And, finally, the Council has set its budget for 2019/20, which will affect your Council Tax bill. A 2.61% increase was agreed, mainly to cover essential tree works and to build up a reserve for playground maintenance. In Real Money, that's an increase of $\mathfrak{L}1.05$ for a whole year for the 'average Band D' property or, in my usual measurement, way less than a pint in The Bell. Hopefully not too up-setting. You're always welcome to ask what we do with it, though!
